

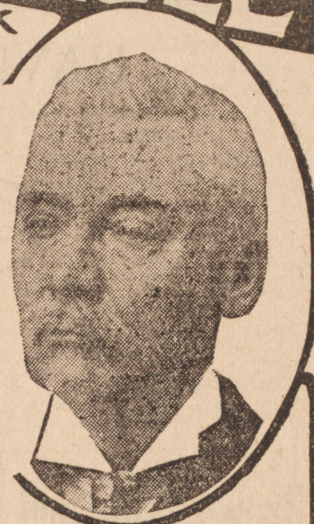

## HARD KNOCKS FOR THE COAL TRUST

Washington, D. C., Nov. 4.—A sweeping denunciation of the Delaware Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company in which it is charged with repeatedly attempting to drive a competing company out of business and an arraignment of the so-called "anthracite" coal trust" are contained in a complaint filed with the Inter State Commerce Commission today by the Marian Coal Company of Wilmington, Del. Reparation in the sum of \$5,239 because of alleged excess charges is demanded. The statement sets forth allegations of one of the most remarkable series of business harassments ever figuring before the Commission. It not only attacks the alleged unjust and discriminatory rates to which the Marian Company has been subjected, as based on a monopoly maintained through the device of the Temple Iron Company the directors of which are the presidents of the railroads, constituting the "anthracite coal trust" but charges attempted dictation of production, interference with prospective purchasers of the plant, diversion of water supply and heaping of fuel a fire that threatened destruction to the Marian Company's washery at Taylor, Penna. The Marian washery is on a Lackawanna division switch, which also serves three collieries alleged to belong to the Lackawanna interests. The complaint sets forth various acts as preventing equality of conditions as between the Marian and alleged favoured competitors, "who constitute the trust."

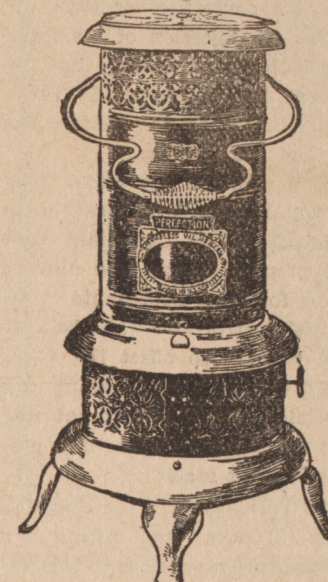

## NATIONALIST VICTORY WILL BE SHORTLIVED

Montreal, Nov. 4.—There was but one feeling on the receipt of the news of the Drummond election result. Absolute astonishment. Armand Lavergne when he telephoned home to Montreal was weeping with the sudden joy for he the man who won the election had no hope at the last that the Nationalists would do more than reduce the majority. The feeling of the Liberals was shown in the reply of a Liberal M. P. when asked for an interview "Give me an hour to think."

The paper comments are not so outspoken as might be expected. The Star says nothing except surprise. Le Canada, the morning Liberal paper, says "Appeals to Prejudice made by the Nationalists had decisive effect. They represented the naval bill to the farmers of the constituency as a nefarious measure which would cost them the blood of their children and which would impose on them for some years a direct tax of \$25 per head or \$200 per family. We regret this de-

feat but we are in no way discouraged. Prejudice has obtained a short lived victory. The Liberals must show the true meaning of the Naval law and stamp out prejudices against it before they have time to germinate."

## ST. JOHN MAN SERIOUSLY INJURED

Moncton, N. B., Nov. 7.—Joseph Carr, aged 40, who hails from St. John, while walking on the I. C. R. track near Humphrey's, two miles east of Moncton depot, was struck by a special freight about 12.30 this afternoon and seriously injured.

Carr was knocked off the track down an embankment and picked up in an unconscious condition. The train was stopped and the injured man picked up and brought to the city hospital. He remained in an unconscious condition for some time, but partially recovered late tonight, and was able to give his name and address.

The special was in charge of Conductor Capson and Driver Freeze and was running between ten and fifteen miles an hour. The driver saw the man some distance ahead and blew the whistle, but no attention was paid to the warning. Owing to the wet rails it was impossible to stop the train before striking Carr. On being taken to the hospital,

Carr was found to be badly cut around the head and bruised about the body, but no bones apparently were broken. Dr. L. H. Price, who attended the injured man, has hopes of his recovery. His condition late tonight was reported unchanged.

As far as can be learned Carr was walking to Moncton, but where he had been or how he came to be on the track, and paying no attention to the engine whistle, isn't clear. He is unmarried.

## RECIPROCITY CONFERENCE BEGINS AT OTTAWA

Ottawa, Nov. 4.—Messrs. Henry M. Hoyt and Chas. M. Pepper, the two United States negotiators in regard to reciprocity, arrived in Ottawa today at noon. They were met at the station by John G. Foster, the American Consul, and Hon. W. S. Fielding, and were driven to the Russell House, where they will stay during their time here.

Shortly after their arrival they granted an interview to a group of newspaper men, and Mr. Pepper, as one acquainted with Canada through his previous visit, spoke first:

"In the first place," he said, "we would like to be considered as commissioners or negotiators, not as experts."

"We are here," he went on, "to resume our negotiations of last spring and to discuss the situation in a friendly informal way with the Canadian government. Of course until we meet the proper officers of the Canadian Government we cannot say what our proposals are. We find that we get on best by means of these informal discussions."

"And," added Mr. Hoyt, "we have come hopeful that something of benefit to both countries will come out of these friendly conferences. Of course it must be something mutually and reciprocally beneficial or we could not arrange a treaty."

Mr. Pepper when asked whether he thought their present visit would lead to any definite result, replied that he was unable to say. "These negotiations," he put it, "are a continuation of those of last spring, though on somewhat different subject matter; yet they may be preliminary to others to follow."

## BRITISH ADMIRAL'S SON MARRIED IN ANNAPOLIS

Annapolis, Md., Nov. 3.—The marriage of Miss Beatrice Adelaide Whish, daughter of Captain A. W. Whish, a retired officer of the Royal Navy of Great Britain, to Mr. Vincent Bromley, formerly of England, and now of Detroit, Mich., was solemnized here yesterday in St. Anne's Protestant Episcopal Church by the rector, the Rev. Joseph P. McComas. Annapolis was chosen as the wedding place by the couple because of its historical and naval associations. The home of Miss Whish is Bonywyke, Weymouth, England. The bridegroom is a son of Vice Admiral A. C. Bromley, of the royal navy, and a grandson of Sir Richard Bromley, K. C. B., of Surrey, England. The bride was given away by her uncle, Mr. C. J. Forbes, of Barrie, Ont., and was attended by Miss Dorothy H. C. Barmwater, of Germany. The best man was Surgeon Dudley Carpenter, U. S. N. After the ceremony a breakfast was served at the home of Surgeon Carpenter. The couple will live in Detroit.
