### ST. JOHN SUN GOES OUT OF EXISTENCE

Readers of the St. John Sun saw the final issue of that journal today. The Telegraph Company, which has bought the goodwill of the paper, will not publish it after this week.

Thus disappears a journal which, for nearly thirty-two years, has been one of the institutions of St. John and the province. Today's issue bore its number volume 34, number 61, indicating that the paper was established at the beginning of January, 1877. A statistical mistake has occurred somewhere. The Sun was established about the middle of the year 1878. It is therefore not quite thirty-two years old.

That was the last year of the Mackenzie regime. Sir Leonard Tilley was lieutenant governor of the province when the paper was established, but he was about to refuse a second term and resume the leadership of his party in the first national party contest.

Among those who were active in the establishment of the paper were Mr. S. P. Tuck, brother of the retired Chief Justice, the late Mr. Stephen King, afterward Post Office Inspector, the late Hon. T. R. Jones and Mr. W. H. Thorne, whose business connection with the paper continued to 1906.

It was expected that the late Dr. James Hannay would be the first editor, but at the last moment he decided to remain with the Telegraph. Mr. J. L. Stewart was the first editor in charge and shortly after the late Mr. John Livingstone became the editorial writer. Mr. Livingstone remained through one parliamentary term, and after the election of 1882, became editor of the Montreal Herald. The late Mr. R. A. Payne then became managing editor, with Professor George E. Foster as editorial writer. Mr. Foster was elected to the House of Commons that year.

In 1885, Mr. Foster became a minister, and Mr. S. D. Scott, who had been editor of the Halifax Herald, became editor of the Sun, Mr. Payne remaining in charge of the news staff. A few years later Col. Markham joined the staff as managing director and business manager. In these days Mr. W. H. Thorne was president of the company.

About the close of 1905, Hon. B. F. Pearson purchased the newspaper property. The transfer took place at the beginning of 1906. Mr. Scott resigned the position of editor two months later, soon afterward the Sun became a supporter of the Laurier government, under the editorial management of Mr. C. F. Crandall, who has recently been business manager also.

Negotiations for the purchase of the Sun by those controlling the Telegraph were begun in 1908 and consummated a short time ago.

The Telegraph today announced that the Sun, Star and News had been amalgamated with the corresponding papers published by the Telegraph Publishing Company.

### FAKED A PRESS STORY GOT SIX WEEKS JAIL

London, March 12.—In the Old Bailey court here, Frederick Horner was convicted of having forged a telegram sent to the Daily Mail during the recent campaign and was sentenced to six weeks' imprisonment.

The despatch received by The Mail over the name of its Falmouth correspondent told of a hostile demonstration against David Lloyd George. The latter impugned the accuracy of the report and an inquiry showed that it had been sent by Horner, who had formerly brought a libel suit against The Mail.

### GIBBS WON FROM O'CONNELL

Memphis, Tenn., March 12.—By forcing the fight for the last three rounds, after he had been out-boxed in the first five, Willie Gibbs, the Philadelphia lightweight, gained the referee's decision over Jeff O'Connell at the Memphis Athletic Club last night. O'Connell's ear was torn and his mouth badly swollen as a result of Gibbs punishment.

### ST. STEPHEN BANK AFFAIRS

St. Stephen, March 11.—There seems to be a slightly better feeling in the air now in regards to the affairs of the St. Stephen Bank. No more failures have occurred among the merchants and it is reported that the bank's affairs are not in so bad a state as at first believed.

Today the bank has been paying back money deposited last Saturday. This and the fact that the other banks are showing a disposition to do what they can to improve conditions here is probably responsible in a considerable degree for the somewhat changing feeling.

### FAVOR STORAGE DAMS.

Bangor, Me., March 12.—Before the International Waterways Commission which sat here on Thursday and Friday several engineers gave evidence favorable to the construction of storage dams on the waters of the upper St. John.

### ENGINEER FOSS BACK FROM INSPECTION

Work on the National Transcontinental Railway in the neighborhood of McGivney, has been suspended for the balance of the month, it is expected that it will be resumed shortly after April 1st. The Toronto Construction Company, which has the contract on the line near McGivney, has discharged about three hundred men within the past few weeks. Some of the men are still at McGivney, but the majority have left for Montreal and other cities. The men were almost all foreigners.

At the present time steel is almost continuous from McGivney to Chipman. The short distance that remains to be covered will need a considerable amount of trestle work, but it is expected that steel will be laid by July 1st. Toward the Tobique section about thirty miles of track is yet to be laid. There are several rock cuts to be made and work will not be completed until well into the autumn. At Nappodogan, which is to be a divisional point little work has been done as yet.

C. O. Foss, district engineer, passed through the city yesterday on his way to St. John after an inspection trip of two days.

London, March 12.—A dam, confining the water from a disused colliery in Rhondda Valley, Wales, burst yesterday afternoon. The torrent swept without warning on the village of Blaenclydach below, wrecking some of the houses and swamping others. About half a dozen persons are known to have been drowned and several others are missing.
