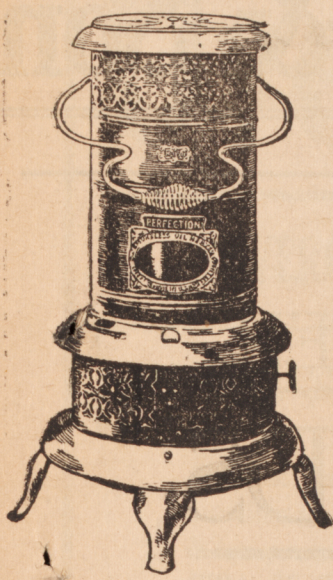

RAILWAY LANDSCAPE GARDEN

Indeed, if the comparisons are carried far enough, one is inclined to wonder if there may not be some connection between this devotion to the aesthetic and results as evidenced in quality and quantity of the output of repair shop work."

SEES DANGER IN NATIONALIST VICTORY

Victoria, B. C., Nov. 10.—The Colonist, the leading Conservative organ in a striking editorial article, sees a grave danger menacing Canada in the victory of the Nationalist candidate in Quebec. It says in part:—"If we are forced to accept the results of the election as expressive of the sentiments at Quebec, a very serious situation has arisen, and it is just as well to look at it fairly and squarely. The majority of the self-governing dominions join in the Imperial Defence. If the majority of Quebec propose to place themselves in antagonism to this policy, it may become necessary to forget the differences that have hitherto kept the two great parties apart and unite upon what, in our humble judgment seems to be the greatest question of the hour. A united empire is impossible without Canada. And Canada must herself be united, or else she will prove a very weak link in the world-encircling chain. The Nationalist party in Quebec stands upon narrow and untenable grounds. The Canada which it creates would be as substantial as a ball of sand. It would disintegrate through its own weight, unless, indeed, English speaking Canada should undertake the reconquest of Quebec, and if that were done there would be a speedy end to all the special privileges which the people of that province hold most dear. It seems to us that Quebec must either work in perfect harmony with the remainder of the Dominion, not seeking to set up an imperium in imperio or confederation must perish, or the hostile spirit of which Nationalism is the expression, must be crushed out of existence and with it must go those peculiar privileges which the people of the province have been able to enjoy solely because of the good faith of the British people. Quebec would have been Anglicized years ago; its people would have forgotten their language; they would have been reduced to the status which it has in other provinces as if it had not been for the good faith of the British people. Such men as Sir George Cartier, and Sir Wilfrid Laurier, to select representatives of both original political parties in Quebec have made this clear enough. It was an appreciation of this that inspired the famous declaration that the last gun fired for British connection would be fired by a French-Canadian. But we are hearing a new doctrine. We are being told by Quebec Nationalists that they will not send their children to our schools; that they will not enjoy British connection and insist on our keeping good faith with them. But they will not consent to the expenditure of a single dollar to maintain the Empire that alone makes it possible for them to make the demands which they deem so vital to their warfare."

INTERESTING CEREMONY AT ESQUIMALT

Victoria, B. C., Nov. 11.—Beneath a grey sky, darkened with a torrential downpour of rain, and to the accompaniment of bugle blasts ringing out a salute, the Union Jack, representing the jurisdiction of the British Admiralty over the naval base at Esquimalt, was at noon hauled down to the dockyard, and a similar flag, handed over for the purpose by representatives of the Dominion, an eloquent testimony of the unity of the Empire, raised to the peak instead. Meanwhile, the guard of honor, two detachments each of thirty bluejackets from the crews of the Sharnwater and the Rainbow, stood at the "present."

This little ceremony, devoid of spectacular incidents and witnessed hardly by anyone save those participating in the formalities, nevertheless is of profound historic interest, for with it there passes from the control of the Government of Great Britain every vestige of direct authority over the affairs of the naval base at Esquimalt.

Those participating in the scene, were Mr. George J. Desbarats, Deputy Minister of Naval Affairs; Admiral Kin-smill, Commander Vivian, H.M. S. Shearwater; Commander Stewart H. M. S. Rainbow, and Mr. George Phillips, Chief Stores Officer of the Navy Yard.

There was no exchange of papers or speeches. When all was in readiness and the hands of the clock pointed to a few minutes past twelve a signal from Commander Vivian two bluejackets at the foot of the flagstaff commenced to haul down the Union Jack, flapping in the fitful breeze which blew fresh from the harbor mouth. Simultaneously there rang out a salute, the guard of honor presented arms, representatives of both Governments stood at attention, and the Canadian ensign was at once raised in its stead. The formal transfer had been effected. Papers in the matter have been already exchanged between Ottawa and London.
