## L. O. L. MEETING AT MEDUCTIC

Meductic, Sept. 10—A large public meeting at Meductic under the auspices of Milburn L. O. L., was held here Saturday evening. An address was delivered by N. W. Brown, Middle Southampton, followed by Rev. Mr. Flewelling of Canterbury Station W. S. Tompkins, of Meductic, Comptroller Scott of Lower Woodstock, and L. A. Hopper.

The chair was taken by A. J. McDougall, W. M., at 8.30 p. m., who, after a few introductory remarks, welcoming the large audience, introduced N. W. Brown, of Southampton who gave a very interesting and scholarly address on The Day We Live In.

The speaker divided his subject into four different parts—religion, education, communication and politics, giving his hearers an interesting and practical retrospect of the evolution of these institutions and their effect on the moral, social and commercial status of the country. He compared the struggles and victories of their development in surmounting the obstacles of their early existence, with the changed conditions of the present day, quoting from history many valuable points of information.

Following Mr. Brown, Rev. Mr. Flewelling gave some humorous and interesting reminiscences of his membership of forty years in the Orange order.

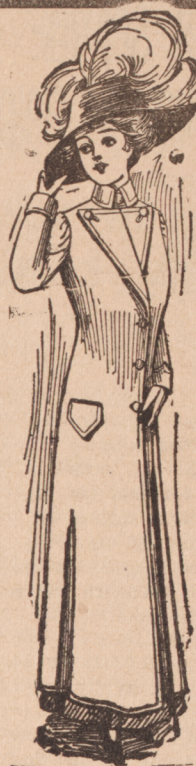

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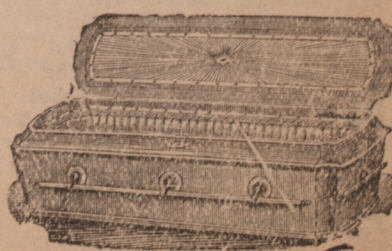
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
