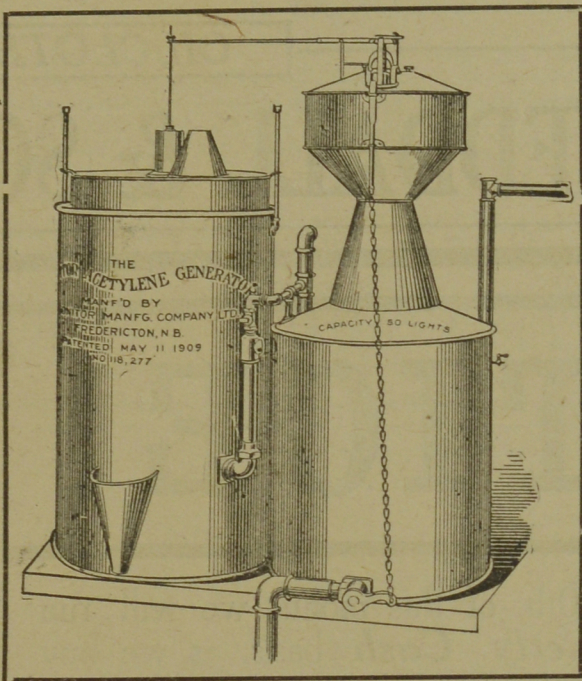

**MAXWELL & MITCHELL SUIT SETTLED; CITY PAYS**

**Council Last Night Ordered Plans for New Central Fire Station—Bread By-law Amended—Assessment Fixed at \$78,000—Chapman Must Turn in Clothing and Equipment.**

As was expected the City Council in regular session last night confirmed the decision arrived at in committee and placed assessment for 1910 at \$78,000. The council also passed the monthly accounts with the provision that Ex-Policeman Chapman's pay be withheld until he returns certain articles of clothing and equipment belonging to the city which are now in his possession. The aldermen also on the petition of Mr. Hugh O'Neil altered the by-law relating to the weight of bakers' bread so as to permit of the sale of loaves weighing half a pound, a pound, a pound and a half and two pounds. Under the amended by-law each loaf is to be plainly stamped with the name or initials of the maker and the weight of the loaf. The Maxwell & Mitchell suit was settled, a cheque for \$1344.42, being ordered to issue in favor of the contractors and in full for all claims against the city. It was also decided to have plans and specifications for a new central fire station prepared. All the aldermen were present last night.

**CHAPMAN'S PAY WITHHELD.**

Ald. Clark moved that the pay due Ex-Policeman Chapman be withheld until he should turn in the police clothing and equipment now in possession.

Ald. Hooper remarked that Ex Chief Winter had neglected to turn in clothing and equipment when he left the force in 1909. He thought the Police Commission might take steps to recover the clothing.

Ald. Clark said that he had no knowledge of the matter referred to by Ald. Hooper. Ex-Policemen Wright had turned in his equipment and and so had Policeman Foss on leaving the force. He did not think it would be necessary for the ordinary clothing to be returned but the overcoat was of value.

**MUNICIPALITY HOME.**

Ald. Jewett presented the report of the Municipality Home Committee. He reported a balance of \$57.01, on hand and recommended that a cheque for \$200 be issued in favor of Commissioner R. H. Boone. The report was adopted.

**TAX COLLECTIONS.**

Ald. Weddall reported on tax collection during March 1910 comparing the figures with the corresponding figures for 1909. They were as follows:—

The report was received.

**ASSESSMENT.**

On the motion of Ald. Weddall the council proceeded to the assessment for the year. Ald. Weddall presented the assessment the items of which have been published previously. Fixed charges amount to \$35,429 and estimates to \$425.71 making a total of \$78,000.

On motion all items were passed.

**NEW CENTRAL FIRE STATION.**

Reports of standing committees being declared in order, Ald. Walker on behalf of the Fire committee stated that it was time the city made a move toward building a new central fire-station. The building now in use was almost a total wreck. It would be useless to put repairs upon it. He moved that the Fire Committee be instructed to have prepared plans,

specifications and estimates for a new central fire station.

Ald. Clark moved that a thermometer be purchased for the Council Chamber and the janitor instructed to keep the room at a reasonable temperature. It was altogether too hot.

His Worship—"I understand it has been a good deal hotter here." (Laughter.)

