WESTMORLAND COUNTY TEACHERS IN ANNUAL SESSION

Dr. W. S. Carter, Chief Superintendent of Education, and Dr. J. R. Inch Attend.

Port Elgin, N. B., Sept. 24.—The 23rd annual session of the Westmorland county teachers' institute opened Thursday morning at Port Elgin with 9 teachers in attendance. The convention is honored with the presence of Dr. W. S. Carter, chief superintendent of education, for N. B., and Dr. J. R. Inch, ex-chief superintendent, and Capt. A. H. Borden, R. C. R., Halifax. The first session was held in Port Elgin's new school building. The president in his usual excellent address, dealt with the various educational affairs, commenting on the improvement in the public school system and expressing the hope that some attention should be given to agriculture, so that the boys would be educated to the farm instead of away from it into the city.

Dr. W. S. Carter, superintendent of education, then addressed the institute. He began by paying a graceful tribute to Dr. Inch, saying he hoped that if he served as long that he might have as much substantial improvement to his credit. He spoke of the important needs of education and said he would ask the inspectors to put stress upon agricultural studies this year.

The third session of the Westmorland County Teachers' Institute met in the school building at nine o'clock Friday morning. President Jonah in the chair.

Dr. W. S. Carter, chief superintendent of education, addressed the Institute, and in answer to questions, gave information of text books, course of instruction, and the pension act. He strongly urged upon all teachers the necessity of attending the Institute.

The chief superintendent was anxious to see an improvement in the appearance of school houses throughout the county, and urged the teachers to take an active part in their communities, and take a broader view of education.

The committee on resolutions brought in their report, which was unanimously passed as follows: "Resolved that a vote of thanks be tendered the following:

"First, to Dr. Carter, Chief Superintendent of Education, for the interest he has shown by being present at our institute, and for his helpful suggestions on educational matters.

"Second, to Dr. Inch, ex-chief superintendent of education, for his continued interest in the proceedings of our institute, and the inspiration of his presence."

PERUVIAN AVIATOR GETS BIG PRIZE

Dumossodola Italy Sept. 23.—To George Chavez, the Peruvian aviator belongs the honor of being the first to fly across the Alps. The daring feat was accomplished today in an attempt to win the prize of \$20,000 offered by the Italian Aviation Society of Milan for a flight from Brig, Switzerland to Milan.

Chavez however, was unable to complete the trip having sustained painful injuries when he alighted here. His machine was overturned and he was buried in the wreckage. It is not believed, however, that his injuries are serious. As the aviator was seen to be slowly descending a great crowd gathered. Slowly and gracefully he neared the surface and was only about thirty feet above the ground, when a gust of wind caught and overturned the machine. It fell heavily, burying the aviator beneath it. Chavez was pinned under the motor and badly hurt. He had fainted on striking the ground, and was badly injured when released from the wreckage. The machine was ruined.

Weymann the American aviator, first attempted the flight leaving the table-land at Brig 1.10 o'clock this afternoon, later word was received here that he had descended after being in the air four minutes.

Chavez believed that the favorable opportunity which he had awaited since Monday morning had come and rose to a height estimated to be nearly 7,000 feet. He passed swiftly over mountain tops, clearing the summit of Simplon Pass, at 1.46 p.m. At that time, his monoplane, was moving as steadily as a railroad train. After negotiating Simplon Pass Chavez followed the route over Gondogorge, one of the grandest and at the same time one of the most savage of the Alps. He reached here at 2.11 o'clock.
