SERIES OF ENGLISH  
RUGBY MATCHES  
IS PROPOSED

Winnipeg Mentioned as Suitable Place For Games—Manitoba Authorities Taking up Matter.

The Halifax football committee have received a letter from Secretary Pinkerton, of British Rugby Union, Winnipeg, in which he suggests that to demonstrate to the Canadian public that there is such a game as English Rugby, that "some time during the coming year a series of matches be arranged in some city in the Dominion, which would get the travelling expenses of the participating team on equal basis." He suggests Winnipeg, being mid-way between Halifax and Vancouver.

"To raise funds," he says, "they are getting up a subscription list, and taking it to several of the leading business men in the city to start the list. We also intend to arrange dances and arrange with the management of one of the theatres here to give us a percentage on tickets sold by us, etc. I would suggest that something of this kind be started by your union."

The suggestion has been made, if the Halifax committee takes hold of the matter, that the ladies who are admitted free to football matches might arrange for a fair on a large scale to assist in defraying expenses.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-  
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, the applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
