INFRINGEMENT BUILDING LAW.

Within certain limits wooden buildings cannot be built higher than thirty-five feet. The Building Inspector, the City Clerk and Contractor Barker had a conference on the matter this afternoon and it is possible that a way out of the difficulty will be found.

A meeting of the local branch of the British and Foreign Bible Society was held yesterday in the office of the Board of School Trustees. Mr. J. W. Spurden, the president, occupied the chair, and considerable business of the local work was transacted. The other members of the committee present were Mrs. A. F. Randolph, the esteemed vice-president, Rev. J. J. Colter, Rev. W. H. Smith, Dr. Jones, Mr. Wm. Lamont and Mr. C. A. Sampson. It was decided to hold Bible Sunday this year on the 16th of October, when it is hoped Rev. Dr. Campbell will be able to spend the day in Fredericton. Arrangements will be made to hold a mass meeting in the Opera House at the close of the church service on that day.

ALDERMEN WANT
PEDDLING OF PRODUCE
ON STREETS STOPPED

Enforcement of All Market Regulations Asked For—Necessity for Modern Building Recognized.

The city council at its special meeting last night discussed the market regulations, particularly that having to do with the peddling of produce about the streets. It was pointed out that the city could not enforce the market regulations to the letter unless better accommodations were provided for the farmers and others who bring produce to the city for sale. The necessity for a modern market building was also urged.

Ald. Jewett brought the matter up. He remarked that as the Police Commission had decided to enforce the by-law against forestalling it was only right that the by-law against the peddling of produce from house to house should be enforced also. It was unfair to retailers of the city that country people be permitted to compete with them by such methods. Frequently people in the residential sections paid more than market price for produce brought to their doors.

Ald. Calder said that the time was ripe for the city to establish a modern market and compel all the country people to sell their produce there but pay tolls for the privilege. Other cities had successfully adopted that method.

It was remarked that the present market accommodation was limited and that on some market-days farmers' wagons were placed on the streets and tended to block traffic. The land at the rear of the City Hall was mentioned as the most suitable site for a market and would be available if the front were wharfed up.

LUMBER-CUT ON
SOUTHWEST MIRAMICHI
WILL BE LIGHT

Michael Welsh and Lynch Co. Will Operate on North Branch, Miramichi Co. on Railway Land.

Mr. Michael Welsh, the well-known Miramichi lumberman, who was in the city this week, says that operations on the Southwest Miramichi will be considerably curtailed. Mr. Welsh and the Lynch Company will operate on the North Branch and it is understood that the Miramichi Lumber Company will cut logs from the lands of the New Brunswick Railway Company burned over two years ago.

Mr. Welsh says that when the Transcontinental Railway is completed and in operation, it will mean a considerable saving to lumber operators on the Southwest Miramichi and tributaries, in the matter of getting men and supplies into the woods. At present Mr. Welsh totes his supplies in from Bristol, but when the railway is completed he will send them by rail to a point within a few miles of his camps. Most of his men for logging and stream-driving are hired in Northumberland County and are sent to the camps by way of Fredericton and Bristol, the trip consuming the best part of three days. When the new railway is completed, it will be an easy matter for them to leave home in the morning and be in camp the same afternoon and evening. This will mean a substantial saving in time as well as in the cost of transportation.
