#### ALD. HOOPER'S STATEMENT.

Ald. Hooper congratulated Ald. Walker on his elevation to the position of head of the Fire Department. He thought the new head would prove to be of great executive ability. Ald. Walker would find the department in good condition. Continuing Ald. Hooper said that when assuming the position of head of the fire department he had had to father a deficit of \$2500. He was pleased to say that during the four years since that time he had produced a surplus.

He regretted his removal from the chairmanship. There had been rumors of graft and graft with a big "G." In justice to himself he would ask His Worship if that had anything to do with his removal. He would like to have charges made. In the past committees had been chosen in open committee. This year although nominally chosen in open committee the committees had been chosen in caucuses held in private offices. He understood that the Mayor although ex-officio a member of almost all committees had not been consulted.

The Mayor stated to Ald. Hooper that he had always made a first class chairman.

Ald. Walker thanked Ald. Hooper for his kind remarks concerning himself. He had not been desirous of displacing Ald. Hooper. As far as he knew there had been no caucuses. The Fire Department was in excellent condition and he hoped would remain so.

Ald. Hooper stated that he did not want Ald. Walker to state why he had accepted office. As far as his statement concerning caucuses were concerned it was a remarkable thing that every alderman but Ald. Jewett and himself knew what the composition of the new committees was to be. He would ask Ald. Walker if Ald. Hooper's name had ever been connected with graft in the Fire Department.

Ald. Walker said that it had not. Ald. Mitchell thought the talk of graft must be an echo in Ald. Hooper's conscience. The reason Ald. Hooper had been removed was that there had been a charge in government. He needed a rest and the new men deserved a chance. (Laughter.) On motion existing rules of order were adopted. Ald. Mitchell moved, that Chief Engineer Wetmore of the Provincial Public Works Department be heard.—Carried.

#### MR. WETMORE HEARD.

Mr. Wetmore stated that the approach to the highway bridge on the Fredericton side was in a dangerous condition. Crushed stone was needed to make concrete for abutments and retaining walls. Excavations had been made and should there be a rise of water a slide might take place. Delay was dangerous. He asked that the council allow the use of the city's crushed stone. He was not speaking in the interest of Mr. Low but in the interest of his own department. The government would be responsible for payment. It would take sixty-five tons, all the city had, to build the base of the abutment.

His Worship said the situation was serious and invited comment from the aldermen.

Ald. Mitchell said he was surprised that Mr. Low had made no provision for the emergency. He would like to hear the other aldermen talk on the subject.

Ald. Calder opposed any concessions to Mr. Low, but if it would prevent delay in opening the bridge the city might strain a point. However he wanted a guarantee that the government would pay for the stone.

Ald. Osborne thought the city would have to come to Mr. Low's rescue.

Ald. Mitchell moved that the stone be sold to Mr. Low, providing that he would pay for the cost of the stone and crushing and providing that the government would guarantee the payment.—Carried.

### PRESIDENCY OF KING'S OFFERED CANON POWELL

Toronto Ont., March 19.—(Special) Presidency of King's College Windsor, N.S., which has been vacant for the past three months owing to the death of Rev. J. C. Boulden, D.C.L., has been offered to Rev. T. W. Powell, M. C. Cannon of St. Alban's Cathedral, Rector of St. Clement's Church, and principal of the Anglican college of the same name. Canon Powell stated today that he had the offer under consideration and would make known his decision at Easter.

Ald. Clark agreed that harmony was necessary to carry on the city's business. He felt the three aldermen of the defeated ticket had the interests of the city at heart. The electors had decided that they wanted the Scott Act properly enforced, as well as having the other business carried on.

His Worship stated that henceforth he would stick to the rules of order. He had allowed some latitude and had got into trouble. (Laughter.) In the future any alderman who did not observe the rules would be sat on hard.

The Council then adjourned.

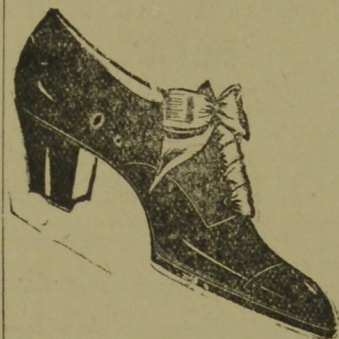
