THE JURY AGAIN

DISAGREED IN CONNOLLY CASE

Hopewell Cape Oct. 7.—The second trial of Thos. Connolly charged with man-slaughter, in causing the death of Jas. A. Powers, which was begun yesterday was finished this afternoon and resulted, as did the first trial, in a disagreement of the jury. The prisoner was let go on his own recognizance in the sum of \$250, to appear when called for.

Proceedings in the case were resumed at 10 a. m. Two witnesses, Connolly himself and Covey Mills being heard for the defence, their evidence closing the case. Practically no new testimony was adduced.

Mr. Fowler for the defence, and Hon. Mr. McLeod, for the crown, occupied about twenty minutes each in their addresses to the jury, the judge's charge taking up little over half an hour.

The jury retired a little before noon, and after being out two hours and a half returned and though Foreman Geo. W. Barber announced a disagreement. In reply to his honor, it was stated there was no possibility of further deliberation changing the situation, and they were accordingly discharged.

As to further proceedings, the solicitor-general said that as there had already been two trials he would only ask that the prisoner be required to enter into his own recognizance to appear if wanted. Mr. Fowler strongly urged that the crown would enter a nolle prosequi, but this the crown officer refused to do, as he believed he had taken the proper and usual course. Connolly left for his home.
