SPECIAL EXCURSION
TO AROOSTOOK VALLEY
TOMORROW MORNING

Many Prominent People of the Province Will be Guests of Maine and N. B. Electrical Power Co.

The special excursion to the Aroostook Valley which is to be run by the Maine and New Brunswick Electrical Power Company will leave Fredericton at six o'clock tomorrow morning. A large number of invitations have been issued by the company and it is expected that about fifty persons will go from this city. A large number of invited guests will arrive from St. John this evening and join the excursion here.

AT AROOSTOOK JUNCTION.

Mr. Charles K. Howard manager for the Power Company will be in charge of the excursion. The special train will consist of four cars. Among the excursionists will be many from other parts of the province besides Fredericton and St. John. The run will be via the Gibson Branch of the C.P.R. Aroostook Junction, it is expected, will be reached shortly before noon. At that place the excursionists will be entertained at luncheon by the company. The company's guests will then inspect the power-house at Aroostook Junction, at which the power is generated which operates the railway and performs other services.

OVER NEW RAILWAY.

From Aroostook Junction the excursion train will go over the Aroostook Valley Railway to Washburn Junction. Over this part of the route the train will be hauled by an electric locomotive. The excursion will leave Aroostook Junction on the return trip at about 7 p.m. and is expected to reach Fredericton about midnight.

Invitations have been issued to the members of the City Council and it is likely that some of the aldermen will accept and take the trip over the new electric railway.
