

Reno, Nev., June 10.—Allegations that her husband had beaten and abused her are included in the sensational charges made against him by Mrs. Margaret Emerson McKim, who has instituted divorce proceedings in the court here. The complaint which was filed a month ago, was sealed until this time, when the summons was returned. The case, it is expected, will be heard before the end of the week.

Married at Baltimore on December 30, 1902, according to the complaint

the defendant contracted the drinking habit in June, 1903 to such a degree that he was unable to attend to his professional duties as a physician. The plaintiff sets forth, therefore, that she was compelled to support him. The liquor habit got such a hold on him, it is charged, that he was unable to hold several positions which Colonel Emerson, father of the plaintiff, obtained for him, and Colonel Emerson finally told the physician that unless he improved he would be compelled to take his wife away from him.

THE RUSSIAN PREMIER MAKES OFFICIAL STATEMENT AS TO JEWISH EXPULSION

St. Petersburg, June 14.—The Russia Prints today an official statement by premier Stolypin in his capacity as minister of the interior regarding the Jewish expulsions and in which the premier minimizes the extent of the government's campaign.

According to the ministers, the Hebrews in Kiev who were subjected to expulsion number 446. The government is disposed to relax the rigor of the law so far as it is practical to the advantage of Jews who were well established in business, this policy has been carried put in the Caucasus. The statement sets forth that the minister of the interior has set instructions to the provincial authorities to permit Hebrews to reside at summer resorts and in their villas in suburban village localities, where, though a strict interpretation of the intent of the law, they would be entitled to residence. The statement deals at length with the expulsion of school children from Moscow and explains that professional woman enjoying a right of residence outside the pale, may not confer the same privileges upon their children. Accordingly four midwives at Moscow were obliged to send the children to the husbands living within the pale, that is, that section of the Polish provinces and the Ukraine within which the residence of Jews is restricted by the original Jewish segregation law. The minister of the interior made an exception in the case of one midwife, who had been divorced, permitting her to keep her child with her.

BRITISH STEAMER STRANDED ON VIRGINIAN COAST

Norfolk, Va., June 14.—The British steamer "Dundonian" from Cuba to ore, stranded on the Virginian coast Baltimore with a full cargo of iron ore, on the Virginian coast last night two and a half miles south of Cape Henry during a dense fog wrecking tugs alongside. Her position today is well in toward shore, but it is thought that with the assistance now at hand the vessel can be floated. It may be necessary to discharge her cargo before she can be moved into deeper water.

The Dundonian's crew remains aboard though Cape Henry life savers, as well as the Virginian pilot boat relief have offered to take them off. The Dundonian is a large British tramp that has been trading for some time between American and East Indian ports. She has frequently carried coal from Virginia to Panama for the canal building work.

TORONTO TELEGRAM GETS CALLED DOWN

Its Attitude on the Canadian Navy Question
More Unpatriotic Than that of the
Vicious Mail and Empire.

(Vancouver Sunset)

The Toronto Telegram has out-mailed the turgid Mail and Empire in the invective it has hurled at the Canadian Navy Bill. It has outrun the Mail and Empire in discoveries of treason, plots and anti-British motives of those who prefer a Canadian built and manned Navy to a declaration of incompetence and incapacity of the Canadian people to formulate a policy that is at once Canadian and British. No Canadian newspaper except the Mail and Empire, has done more to befool the Canadian nest than the Jeremiah of the Toronto Telegram. In its bigotry and fanaticism no other newspaper so persistently appeals to the lower strata of National opinion by impugning the loyalty of the French-Canadians, as does the Toronto Telegram. No other paper so industriously sows the seeds of class, race and creed contention, strife, bitterness, suspicion and hatred as does the didactic pump-gun artist of the Toronto Telegram. No other Canadian paper has been more un-Canadian, and therefore un-British, in all its discussions touching the subject of National defence than the didactic pump-gun artist of the Toronto Telegram. Any Canadian who dares to hold an opinion contrary to the pope of Toronto Telegram is forthwith excommunicated and denounced as a traitor or un-British. This has happened to everyone from the Prime Minister of Canada down to the humble editor of this growing weekly.

