## HAZEN GOVERNMENT DENOUNCED AT MEETING

(Continued from page two.)

Where were those two? Why in the county of St. John, where there was a by-election in the summer of 1909. It was there that they applied the money of the people of the province, not in the interests of good roads but in a barefaced attempt to carry the county of St. John and bolster up their administration. They used the money of the people that was intended for roads, to help them by the special expenditure to carry an election in the county of St. John.

Do you call that honest or would you say that they were more interested in keeping themselves in power than they were in good roads?

### MR. HAZEN'S LOSSES

He reminded them in passing that this election in St. John was the third by-election since Mr. Hazen had come into power. But in spite of the fact that the government had exerted every effort and spent all the money possible, the electors of the County of St. John said to Mr. Hazen "we do not want you. Spend all the money you like. We propose to send (and they did send) a supporter of the opposition to represent them in the halls of the legislature." (Loud applause.)

In very brief terms he congratulated the people present upon the facts that they had so popular and so energetic a representative in Dr. McAlister. He was glad to be there with him and to assist in any way that he could to advance the interests of the people of Albert County. He regretted very much the absence of Mr. Emmerson, who had been kept away by another engagement, for he knew that particularly in the parish of Elgin that honorable gentleman was well known and well liked. He did not know how soon they might have a local election, but it was his intention in the very near future to ask the county leaders in Albert Co. to call the people together for the purpose of nominating two good men to contest the constituency in support of the opposition, and whoever

they might nominate he asked them to give them their loyal and undivided support and he, for his part, if they succeeded in gaining power, would do everything possible to give them an honest, fair and economical government.

He was pleased to see and to hear that they were taking such an active interest at the present time. In these days of education they were well read people and particularly well posted upon the issues that were before them. He knew that they would know themselves what to do and it made little difference either what he or Mr. Hazen said. With them lay the judgment and he had the utmost faith in what the decision would be. (Applause.)

### MR. JOHN T. HAWKE

John T. Hawke, the next speaker, prefaced his remarks by a pleasant reference to the political revival Dr. McAlister had mentioned in his opening. He thought that if this were termed a political revival it might fairly be claimed that the doctor was a singing evangelist. (Laughter and applause.)

Referring to the resolution passed at the meeting of the evening before he agreed very heartily with the references to their great leader, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, as well as with the endorsements of Hon. C. W. Robinson, their provincial Liberal leader, and Dr. McAlister, the member for Kings-Albert, but he thought that a very grave omission had been made when he could find no references to the very strenuous work that had been done in the past by their popular representatives Hon. C. J. Osman and S. S. Ryan.

After some very complimentary references to the work of these gentlemen. Mr. Hawke in a very eloquent and well considered speech spoke of the Laurier government, and declared it was the best Canada had ever had.

### HON MR. OSMAN

Hon. Mr. Osman made a brief speech but in it he told them how

glad he was to share in their delightful day. His interest in the people of Albert would not decrease no matter whether he was in public or private life. He advised them to choose a younger man than himself when they came to nominate a candidate, but at the same time he confessed that while at certain times he was contented and willing to remain in private life, still on occasions such as these he felt the temptation assailing him to enter the fight and win the battle. Then it was that the solicitation of his friends to "come again" appealed to him strongly. He spoke warmly in praise of Dr. McAlister as their representative and told his hearers amid applause that he had visited Ottawa every session and knew that there was no man in the house more popular or highly thought of than the member for Kings-Albert. (Applause.) He eulogized the Laurier government and said that God had truly given us a great and good country, but that gift had been well utilized and aided by as wise and prudent administration of its affairs. He reminded the audience that while born in England he had been among them thirty-four years and was getting long.

A voice—You're young enough to suit us.

At any rate he was always going to share in the job of such gatherings as this. (Continued applause.)

### MR. SANFORD RYAN

Sanford Ryan made one of his witty and telling speeches. With a twinkle in his eye and a side glance at Messrs. McAlister, Robinson and Hawke, he said Elgin was probably happy and prosperous because it had no doctor, lawyer or editor among the people. He gave some concrete instances of the extravagance of road law operation under Hazen's officials. In one instance 2,000 feet of lumber cost \$64, in another a man said his bill had been collected for \$66.75 and he only got \$6 of that amount. This the man who received the \$6 was prepared to swear to.

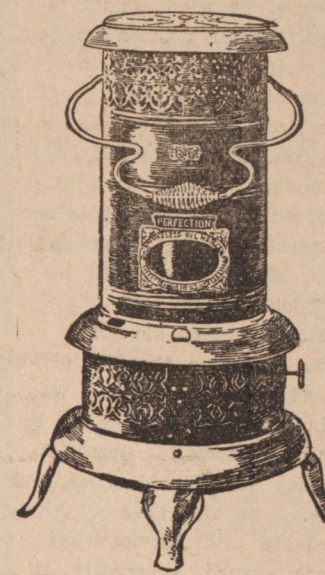
But Albert County was unfortunate in its officials. One of Mr. Hazen's trusted officials had been sent up for trial for kicking a woman and another had escaped the penitentiary by a split jury.

Mr. Ryan was repeatedly cheered as he made point after point against the present local government.
