MARYSVILLE FESTIVAL
REALIZED \$300
FOR CAMPBELLTON

In Spite of Threatening Weather Attendance was Large--Special Train was Crowded.

The sum of three hundred dollars was realized at the festival held at Marysville last night for the benefit of the fire-stricken town of Campbellton. The gross receipts amounted to \$354.00 and expenses to \$54.00.

About eight hundred persons attended the festival and the attendance would have been much greater had the weather not threatened rain. The attendance of Fredericton people was large, the free special train on the I. C. R. being well patronized. Five cars crowded with people, left the local station at 7.30 p. m. The 71st Regt. Band, Fredericton Brass Band and Fowler Company, Uniform Rank, K. of P., attended the festival. Both bands furnished music as did also the Marysville Band, which played the Marysville Odeffellows from their hall to Base Ball Hill.

At the festival the usual games were in evidence.

Ladies' bean toss was won by Miss Bird of Fredericton, the prize being a pair of vases. The Gate prize donated by Mr. Fred Williams, of Marysville, was won by ticket No. 156, bearing a handsome lamp.

The handsome rattan rocker, given by Mr. Howard Rogers, Fredericton, was won by Mr. Sweeney, of Durham. The chance at the clock was won by D. Farrer.

Refreshments were for sale, such as ice-cream, beer, home-made candy and cakes, the latter being auctioned and bringing quite a large sum.

AMERICAN COLONY
SPENDING SUMMER
AT DAVIDSON LAKE

That Beautiful Spot Increasing in Popularity --- Twenty Three Persons Rusticating There this Season.

Prof. Phillip Mittell and family, of New York, have been rusticating at Davidson Lake since early in June, and will remain until the middle of September. They own a number of neat and commodious summer cottages on the lake shore, which they purchased last year from Mr. John N. Murray. They have a number of New York friends visiting them, and the party at the present time numbers twenty-three. Mrs. Mittell was in the city several days this week, doing some shopping. Talking to a Mail representative, she said she was convinced that Davidson Lake was one of the most restful and charming spots in America. She went on to say that she had first heard of New Brunswick through the Fredericton Tourist Association and for seven years past Davidson Lake has been the summer home of herself and family. A number of young people are spending the summer with them at the lake and are having the time of their lives.

They have boating, bathing and fishing, and recently they have established a tennis court which is only ten minutes walk from the camps.

Mrs. Mittell went on to say that they had no difficulty in obtaining supplies. They purchase their groceries in Fredericton, and the farmers living in the neighborhood supply them with produce. Their first order for groceries amounted to \$160, and while in the city this week, Mrs. Mittell had it repeated.

Prof. Mittell, who is a native of Germany, has long been recognized as one of the leading violinists of the United States. He fills a position on the staff of Princeton University, and he also has a number of private pupils. Professor and Mrs. Mittell have made many warm friends in Fredericton, who always extend to them a most cordial welcome.

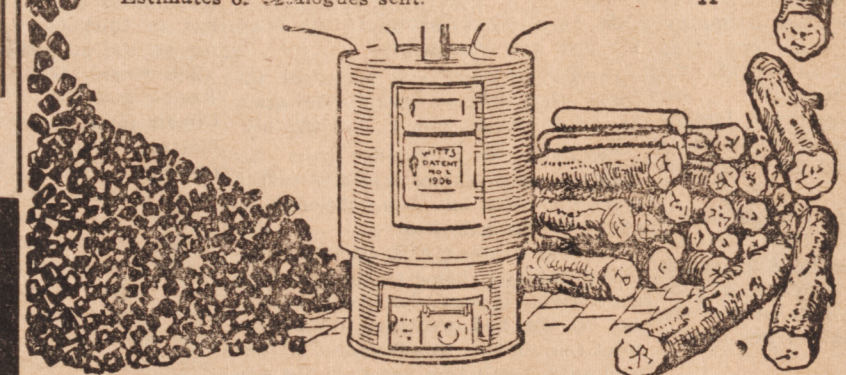