TRANSCONTINENTAL CONSTRUCTION MAKING RAPID STRIDES

Ottawa, June 14.—The annual report of the National Transcontinental Railway Commission covering the work of the last fiscal year shows that sixty-three per cent. of the grading on the whole line from Moncton to Winnipeg is now finished and 45 per cent. of the bridging.

During the year 521 miles of track were laid, the total track mileage on March 31 totalling 760 with an additional 165 miles of sidings.

At the present date steel is laid on about half of the whole distance from Moncton to Winnipeg. Construction work is being vigorously pushed this summer on every section of the line and it is expected that the road will be ready for through traffic in Aug. or Sept. of 1912.

The line from Winnipeg to Port William will be opened for regular traffic next August.

The total expenditure on the road up to the end of the fiscal year was \$71,137,993.

LEGISLATORS VISIT ALBERT OIL FIELDS

Moncton, N. B., June 14.—Members of the provincial government, members of the legislature and others, to the number of about sixty-five, paid a visit today to the oil and gas wells in Albert County. The visitors were taken on the trip in autos, leaving here this morning and returning to the city this afternoon. The members of the government in the party were Premier Hazen, Surveyor General Grimmer, Hon. John Morrissey, Hon. Dr. Landry, Hon. Robt. Maxwell. The members of the legislature included A. R. Slipp, J. A. Murray, W. B. Dickson, Hon. C. W. Robinson, Hon. F. J. Sweeney. Included in the party were F. W. Sumner, O. M. Melanson, F. B. Black, P. G. Mahoney, Mayor Reilly, Ald. Jones and many leading citizens.

The party was shown about the wells and given demonstrations of natural gas huring the afternoon. The visitors were entertained at dinner on the lawn at the company's boarding house at the wells, after which speeches were made by Premier Hazen, Messrs. Grimmer, Maxwell, Landry, Morrissey, Hon. Robinson and Sweeney; F. W. Sumner, M. Lohge, O. P. Boggs, J. A. Murray and several others.

The development of the natural resources of the province was the theme of the speakers, and the members of the government expressed thanks for the invitation to visit the wells, and votes of thanks were extended to F. W. Sumner and others who arranged the trip.

WEALTHY NEW YORKER BUILDS FINE CAMP ON THE MIRAMICHI

Chatham, June 14.—George D. Pratt of New York, the millionaire oil man is building a handsome and elaborately appointed camp at Holmes Lake. The camp is situated near the southwest branch of the Miramichi, and is so sequestered a spot that a drive of forty miles is necessary to reach it. Mr. Pratt desires solitude and nearness to nature and he has found it in the location of his camp, the couduroy road to which leads through the virgin forests in sections little known save to the lumber cruiser, the hunter and the Indian. The camp is built on the log cabin plan, the bark being left on the logs and turned outward and the logs being "chinked" with moss after the fashion of the squatter of 100 years ago. The edifice is one story, but it covers an immense scope of ground, being 200 feet long and about 35 feet wide. Two huge old-fashioned fireplaces are provided, each about seven feet high and built to take a stick eight feet long. Although the camp is built according to a primitive plan, there are many modern conveniences, including five bath rooms and complete electrical apparatus for lighting and other purposes. Mr. Pratt is expected to occupy the camp about the 28th of the present month.

ALIEN LABORERS MUST PAY \$200 HEAD TAX

Washington, June 14.—Canadian authorities on the northwestern boundary, are rigidly enforcing a regulation requiring alien laborers with the exceptions of Americans, applying for admission to that country, to have \$200 in cash. The result has been as shown by receipts received here, that the majority of railroad laborers and those needed on large contract work who heretofore have flocked from Seattle, practically have been shut out. Some of the American railroad builders in Alaska have been enforcing a rule that only white men can work for them all nationalities have been excluded except laborers from northern Europe, America, Australia and New Zealand.
