The Montreal team, formed of New Brunswickers, will get down to practice immediately. The provincial team will not be included in the Montreal City League, but will play matches with other Upper Canadian teams. Donnelly of this city and other McGill students are members of the team.

The Eastern League opened yesterday and Mr. Page thinks that prospects are good.

NEW CLOSED HOCKEY

RINK FOR MCGILL

It is very likely that in a short time Montreal will have another hockey rink. This rink, however, will not be a public rink, but built for the benefit of the McGill students.

There is much talk about the building of this rink at the McGill University, and it is proposed that it should be built between the old and new medical buildings. It is to be built on the same plan as the Montreal Arena, but will have a seating capacity of only about 2,000. The rink will be devoted to the use of Intercollegiate games and the Inter-Class games. The authorities who are looking after the interests of the students in regard to the building of this new rink realize that the present outdoor rink is too inefficient, and think that a closed-in rink would save a lot of expense and would give the players more time for practice. The rink will not be a costly affair, but will probably be built of brick. The need of a closed-in rink has been felt by the students for some time and if the plan goes through the interest in hockey will surely increase among them.

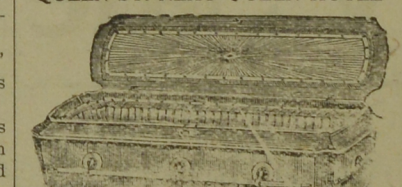
