CHICAGO CLUB WOMEN UNITE WITH STRIKERS

Chicago, Nov. 1.—Mounted police today charged threatening mobs of striking garment workers and made numerous arrests in three quarters of Chicago, only to be dumbfounded, when met by obdurate groups of club women and society leaders, who when taken into custody, produced engraved calling cards at police stations in lieu of bail bonds.

It was a new experience for the police, and it plainly confused them. A score of these women champions, of the garment workers were arrested, but they were immediately released when their identities became known. One woman was struck by a policeman's club, but her name did not become known, as she was placed in an automobile and taken home. Most of the club women involved in today's demonstrations were garbed as working girls and the police could not distinguish them from the strikers until after arrests were made.

Riotous scenes developed down town on the north side and on the west side. More than 500 men and women engaged in the down town demonstration, which was broken up by the police after considerable trouble. As they left their headquarters in La Salle street, the strikers and their sympathizers changed bells, blew whistles and tooted horns.

WOMEN LED THE MARCH.

The line of march proceeded into Chicago river, passing large tailoring establishments, whose employees were beckoned to join the strikers. More than 2,000 took part in one of several incipient riots of the west side. In each instance women led the strikers and their friends.

"I would take oath that we were doing absolutely nothing beyond the law," said Miss Ella Starr, a club woman. "The only persons who were violating were policemen, who treated us roughly and hurt dreadfully with their clubs, some of the poor boys were leading peacefully past the shops. If there had been a real riot this morning, and it would not have taken much to have made one, it would have been incited altogether by the

police."

Miss Franklin, another volunteer picket, was indignant because of the manner in which she had been treated by the police. "I know they would not have let me go if I had not presented my card," said Miss Franklin. "They seemed to think that I was a particularly dangerous character. Perhaps it would have been a good plan to let them take me to jail and just prove to them how little legal foundation they have to stand on."

WILL OPEN WEALTHY HOMES.

Promises from wealthy women to open their homes to destitute striking girls, offers of picket service from women, social and club leaders, and pledges of assistance from many other women were received today by Mrs. Raymond Robins, president of the women's trade union league union. Among those to volunteer were Mrs. W. B. Hopkins and Mrs. General Simpson.

Mrs. Robins tonight declared that there would be at least 50 volunteer pickets from women's clubs and other sources, outside the working girls actively engaged tomorrow.

"We cannot give their names, at this time," said Mrs. Robins. "We found it advisable in New York and I am sure we will here, to keep the police guessing," as to who our pickets are. "Striking girls, club women and leaders in the women's trade union league, will meet tomorrow."

General Jourdan was a conspicuous figure in the political life of the old city of Brooklyn after the civil war. He had been president of the Brooklyn Union Gas Co. in recent years.

MANAGER BANCROFT WILL TAKE TEAM TO CUBA

Cincinnati, Nov. 2.—Business Manager Frank C. Bancroft, of the Cincinnati Nationals, has been engaged by the officers of the Philadelphia Americans to take that team to Cuba and to play a series of games in Havana, Santiago and other cities during December and January.

He says that the men will leave New York for Tampa Florida, about the middle of November. The Cuban has agreed to pay a handsome sum for the World's Champions for a month this winter. In addition to this, their transportation and hotel bills will be paid.
