**A CHATHAM OPINION**  
OF ST JOHN'S GREED

(Chatham Commercial)

The directors of the St. John Exhibition Association find themselves with a surplus of some twelve or thirteen thousand dollars after payment of all the expenses attending their recent exhibition. This is a kind of incubus that they have not hitherto had to carry, and apparently the unwonted burden is too much for them to bear, hence they have decided to rid themselves of it as quickly as possible; and as the surest means to that end, they have decided to hold an exhibition again next year rather than wait until 1912, when the Provincial Exhibition will again be held under their auspices. In the case of the exhibition just closed, the association spent in round figures some \$45,000 more than the receipts from the exhibition proper. It had grants from the Dominion and Provincial Governments and the city council, amounting altogether to \$58,000 and yet notwithstanding the very large amount received from entrance fees, and other sources connected with the exhibition, it spent all but about \$12,000. Under these circumstances, what does the association expect to do next year when it will be dependent on its own resources altogether and with no Dominion or Provincial grant? The provincial grant goes to Fredericton next year, and Chatham also has been promised a grant in aid of an exhibition, and no earthly reason that is capable of justification can be put forward why St. John should have a grant out of its turn. Of course, we know that St. John wants the whole earth, but that is no reason why it should have it.
