DIVORCE COURT ADJOURNED

UNTIL NOVEMBER 25TH

The Divorce Court adjourned yesterday afternoon until November 24, when judgment will be given in the case of Smith vs Smith. Evidence in this case was completed yesterday. Four witnesses were examined. They were the plaintiff, Edward Smith, George E. Gombler of Johnston, Queens County; Mrs. John L. Burnett, of the Grand Hotel, this city, and Mrs. Orchard, who conducts a boarding-house on Queen Street.

The evidence went to show that the two parties to the suit had been married in England in 1883, and came to this province in 1907. It was also sworn that the defendant had left her home and had come to Fredericton in July and has since resided here. The evidence of the two ladies was to the effect that the defendant had lived at both the places mentioned with Walter Kincaid, the co-respondent, and that they had been known as man and wife. Mr. R. B. Henson appeared for the plaintiff. The case was undefended.

ROBINSON CASE.

Mr. R. W. L. Tibbitts was the last witness in the case of Robinson vs Robinson, in which Ida May Robinson sued for divorce from Frank Levitt Robinson. He testified that Rev. Howard Sprague, who married the parties to the suit, was a properly registered clergyman in the Province of New Brunswick.

At the conclusion of the evidence, His Honor Judge McKelown said that as there were no intricate points and facts were clear and fresh in his mind he would deliver judgment.

After reciting the main allegations of the libel and alluding to proof of service of it and notice of trial, he discussed the facts of the case. He held in the absence of strong evidence to the contrary, the charge of the libel proved as far as the facts complained of at Kingsclear were concerned. He decreed that the marriage contracted and celebrated annulled, and that the plaintiff should be at liberty to resume her maiden name of Warwick. With the consent of Mr. H. A. Powell, K. C., counsel for the plaintiff, the decree was made without costs or alimony.

PATRICK LYNCH SENTENCED TO TWO YEARS' IMPRISONMENT

Stole Seventy Dollars From William Grass—Companion Thought to Have Money—Daring Suit Case Theft Last Night—Scott Act Raid.

Patrick Lynch was this morning sentenced to two years in Dorchester penitentiary for stealing a sum of money from William Grass. The theft took place on Friday last at the Empire House. Grass who had been working on the G. T. P. came to this city and met Lynch with whom he was acquainted. They with another man drank together and Grass was taken to his boarding house by the others insensible from drink. Lynch was seen to take money from Grass' pocket and was arrested, when searched however he had only nine dollars on his person. Grass when robbed had about eighty dollars. It is supposed that Lynch's companion got away with the money.

This morning the police tried to get some information from Lynch concerning the whereabouts of the money. Lynch said that he picked up some money which Grass dropped at the door when he was taken into the house. The prisoner's memory was poor however and he could not recollect what became of the money. Lynch also refused to tell where his home was saying he lived "down river."

DARING THEFT

There was a daring suit-case theft at the Waverly Hotel last evening when Howard Pond of Marysville had his suit-case containing clothing and other articles stolen while he was absent from the hotel. Pond alleges that Fred Doyle of Nelson took the suit-case and left on the 6.30 I. C. R. express. The Chatham police were notified last night by telegraph to watch for Doyle. No word of his capture has been heard yet. Pond and Doyle had been working on the Tobique together.

ANOTHER RAID

McAllister's pool-room on Regent street was raided last night but no liquor was found in the place. Chief Hawthorne, special policeman Gunter and Policeman Hartt made the search, the warrant however was not secured by Policeman Gunter. The first attempt to search the place was made in the afternoon but it was found to be locked. About seven o'clock the police went again when the proprietor was in and nothing but soft drinks were found in the place.
