

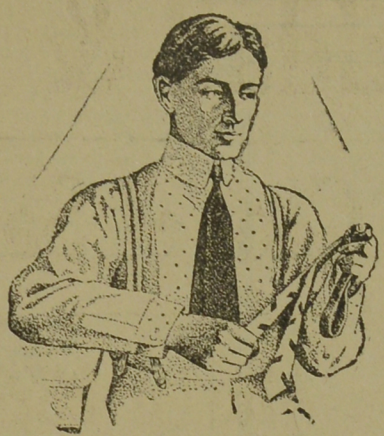

RESIDENTS OF STANLEY MEMORIALIZE GOVERNMENT

Want York and Carleton Railway Extended to Nappadogan Lake---Bond Guarantee of \$12,500 per Mile Hinted at.

A delegation consisting of seventy-three ratepayers from Stanley village waited upon the local government on Tuesday afternoon and asked that the necessary financial assistance be granted to enable the York and Carleton railway to extend its line from Ryan Brook to Nappadogan, where it will tap the transcontinental. Mr. John A. Humble headed the delegation and read a memorial voicing the opinion of the people of Stanley.

Short addresses in support of the memorial were delivered by Messrs. R. Simms, Stanley Douglas and others.

Premier Hazen replied briefly to the memorial and while regretting that it had not been presented earlier in the session, he promised the delegation that it would receive the earnest consideration of the government.

The full text of the memorial is as follows:

Whereas,--A large and representative meeting of the citizens of Stanley and a portion of the Parish of Douglas, in the County of York, have selected the number of gentlemen present to make certain demands of the legislature of New Brunswick,

We, the said delegation, humbly beseech that the legislature of this province consider the interests of the people of the said parishes whose interest is involved with that of the York and Carleton Railway Company and the people of the said parishes earnestly desire that the said company be empowered to extend the York and Carleton Railway to meet the G. T. P. railway now nearing completion at its divisional point on the Nappadogan.

It is in memory of the Hon. Premier and other members of the executive that the people of the Parish of Stanley ten years ago were without railway transportation and remote from the market of the province. About that time it was brought to the attention of the government and a subsidy was granted first by the Dominion government and supplemented by that of the local legislature with the result that a company was formed with Dr. Moore of Stanley as chief promoter, and a line of railway was constructed from Cross Creek Station on the Canada Eastern branch of the I. C. R., up the valley of the Nashwaak river to the village of Stanley, a distance of six miles. The benefit this line is to a large number of people has been enormous, and it has developed industry and trade. Statistics and reports of the Board of Trade of the city of Fredericton state that the amount of business done with the people of Stanley has doubled since the building of this road. Local trade was developed and the amount of agricultural products multiplied, enabling the people of the remote sections to ship large quantities of farm produce and fuel.

Four years ago under favorable aid from both federal and local governments the line was extended to Ryan Brook, four miles further up the Nashwaak river, making in all ten miles from Cross Creek station. A marked increase in the milling industry arose; large quantities of hard wood have been utilized and shipped for manufacturing purposes. There yet remains a distance of about nine miles to the Grand Trunk Pacific at Nappadogan. At that point large interests are involved. The contemplated traffic has caused the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company to prepare twenty-one miles of track in the yards at the Nappadogan. That a mighty commerce will be developed is apparent and we earnestly believe that with the York and Carleton as a connecting branch, much of this traffic will be diverted through Stanley to the city of Fredericton. Moreover the difficulty of the grades on the I. C. R. and the distance of McGivney Junction from the division centre where rolling stock is ever in readiness to handle freight expediently must be considered and we believe that a direct union with this railway centre will be markedly beneficial to the city of Fredericton and the valley of the Nashwaak. Dr. Moore, the owner and promoter of the York and Carleton Railway, is not desirous to further expend capital in the enterprise, hence we must look elsewhere for support. We wish a permanent railway service for these parishes. We earnestly desire that the government of this province come to our aid and introduce legislation before the close of the present session, guaranteeing the bonds of the York and Carleton railway, not to exceed one half the amount, per mile, to be granted to the St. John Valley Railway Co. That this is in the interest of a larger number of people of the county of York. It has been stated and it is moreover affirmed, there is no personal interest in the same, and that the government may accede to these demands at the present session, so that this important work can be commenced without delay, is the earnest desire of this delegation here assembled and as in duty bound, will ever pray.

YORK LOAN CO. GETS \$100,000.

One hundred thousand dollars was added to the credit of the shareholders in the defunct York Loan Co., through the sale of real estate last week by the liquidators. The land sold is located principally between Indian road and High Park, and the prices paid ranged from \$35 to \$50 per foot frontage.

The company held extensive land interests in that section of the city, and the rush for property there has had the effect of raising the prices.

A MONSTER MELON.

Pullman Car stockholders have approved an increase of \$20,000,000 in stock, to be distributed as a dividend to stockholders at the rate of one new share for every five.

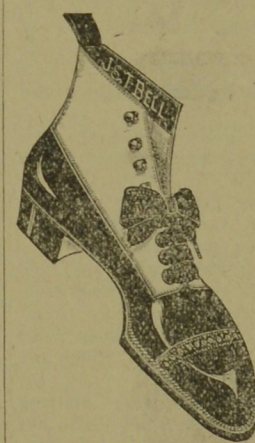