**ALD. MITCHELL EXPLAINS.**

Ald. Mitchell explained that the increase in assessment for roads and streets had been made to meet the large overdraft from last year. The Public Works Department had to meet an overdraft of \$2128. It was not the intention to lay any surface sewers during the year but spent in deepening the drain at the back of the city in order to prevent flooding in that section. These two items made a large increase in the estimates necessary.

Ald. Walker, speaking to his motion said that if the lot on which the present central fire station stands could not be used on account of lack of room, a lot of sufficient size in that neighborhood should be procured.

Ald. Mitchell and His Worship both spoke in favor of the motion of Ald. Walker which was passed.

**MAXWELL & MITCHELL SUIT.**

Ald. Mitchell reported that the sub-committee appointed to affect a settlement with Maxwell & Mitchell in connection with their claim against the city for street paving had conferred with the said contractors. He would move that a cheque for \$1344.42 issue in favor of the contractors in full for all their claims against the city. This amount he stated included the amount of \$677.42 which had been withheld by the city and \$567.00 for extras. The motion was carried.

Ald. Clark called attention to the fact that this item properly belonged to the year 1909. The assessment for 1910 was really \$3000 less than that of 1909. No provision had been made for the payment, moved by Ald. Mitchell. The money available for the present year would necessarily be curtailed by the amount mentioned.

**BREAD BYLAW ALTERED.**

A petition from Harry Ryan was referred to the Assessment Appeals Committee.

Ald. Clark presented a petition from Mr. Hugh O'Neil. The petition drew attention to the fact that a city bylaw provided that all loaves of bread should weigh two pounds and prayed that permission be given the petitioner to manufacture loaves of a certain registered bread of the weight of one pound and one pound and a half.

Ald. Clark thought the bylaw could be amended if the amendment were general and gave no special privilege to any one baker.

Ald. Hooper, Ald. Vanwart, and Ald. Mitchell thought the bakers could regulate the matter without interference with the bylaw.

The City Clerk read the bylaw. Ald. Osborne and Ald. Mitchell advocated that should the bylaw be altered it apply not only to fancy bread but to any kind.

On the motion of Ald. Clark, the bylaw was altered so as to provide that all bread must be plainly stamped or labelled with the initials of the baker and the weight at the loaf. The weights are to be half pound, pound, pound and a half and two pounds.

The report of the Wilmot Park Board was received and ordered to be printed in the blue books. A balance of \$12.34 was reported.

A resolution of thanks from the Canadian Forestry Association was received and read.

Mr. T. H. Bullock of St. John manager of the Imperial Oil Company asked for permission to erect an oil tank on the company's property near the C.P.R. siding.

The application was referred to the Roads and Street Committee with power to act.

The council then adjourned.

**300,000 IMMIGRANTS WILL COME TO CANADA**

Those Who Come from the United States Will Bring over a Hundred Millions with Them.

Ottawa, April 5.—At the Atlantic gateways and at every point of entry along the international border lines in Western Canada immigrants are now pouring into Canada at a rate hitherto unequalled in the history of the Dominion and of a class which both for physical stamina, adaptability for good citizenship and for possession of independent means, has never been equalled in the history of the Dominion.

The immigration department reports that with regard both to quality and numbers the influx of new settlers is now breaking all records. According to present indications, there will be fully 150,000 Americans settle in Canada this year, principally composed of farmers from the Western States, who are now pouring across the boundary line in the Canadian West. The increase in American immigration this year to date is over 50 per cent. as compared with last year, when the total reached nearly 90,000.

The entry certificates this year show that the average amount brought into the country in cash or settlers effects is \$811 for each man, woman and child. This means that for the year about \$125,000,000 will be brought into the country from this source alone. Those who are coming in are reported to be the very best class of agriculturists in the American west.

From Great Britain it is expected that fully 100,000 immigrants will arrive this year. These too, are reported by the immigration authorities to be well equipped, both with money and effects, and are physically of a better general average than ever before came into the country in such large numbers. Ontario and Western Canada are getting the bulk of them although Quebec and the Maritime Provinces are now gradually attracting a larger percentage than in the past.

The total immigration for the year is expected to run close to the 300,000 mark or an average of one new citizen for every 23 of the present population of Canada.

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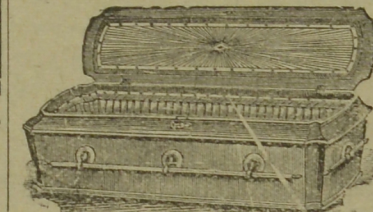
