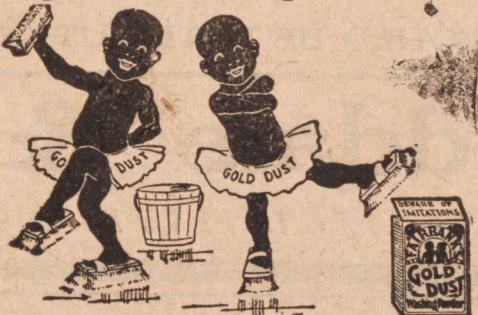

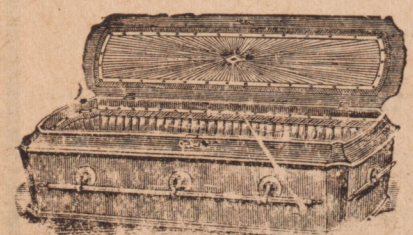

# HALIFAX GIRL IS ABOMINABLY TREATED BY U. S. OFFICIALS

Girl of Good Position, Travelling as a Saloon Passenger, and Having Over \$60 in Her Possession is Refused Permission to Land, Although She Stated She was Only Travelling for Her Health and was on Her Way to Pay a Visit to Friends.

Drastic treatment was meted out to Margaret Mooney, a sixteen-year old Halifax girl, by the United States Immigration officials at Ellis Island, New York. Despite her protests she was placed in a room with seventeen other women of various nationalities and compelled to sleep on a canvas stretcher between two negro women, and then after numerous examinations was deported.

Miss Mooney's relatives and friends are highly indignant over the treatment of the young girl, and they intend to place the case before the authorities at Ottawa, and the United States Government will be asked to hold an investigation into the conduct of the Immigration officials.

### THE GIRL'S STORY

Miss Mooney returned to Halifax last night and then the story of her treatment was learned. She is a daughter of David A. Mooney, the well known marine engineer. The young girl had been studying very hard and her nerves had become somewhat affected. It was thought that a trip abroad would do her good, so she decided to visit some relatives at Patterson, New Jersey. She left here on July 26, as a saloon passenger on the Red Cross liner Florizel, and arrived at Brooklyn, N. Y., on July 28.

When the steamer anchored at quarantine it was boarded by the Immigration officers and the passengers were examined. Miss Mooney among the number. They questioned the girl at length and then refused to allow her to land, she being held for further examination. She protested to the officials that she was travelling on the advice of her physician, hoping that the sea voyage and a change of climate might restore her health. She was going to visit the family of Martin O'Brien, at Patterson, N. J., and two of her cousins were at the steamer to meet her.

### TAKEN TO ELLIS ISLAND

The Immigration officials told her that she could not land as she was likely to become a public charge. All the protests of the young girl and her relatives were without avail. Her relatives are people in good circumstances, and they assured the officials that Miss Mooney would not become a public charge. In fact she was only going to remain for two months and then return to Halifax. She was detained on the boat, however, from noon until the following morning at nine o'clock. Then she was taken to the detention station on Ellis Island and placed in a room with seventeen women of various nationalities, including two negro women. Miss Mooney had \$60 in cash in her possession, and she was ordered to deposit the larger portion of the money in the Immigration Bank. She was told to keep \$3 or \$4 to pay for her lodgings and meals.

Again she was obliged to submit to another examination by the medical officers on the Island. At night she was compelled to sleep on a canvas stretcher between the two negro women, there being in all seventeen

persons persons in the room. A negro woman cook supplied her with meals and charged for them.

### ORDERS TO DEPORT

Miss Mooney was told that she would be detained until her case had been placed before the authorities at Washington and reply received. On the following day she was notified that orders had been received to deport her. She was accordingly brought back to Brooklyn and again placed on board of the Florizel, and returned to Halifax. The United States officials did not notify her relatives while the young girl was held a prisoner, and not hearing from her they were very anxious. They did not know that she was returning, but by the merest chance a friend was at the wharf when the steamer arrived and notified the girl's parents.

### WELL TREATED ON STEAMER

Miss Mooney states that the passengers and all on board of the Florizel were very kind to her, and she was treated splendidly by the Red Cross Line officials.

