G. T. P. TO OPERATE  
1,300 MILES OF  
LINE THIS YEAR

Winnipeg, Oct. 7.—Grand Trunk Pacific has arranged with the Canadian Northern Railway for the temporary use of five miles of the latter's tracks, being that portion passing through this city for the purpose of connecting up with the National Transcontinental line. The new arrangement means that the Grand Trunk Pacific may operate through trains from Edison, Alberta, to Fort William, a distance of about 1,300 miles. The first train over the National Transcontinental Railway left last night. Four trains will be sent east during the next 24 hours.

TORONTO STUDENTS  
IN BATTLE ROYAL

Toronto, Oct. 7.—Because his friends have consented to make good all his deficiencies and have deposited \$309 to meet claims, the Toronto police consented to withdraw the charge of fraud against Samuel Goldsmith, proprietor of the Toronto Outfitting Company and National Suit, Shirt and Millinery Company.

Goldsmith's arrest was made last Friday, after a large number of complaints had come in from Nova Scotia and British Columbia to the effect that customers of the two companies have been unable to get goods or satisfaction, after they had sent in money orders for the goods.

The freshmen at the chemistry and mining building of the faculty of applied science had a strenuous fight this morning with the second year men. The second year men planned the raid and when the freshmen came out from a trigonometry lecture, they were met by fully 100 men carrying boxes of paste. Within five minutes most of the freshmen were beyond recognition.

In the melee, the fire hose in the main corridor was turned on and for a moment things looked serious. The authorities were able to secure peace without extra aid.

SMALLPOX SUSPECT  
IN ALBERT TRAIN

Hillsboro, Oct. 7.—Somewhat of a sensation was caused today when the Albert train reached Hillsboro today, there being an Indian on board, who, it was feared, was afflicted with smallpox.

The Indian, it is understood, boarded the train at one of the stopping places a few miles above Albert, and as his face was in a bad condition with eruption, suspicions were at once aroused that the man was a victim of smallpox. The train was accordingly held up at Hillsboro and A. W. Bray, clerk of the peace, at Hope-well Cape, was communicated with as to what action should be taken. The Indian was later quarantined in the car which was left on the siding. Dr. Kirby, who made an examination, considering it was necessary to take such precautions.

CANADIAN PACIFIC STOCK  
IS POPULAR ABROAD

London, Oct. 7.—C. P. R. was very active on the Stock Exchange today, selling up to 199½, to 200 asked, an advance of several points from recent levels.

The address of Sir Thomas Shaughnessy at the annual meeting was well received in London financial circles, as was the authorization to spend \$8,500,000 for irrigation work in Alberta, and to sell sufficient 4 p. c. debenture stock to provide for the construction of various branch lines in the Canadian west.

The decision of the directors to pay the dividends quarterly is considered a good move, while the determination of the management to deal more generously with the stockholders has pleased friends of the big Canadian railway in London. The stock is exceedingly popular both in England and on the Continent, and it is certain to receive well-merited support from all classes of investors.

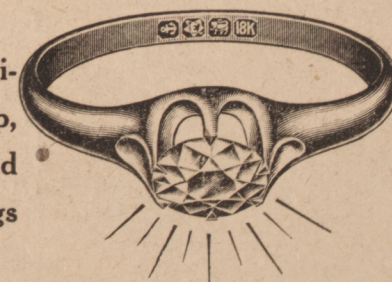
## YOUNG WOMAN AND MOOSE.

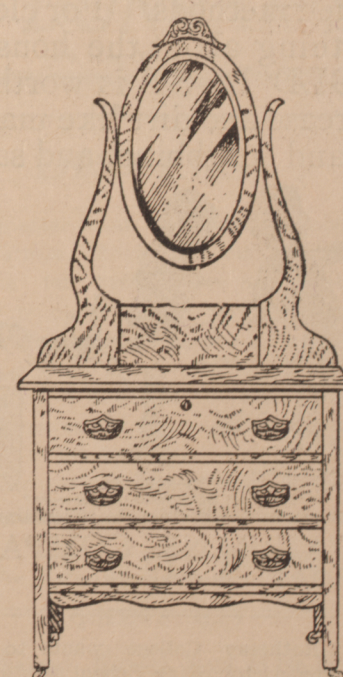
