AMERICA ONLY SHARES WITH BRITAIN FISHING RIGHTS IN ATLANTIC

Reply to U.S. Argument--Sir William Robson. for Great Britain, Calls American Claims 'Incompatible.'

The Hague, July 27.—Sir William Robson in dealing with the American essertion before the Fisheries Tribunal today that the treaty of 1818 accorded them sovereignty in British territorial waters, maintained that the historic arguments put forward by Americans in support of this con- ARRIVES MONTREAL18.30 tention was incompatible with their claim that the treaty accorded them

international "servitude." He proceeded to argue that if the United States had the right to decide whether the legislation of British colonies concerning fisheries were reasonable the Arbitration Tribunal could never examine whether the United States had refused rightly or wrongly recognize such legislation. He opposed the American view that such laws were unnecessary for the protection of the fisheries and the preservation of the fish.

He argued that before 1783 fisher men in the British colonies, which formed the United States up to 1785, were everywhere subjected to the laws SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHand regulations regarding fishing. The treaty "accorded" to Americans the same right as they had formerly to come to fish subject to local regula tions. That right had not been increased by their independence and in the course of the negotiations for the treaty of 1818 the United States had recognized that Great Britain had exclusive jurisdiction in these waters. In the treaty the United States had not been given a share in the fisheries as a co-proprietor with Great Britain, but only the "liberty and permission to fish in common.'