There was great indignation expressed by all that saloon passenger should be treated in such a manner.

When the young girl related her experience, her parents at once engaged a lawyer, and the matter will be reported to Ottawa and the American Government will be asked to hold an investigation.

It is said he comes to Scranton on a four days investigation of industrial conditions in the Anthracite Coal regions. He will be the guest of the Right Rev. Bishop Hoban this evening and will remain at the Bishop's residence over night. John Mitchell is also expected to be a guest.

# ENGLAND'S GREAT NEED IS MEN OF CHARACTER SAYS LORD ROSEBERRY

London, Aug. 3.—Lord Roseberry says England wants men. This was the burden of a speech His Lordship delivered in opening the new buildings of the Colchester Royal Grammar School. He said:

"I shall not be uttering a mere commonplace if I say that in the whole history of the world, education was never so important as it is now. 'I am not speaking of education as politicians speak of it, who seem to regard it as a means of persecution, rather than anything else, or at any rate as a phrase for the political platform. I am speaking of it from the point of view of a citizen of this country, who has seen a great deal of life and who has watched the signs of the present and of the future as attentively as possible from my somewhat restricted position.

"I will only trouble you with two points of view in which education seems to be of paramount importance at the present time. The first is the incessant competition between nations at this moment for primacy in Empire and in command.

"All nations are now demanding fresh outlets for commerce, fresh means of expansion, fresh employment for their people to whatever degree they may belong; and for all these purposes the best education that we can give is necessary to enable our nation not to win, but to hold its own in the fight.

"There is really nothing so melancholy to think of sometimes on that the enormous mass of the best material in the world, which we possess is really not put to its best use, and has sometimes great difficulty in finding any use at all.

### ROOM FOR ALL

"I suppose none of us go about England, Scotland and Wales without seeing everywhere fine young fellows asking helplessly what they are to do, and I say that it is to schools like this that we have to look that in the future such things shall not be.

"There is room, as I believe, for all the educated youth of Great Britain, room and occupation for all, if not at home, at any rate in the Empire. But have we hitherto been fitting our boys to occupy the position open to them? I greatly doubt it, and it is to you—(turning to the headmaster)—and to others, who preside over such schools as this, I would give the earnest advice that, in educating boys you should think not merely of the school honors they can get, but of the end which they have to answer in life.

"What we want in England, what I think we shall increasingly want, is men, men in character.

"There is no word that the great Gladstone had so often on his lips as 'manhood.' It seems, indeed, to be the quality which he held in highest esteem. If he wanted a man he would say, 'He has had the manhood to do this,' or 'He has had the manhood to do that,' and what he meant by that was the man had the courage to follow his own conscience and his own convictions and to act up to them, and act up to them independently, of the convictions and persuasions of others.

"Now, I do not know whether you agree with me, but I can under the deep persuasion that real men of manhood—real manhood—were never so much wanted as now.

"There is a tendency in the world to impair and to impinge on the liberty of the individual—a tendency which I think vicious, which I think likely to sap the life of our nation. It can be effectively resisted and stopped by rearing up men—men who are men, not merely in appearance and talk, but in character and in conduct.

"It is the easiest thing in the world to go with the stream to float on the stream to let the stream carry you where it will. It will probably end in the brushes. But that is not the way to do good and try to influence your generation.

"I think that this country rears its greatest race from the middle of the sixteenth to the middle of the seventeenth centuries. It seems to me that the great age of Elizabeth has stamped itself on the national life all through and for generations to come. The period from the accession of Elizabeth to the restoration of Chas. II., seems to me, not only to have produced the greatest characters in English history but one has the feeling in reading the history of those times that the men all through from the highest to the lowest, were of a higher quality than we are now.

Washing Machines.—Washing machines are a household necessity and if you have not one the deficiency should be supplied as soon as possible. See that the working parts are kept well oiled, kept free from gummy dirt. If the wringer rollers become stained, clean them with a cloth dipped in coal oil, then wash with soap suds: Loose the rollers before putting the wringer away: Keep a little water in the machine to keep from drying out and becoming leaky.
