MONTHLY MEETING  
OF HOSPITAL  
TRUSTEE BOARD

Fifty Four Patients Treated During October—Bonds Sold and Other Securities Purchased.

The regular monthly meeting of the Hospital Trustees was held at the hospital yesterday afternoon, with Mr. Tennant, the President, in the chair, and Vice President Randolph, Mr. Sterling, Hon. Judge Barry, Coun Rogers, Mr. McMurray and Secretary Sampson. After routine business, the financial statement was submitted, and showed a large expenditure for October, but the receipts at the hospital were also large. The matron reported that fifty-four patients were discharged. One case of membranous croup is under treatment in the contagious wing. During October five patients died. Several donations of reading matter and fruit were sent in, and among the donors' names appear the Cathedral and St. Ann's Church.

Nearly two years ago a patient from Nashua died, while his personal effects were in charge of the matron, and he intimated his request regarding the disposition of his money. Since then other claimants appeared and the money is still in possession of the Board. Hon. Judge Barry, who is depended upon as the legal adviser of the Board, recommended that the Secretary Treasurer notify the claimants that the money will be paid to an administrator properly appointed. The finance committee reported the bonds to the amount of five thousand dollars issued by a thriving Nova Scotia town, had been satisfactorily sold and other securities purchased rather than hold too large risk in any one corporation, in view of the unfortunate conditions at Campbellton.

In view of the fact that some special effort will shortly have to be made for the enlargement of the hospital, to meet the demands of the public, it is proposed to have a conference very soon with the medical staff, in order to secure their views and assistance.

The Secretary read letters from Dr. Atherton and Dr. Holden, accepting appointment as members of the hospital staff.

Without any cost to the hospital, the members of the medical staff deliver lectures to the nursing staff once every week from October to May and the subjects illustrate every phase of a nurse's work. At the recent annual meeting of the medical staff, the lecturers and subjects for 1910-11, were allotted as follows:

Dr. McGrath—Anatomy, winalysis, and bandaging.  
 Dr. Holden—Physiology.  
 Dr. Mullin—Materia medica, poisons and antidotes, and hygiene.  
 Dr. Crockett—Medicine and infectious diseases.  
 Dr. Vanwart—Surgery, eye and ear.  
 Dr. Atherton—Preparation of patient for operation, post-operative treatment, instruments, anaesthetics.  
 Dr. Weaver—Obstetrics and diseases of childhood.

In addition to the lectures given by the members of the medical staff, the matron gives instruction in cooking for the sick, nursing and etiquette.

Dr. J. H. McGrath was appointed Medical Trustee in succession to Dr. W. J. Weaver, whose term of office will expire with the present year. An arrangement for the attendance of the visiting physicians at the hospital during the year was submitted, and approved, and together with a list of the visiting trustees, will be published at the close of the year for general information.

Considerable work has recently been done in the basement, where the culinary department has been turned inside out, and the chef presides in quarters completely enclosed by concrete—ceiling, walls and floor. Other work is in progress, looking to the perfecting of sanitation.

## SUCCESSFUL DANCE AT UNIVERSITY

The U. N. B. students entertained the Acadia Football Team at a reception and dance in the Arts building last evening. The guests were received in the library by Mrs. Jones, Mrs. Bailey and Mrs. Stone, the chaperones, and by Miss Otty and Mr. Hoyt on behalf of the students. Shortly after eight o'clock the dance began in the lower hall. Unfortunately the members of the Acadia Team was compelled to leave before nine o'clock to catch the train for St. John. Over two hundred including many from the city enjoyed the dance. Refreshments were served during the evening and the gathering broke up at midnight.

CENTRAL RAILWAY  
APPEAL WILL BE  
HEARD TOMORROW

Four Attorneys Admitted at November Sittings—Writ Refused in Campbell Case.

The November sittings of the Supreme Court opened here this morning, the full court being present. Four persons were admitted as attorneys. The case of Pugsley vs. Bruce, in which the Minister of Public Works and the Central Railway are concerned, will come up tomorrow.

ATTORNEYS ADMITTED.

Mr. M. G. Teed, K. C., moved that Rene Richard of Dorchester, George Hazen Adair of Apohaqui, and Wm. A. Nelson and John C.

Belysa, of St. John, be admitted as attorneys and solicitors. The persons mentioned were admitted. Mr. Richard was the only one required to pass examination, the others having the degree of B. C. L. from King's College. The chief justice administered the oath of allegiance and the oaths of attorney, and solicitor. Messrs. Belysa and Nelson will practice in St. John, Mr. Adair in Sussex and Mr. Richard outside the province.

The case of Shaw et al vs Robinson et al, was stood over until Wednesday, November 16th, on motion of Mr. M. G. Teed, K. C., Hon. H. F. McLeod and Mr. W. W. Allen, counsel for respondent consenting.

Ex-parte William Campbell, Mr. P. J. Hughes moved for a rule absolute for a certiorari and a rule nisi to quash a conviction made by John L. Marsh, police magistrate of Fredericton, for keeping intoxicating liquor for sale, for second offence.

FORMER RESIDENT  
OF CITY MADE A  
MILLION DOLLAR GIFT

David T. Hanbury of London Died in California Last Week—Body Taken to England.

The body of David T. Hanbury a former resident of this city who died suddenly in California, a short time ago left New York by steamer on Saturday last for England. The widow of the deceased accompanied the remains. Mr. Hanbury was a native of London, England, and was a wealthy brewer. About three years ago he fell in love with a telephone operator at a little California town named Buncia not far from San Francisco. Not long after marriage Mr. Hanbury brought suit for divorce from his beautiful young wife. They were afterwards reconciled and as a Christmas gift Mr. Hanbury gave his wife property valued at a million dollars.

The deceased was noted as a hunter having killed big game in all parts of the world. He was one of the first English sportsmen to discover New Brunswick as a game country. He served in the South African war with distinction. He received injuries in January last which resulted in his death.

His estate is very large and comprises real estate in California, a share in the Hanbury Breweries in London, wineries in England and France and mining properties in the United States.

The late Mr. Hanbury resided in this city in the early 80's. He hunted through all the best game districts of the province and on one occasion accompanied Mr. T. C. Allen on an excursion to Miscou. Later he was associated in the lumbering business in Madawaska with the late Robert Connors.

## A NEW PASTOR

Last evening the Rev. J. C. Berrie Chairman of the Fredericton District and Rev. N. McLaughlin Financial Secretary drove to Oromocto to receive into the Methodist Church Mr. George Stanley Helps who recently arrived from England to take charge of the Oromocto Circuit until June next.

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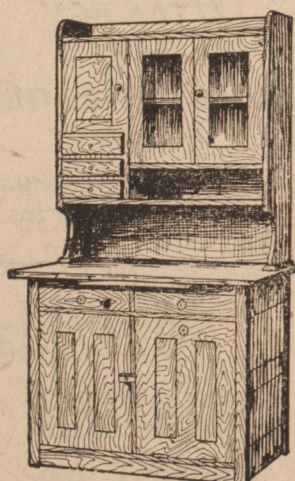
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
