## ACADIA XV. LOOKS LIKELIEST FOR INTERCOLLEGIATE RUGBY CHAMPIONSHIP

### Wolfville College Will Have Eleven of its Old Team Back and Lots of New Material--Lou Buckley Formerly of Dalhousie Will be With Mt. Allison--Garnet and Gold Looks Good.

The sporting writer of the Sackville Tribune waxes sarcastic at the expense of The Mail, in fact he becomes "real horrid" and all because it was suggested on this page that Mount Allison had in 1910 the best chance she has had in some years to land the Intercollegiate Rugby championship. To disprove this the Sackville man points out that the Garnet and Gold will have only six of last year's squad, that is, one less than U.-N. B. is sure of, and that in addition to these the Sackville college is likely to have two of its old forwards as well as Lou Buckley, formerly of Dalhousie to play quarter or half. And then there is a big bunch of recruits going in to swell the Garnet and Gold squad. It is not very apparent why the Sackville pencil-pusher should get hot under the collar. It might interest him to know that the "dope," to use his own classic expression, from which the Mail's opinion was formed was supplied by a member of the Mount Allison team.

#### MT. A'S PROSPECTS

However here is what the Tribune has to say of the Mt. Allison XV.

"Take a look at the remnant of last year's squad that is sure to be on hand: Smith and McDougall, halves; McKean, quarter; Lawrence, Cochrane and Moore, forwards. Candidly, now, while all those fellows are pretty lively pigskin chasers, it's not a very big nucleus about which to build a

team, is it? Of course, it is probable that White and Parker, forwards, will also be available, but they are not absolute certainties.

"Nothing much is known about the new stuff that will be on hand. Lou Buckley, the former Dalhousie crack, will be here and will be pretty sure of a place at quarter or half. But aside from Buckley it is not known that there are any players of experience coming in. Billy Godfrey, of Chatham, a half back, Macburn, of St. John, another half, Hutchinson, of St. Stephen, a full back, Thompson, an Islander, a quarter, Kirk of Dorchester, and Odell, both forwards,--all of whom were in the Academy last fall--will be on hand, but just how good they will be is problematical. Thompson, however, promised pretty well in 1909. A 200-pound Cape Bretoner is slated to take a crack at the game for the first time here and it will not be surprising if a husky American tries for the team in a Mr. A. uniform. A young fellow from the Island is also credited with football aspirations, but all these fellows are merely 'prospects' who may or may not pan out.

"Fraser, West, Hartley--a sub, in 1909--Dickinson, Pickering, Jack Windsor, P. M. Hartley and one or two others, who were in the practice squad last year will also be on the field again this fall. Some of them shaped up pretty well last season.

"Then there are whispers of one or

two 'desirable' men who may be in college when the bell rings for prayers on the opening morning. But then you never can tell. For instance, there is a certain youth of some athletic reputation who was expected to wear the Garnet and Gold but is now understood to be about to enroll at Acadia for reasons of his own."

The Mail hastens to repeat its statement, "Mt. Allison will bear watching."

#### ACADIA IS STRONG

The Acadia team is reported stronger than ever. The Garnet and Blue lost but four men of the 1909 team. They were Camp, one of the best half-backs that ever played for the Wolfville College, Simms, a quarter, and Howe and Dyas of the forwards. The other eleven men are expected to turn up and in addition to them there is some first class material in the freshman class. Eric MacDonald of this city will leave for Wolfville as soon as he completes his course at No. 3 Regimental Depot which will be at the end of the month. It is generally conceded that he will get a place on the Acadia half-line. Other good men going to Acadia from Horton Academy are Ross and Eveleigh, backs and Murray a forward.

Robinson, who used to go to P. N. S. here is Acadia's captain. He is a forward. Looking at things from the road Acadia seems about to make a noise like another championship.
