HILLIARD LAING FOUGHT LAVIN TO STANDSTILL

Canadian Amateur Champion Broke into Pro. Ranks in Most Auspicious Manner--Gave Away Weight.

Buffalo, June 16.--Giving away at least 10 pounds in weight, Hilliard Laing, the Canadian amateur champion, gave Paddy Lavin, a Buffalo welterweight, the battle of his life tonight and at the end of 10 of the fastest rounds seen in this section of the country, the professional had to be content with a draw.

Laing, who is a replica of Kid Lavigne, arried the fight to Lavin at every stage of the battle, and at times actually had Lavin backing up. Lavin's greater ring experience showed in the pinches and in the infighting and exchanges of swings.

The first three rounds were slambang, with no advantage to either, but Laing's aggressiveness and his forcing of the bigger man made him the favorite of the crowd. The fourth was Lavin's best round. He got Lavin with a smashing right hander as they came into a clinch and Lavin noticeably slowed down.

In the fifth and sixth the going was fast, but Lavin's cleverness and his long left earned him a shade. Laing's worst round was the seventh, when Lavin got to him with several smashing uppercuts.

The ninth and tenth were vicious rounds, Laing continually boring in, while Lavin's straight arm punches and right counters landed often.

Laing was a revelation to the big crowd. The little Canadian, fighting his first professional engagement, picked out a man that has been moving 'em down in this vicinity, and despite all of Lavin's tricks, gave as good as he received.

In the afternoon Laing weighed in at 147 pounds, while Lavin refused to weigh and Laing claimed forfeit.

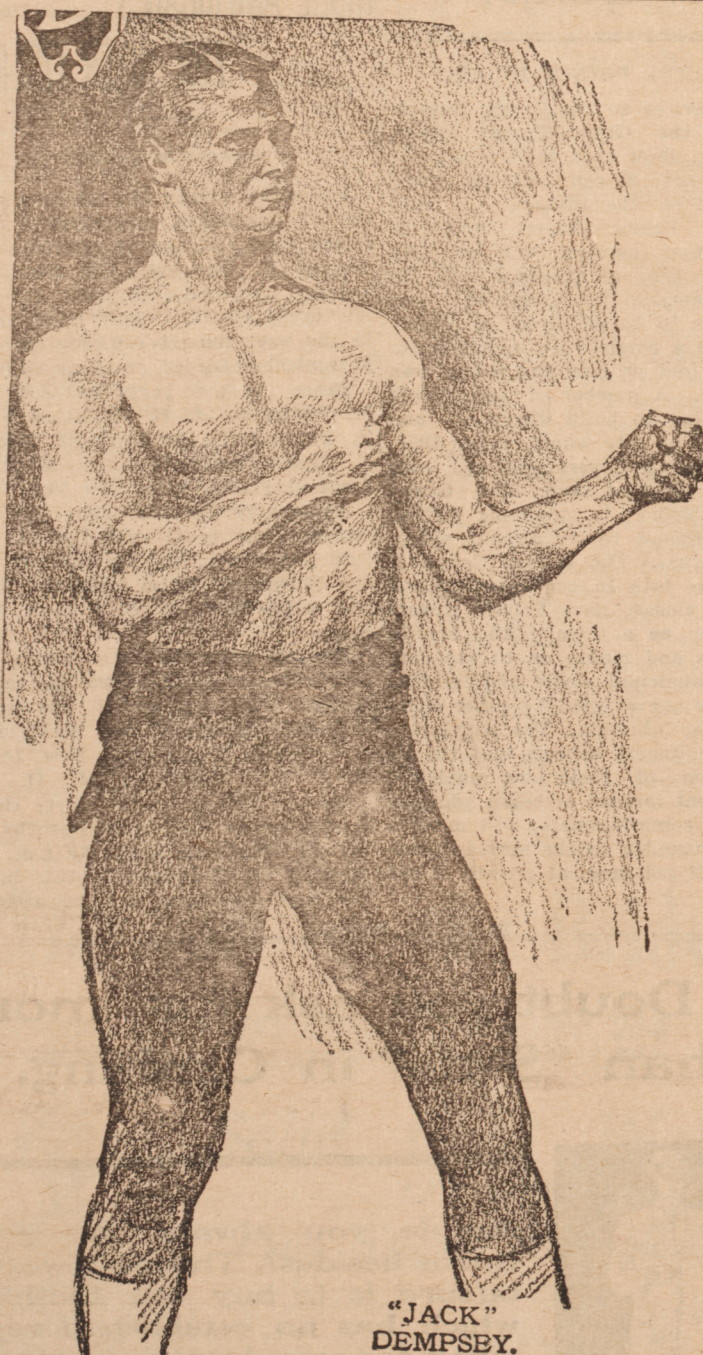

Fighters of the Past

Jack Dempsey the Non-Pareil was born in County Kildare, Ireland, in 1862 and died in Portland, Oregon in 1895. During his active career in the ring which began early in 1883 and ended with a bout against Tommy Ryan at Coney Island. A few months before his death Non-Pareil whose real name was John Kelly, met the best boxers of the time. His last public appearance was at his benefit in New York on June 8th, 1895.

Dempsey was not beaten until 1889 when George LaBlanche, whom he had beaten three years before, knocked him out. On January 14th, 1891 Bob Fitzsimmons, who had come from Australia the year before knocked him out in the thirteenth round at New Orleans. The second fight with LaBlanche at San Francisco had gone thirty-two rounds.

Dempsey's weight was 150 pounds and in his prime was the best in the world at that figure.

NEW BASEBALL IS NOT SATISFACTORY

Will Not Last and Has Tendency to Become Lopsided--Cork Centre is Blamed.

New York, June 17--The ball at present being used in the big leagues will not do. It appears as though we'll have to go back to the one with the rubber foundation with the tightly rolled worsted between it and the horseshoe cover.

Why a ball with a cork foundation should ever have been substituted is hard to explain, unless it be that the present retail price does not net the manufacturer enough profit. Be that as it may, the fact remains unaltered that this ball will not do.

The foundation of the ball now being used is a thing about the size of a golf ball and apparently made of rubber, but when this is cut open the rubber is little more than a quarter of an inch in thickness and the inside is all cork. The rest of the composition of the ball is the same as before.

A thorough trial has been accorded this latest production in the line of baseballs, and it is the general verdict of players and managers that the durability of the new ball is less by one-half of that of the old.

Such being the case, it is very evident that the purchasers of large quantities of balls, namely, the owners of big league clubs, will demand the return of the former ball.

In speaking of the new ball, Captain Hal Chase of the Yankees said:

"It is not at all satisfactory. It has a tendency to become lopsided after it has been hit hard several times, and necessitates the throwing in of new balls from time to time. The pitchers have it hard enough with new balls as it is, without having this additional feature to tend to make hard or their task."

Just why this should be, Chase could not state.

Manager Hugh Duffy of the White Sox, had practically the same thing to say. He stated that the complaint of lopsidedness appeared to be a general one.

TO PLAY LACROSSE FOR \$125 PER GAME

Montreal, June 17--With contracts for \$125 and \$100 per game in their pockets, and with the promise of good permanent positions, Jimmy Hogan and Alex. O'Reilly, of the Shamrocks, left for the coast yesterday morning, and will play for Vancouver lacrosse team for the balance of the season. O'Reilly is to play in the net for Con Jones. Jimmy Hogan will return to Montreal at the end of the season, but O'Reilly may remain on the Coast.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter-section available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district in which he desires to be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties--Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties--Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties--Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.
