RIGHT OR WRONG?

The district attorney knocked off his cigar ash and a little smile flickered across his face, rough-hewn, immobile. Yet deep in the eyes lay a surprising depth of compassion. It is there in the gaze of all men brought face to face with the constant frailty and weakness and sin of their fellows.

"It's all right to talk," he said to the little group of men gathered about the library fire in his home. They were all old friends and he could speak his mind. "It's the natural thing to say a wrong should react on the doer and all crime should receive its punishment—that an eye for an eye is the only sane doctrine; that the law should pursue its cold, implacable, righteous path, but—well it's a strange thing for me to say, because I uphold the law. But there are exceptions!" He leaned forward and stirred the embers of the hickory log and the other men smoked on in silence.

"I am a great believer in environment. It is not all, but it is the greater proportion. Peter Gorman's father was a rag-picker and his mother died of delirium tremens. I know, because afterward I traced him back. He was born in the one room occupied by the Gorman family on the third floor of the tenement in the rear of a particularly unsavory number on an especially dubious street in the Chicago slums, and he never had a decent meal in all his young life, unless he could steal it. Through some whim of fate he grew big and husky in spite of this, and when the probation officers got their hands on him he was at ten years of age the worst little daredevil in the neighborhood. In spite of his starvings and beatings and neglect, he so rioted with animal spirits and energy that he had to have some sort of an outlet. And not being able to take it out in fencing lessons, music, baseball or football or swimming races, like his sort over on the boulevard, Peter devoted his energies to tormenting the 'cops,' to flitting from the fruit stands and grocery stores and licking the boys who attempted to steal his corner where he sold papers. They could not keep him in school—he escaped like the proverbial eel. When I first started out as a young lawyer I happened to see him the first time he was arrested. He had been in a street fight, and, though his clothes were torn, I noticed he held his head erect, unusual in a boy of his sort. And he met one's gaze directly.

"He cheated me," was all his defence.

"And I gave him what was comin' to him!" I still remember his surprise and contempt at the injustice of the court, who refused to see Peter's side of the argument and fined him. As the years went on Peter frequently got into trouble. He had a hot temper and an amazing sense of justice. If he didn't get what he considered due him he took it, and this bred unquiet, naturally. When he was 21 he fell in love with a girl as unusual as himself in that she had been born in the slums and had kept herself untainted by them. Mary Sullivan worked in a factory, and was a pretty little creature, with appealing eyes, and Peter was her slave from the beginning. That girl brought out all the dormant good there may have been in him. He had a small store now, where he sold cigars and newspapers and cheap soda water. Peter had prospered, according to his station. He still clung to his original neighborhood. I doubt if he had ever been outside the city limits. In his dim, groping way he tried to live up to Mary. My work had called me over there, and Peter and I grew to be good friends. He had been of help to me frequently. Not that he 'preached' on his friends—he was not that sort. He had not been arrested since he was 18, and I really took an interest in his efforts to be decent. He had introduced Mary to me, and she was a good, narrow-minded girl, with not much mental keenness. That possibly was why, when the test came, she weakened. For Peter had a rival, Antonio, a good-looking young Italian with a flashing smile and shifting eyes, but with a way. Oh, Antonio had that 'way,' and though Mary shrank from him, she was not insensible to his charm. Antonio often boasted of his irresistible fascinations for the fair sex, but Mary put him off and turned to Peter. She had sense enough to feel the swiftness that was under all his rough speech and sometimes rowdiness. And Antonio, repulsed, rebelled and set his scheming wits to work, so that when it came about that a man was found killed in the alley back of Peter's store, and circumstantial evidence for a time closed the net about Peter, Antonio seized the opportunity and poured in to the girl's mind a hammering accusation against him, till, bewildered, shocked, incredulous, she sent Peter in jail a scrawled refusal to see him, adding that all was over, that she was going to marry Antonio.

**SPECIAL AWARDS AT
DOMINION EXHIBITION**

Silver Trophies, Medals, Extra Cash, etc., in Addition to \$25,000 Prize Money

Over \$25,000 is to be distributed at the Dominion Exhibition in St. John, N. B., September 5th to 15th next, in awards for live stock, agricultural and horticultural products, dairy shows, poultry, horse exhibits, women's work and educational department. This is a magnificent sum, made possible by the very generous grant of the Federal, Provincial and Civic Governments, and exhibitors from all sections of the Dominion will profit by it greatly. A strenuous competition has thus been induced in all the departments above mentioned, with the result that, even in face of the fact that new buildings have been erected and a generous rearrangement of spaces effected, there is scant, if any, room for an overplus of exhibitors. In addition to the cash prizes of \$25,000, there will be magnificent silver trophies, gold, silver and bronze medals, diplomas and badges of merit. Among the special trophies is a huge solid silver, gold-lined cup with ebony base, presented by the Bank of New Brunswick for the best Shorthorn Bull, another handsome silver cup by the same banking institution for the best Agricultural Horse; the Petrie Manufacturing Company, Limited, will give a ladies' gold watch for the best ten pound roll or print of butter made from cream separated by their machinery; the Clydesdale Horse Society, of Great Britain, will donate two gold medals and one silver medal for the best Canadian-bred Clydesdale Stallion, the best Clyde Mare or Filly. Special cash prizes are to be given by the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada; a special prize by the Hackney classes; gold, silver and bronze medals by the Canadian Bank of Commerce for Grand Champion Ram, and for best herd of dairy cattle. In the Agricultural Section the Provincial Chemical Fertilizer Company, Limited, of St. John, offer cash awards to bona fide growers, and Messrs. W. Atlee Burpee & Company, seedmen, of Philadelphia, make similar cash awards, as does the Bowker Fertilizer Company, of Boston, Mass. Numerous other medals will be awarded by the Exhibition Association, not only in the live stock and farming departments, but in the educational and industrial sections as well.

**NOVA SCOTIA VESSEL
FOUND SINKING AT SEA**

Bremen, Aug. 26—A dispatch from Royal, in Azores Islands to the North German Lloyd company, reports that the North German Lloyd Steamer Koenigin Luise encountered the ship Harvest Queen of Windsor N. S., which sailed from Dalhousie N. B. August 10 for Buenos Ayres on August 24th in a sinking condition, the ship being then in longitude 40.51 west and in latitude 44.24 north. All the crew of the Harvest Queen were taken aboard the Koenigin Luise and the ship was left burning in mid-ocean.

decade for which statistics are available shows a considerable increase in criminality among certain classes of the population and this increase in criminality for ten years is confined to that of simple murder. The maximum of crime was found in young persons between 16 and 20 years of age.

The report attributes this increase in simple criminality to the spread of alcoholism. The regions where the most alcohol is sold furnish the largest proportion of criminals.

The report shows also that in the trades, there is most drinking among the day laborers in cities engaged in shipping and transportation (50.9 in 100,000) and, to less degree, among those engaged in sea-fishing (44.2 per 100,000.)

The facts which these statistics seem to demonstrate are that alcoholism is the direct cause of the increase of criminal propensities in men and, as a result of crime. The temptations found in the saloons both in the large cities and country are the purveyors of the prisons.
