

> Shortly after their arrival they granted an interview to a group of newspaper men, and Mr. Pepper, as one acquainted with Canada through his previous visit, spoke first:

> "In the first place," he said, "we would like to be considered as commissioners or negotiators, not as experts.

"We are here," he went on, "to resume our negotiations of last spring and to discuss the situation in a friendly informal way with the Canadian government. Of course until we meet the proper officers of the Canadian Government we cannot say what our proposals are. We find that we get on best by means of these informal discussions.

"And," added Mr. Hoyt, "we have come hopeful that something of benefit to both countries will come out of these friendly conferences. Of course it must be something mutually and reciprocally beneficial or we could not arrange a treaty."

Mr. Pepper when asked whether he thought their present visit would lead to any definite result, replied that he was unable to say. "These negotiations," he put it, "are a continuation of those of last spring, frough on somewhat different subject matter; yet they may be preliminary to others to follow."


