Bellows Falls, Vt., Oct. 12.—Hetty Green, one of America's richest women, with an income of \$16,000 a day, waited five hours the other afternoon on the rickety steps of her former home here, while workmen removed several old crumbling stone posts from the wall in front of the house.

"I'm so tired I wish I could go and lie down, but I couldn't rest if I did until I knew these posts had been hauled into the woodshed and I had turned the key on them," she said to a woman reporter.

Mrs. Green is not as reticent as most women about telling her age, for she freely divulged that secret sacred to every woman's heart.

"I am seventy-nine years old," she said, "and I get tired more quickly than I used to, and I'm growing to look so old that I'm ashamed to have my picture in the newspaper."

"To look at me now you would scarcely believe that I was a handsome woman once," she continued. "I had the most beautiful long eyelashes and my hair was a golden brown and so long that I could sit on it. My nostrils were thin and my cheeks so pink and pretty. Just you feel how soft my flesh is," and Mrs. Green rolled up the sleeve of her dingy black waist.

"Twenty thousand people came to look at me when I used to go to Saratoga. President VanBuren, of the United States, Lord this and Lady that," and Mrs. Green rattled off many names, "used to entertain me. ## TURKEY FAMINE IS PREDICTED IN CANADA

Ottawa, Oct. 24.—With the approach of the Thanksgiving Day dinner a statement made today by the Dominion Biologist, Dr. Charles Higgins of the Department of Agriculture, relative to the cause of the first turkey famine in Canada, is of especial interest. Dr. Higgins accounts for the soaring prices for the festive bird by the fact that a parasitic disease, commonly known as blackhead, is responsible for an alarming turkey mortality in all the Provinces. The disease is manifested by a black appearance of the comb, and is due to parasitic affection of the digestive organs. Unless stringent measures are taken at once to combat the disease intelligently, says Dr. Higgins, the supply in all parts of Canada will be still further seriously depleted.

A remedy suggested is to starve the bird for forty-eight hours and then let it drink from a mixture composed of a teaspoonful of muriatic acid to a quart of water.

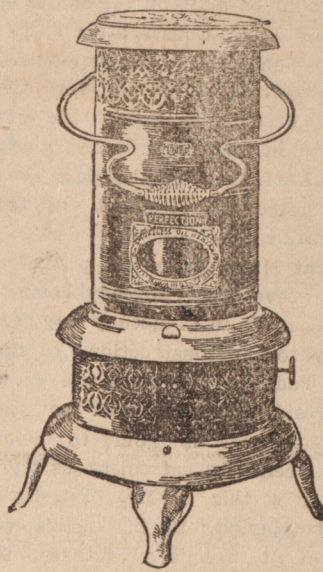

## NEW WHITE STAR LINER LARGEST SHIP AFLOAT

Belfast, Oct. 20.—The White Star line's new steamer 'Olympic' was launched here successfully today, thousands of people watching the monster hull glide swiftly down the ways.

The Countess of Aberdeen christened the boat.

The launching weight, 27,000 tons was the largest ever transferred from land to water, but such was the excellence of the builders, Messrs Harland & Wolff's arrangements, that this operation always a matter of anxiety was carried out without mishap.

The 'Olympic's' tonnage is 45,000 gross register, and 60,000 tons displacement.

The arrangements in connection with the launch of a ship do not end with the release of the vessel, so that she may slide into the water. Provision must be made for checking the way on the vessel when she is in the water and in the case of the 'Olympic' the following means were adopted. In the bed of the river were placed three heavy anchors on each side of the ship, each anchor being connected by a 7-inch steel-wire hawser to eye-plates riveted to the shell plating. There were also placed in the bed of the river two piles of cable drags, each weighing over 80 tons, connected in a similar manner with an 8-inch hawser. These were all arranged so that when the vessel was clear the end of the slip she was brought to a standstill. So effective were these arrangements that from the time the 'Olympic' was released till she was stationary in the water only two minutes elapsed.

The 'Olympic' is now the largest steamer in existence, exceeding by nearly one hundred feet and 13,000 tons any other ship afloat. Her principal dimensions are:

The gigantic measurements of this vessel are best appreciated when it is known that in length the 'Olympic' overtops the Metropolitan Tower in New York by 182 feet, is twice as long as the height of the dome of St. Peter's at Rome, and equal in length the total drop of the Yosemite Valley. Indeed, if the 'Olympic' and her sister vessel 'Titanic' soon to be launched were placed end to end under the Brooklyn Bridge they would completely block the East River and extend over the shore one hundred feet on each side. It is also interesting to note that the length of each of these ships is four times the height of Bunker Hill monument.

In each ship three million steel rivets, weighing in all 1,200 tons have been employed to find the massive steel plates insuring the greatest stability; and the rudder of each vessel weighs 100 tons, yet will be moved by electricity almost as lightly as a feather.

The machinery decided upon for the 'Olympic' and her sister ship 'Titanic' is the combination of reciprocating engines, with a low pressure turbine so successfully adopted in the Laurentic, of the Canadian service, this arrangement having proved the most satisfactory from an engineering point of view, and as the same time most beneficial to passengers, eliminating vibration and thus securing the utmost comfort.

These monsters of the deep will each accommodate 2,500 passengers, carrying a crew of 860 and because of the enormous size of the ships the accommodations both as regards the several public apartments and the passenger staterooms, will be exceptionally spacious, while the beauty and luxury of the appointments will surpass anything hitherto attempted. Special attractions such as Turkish and electric bath establishments, swimming pools, sun parlors, sports decks, and palm courts, will be provided in addition to restaurants, dining saloons, lounges, smoking apartments, elevators, etc., all of which will add much to the pleasure of the voyage on these marvels of marine achievement.

Messrs Harland & Wolff Ltd., the well-known firm of Belfast shipbuilders, are responsible for the construction of both vessels.

The 'Olympic' will join the White Star line's mail service between New York, Plymouth, Cherbourg and Southampton next summer, followed by the 'Titanic' in the early fall.
