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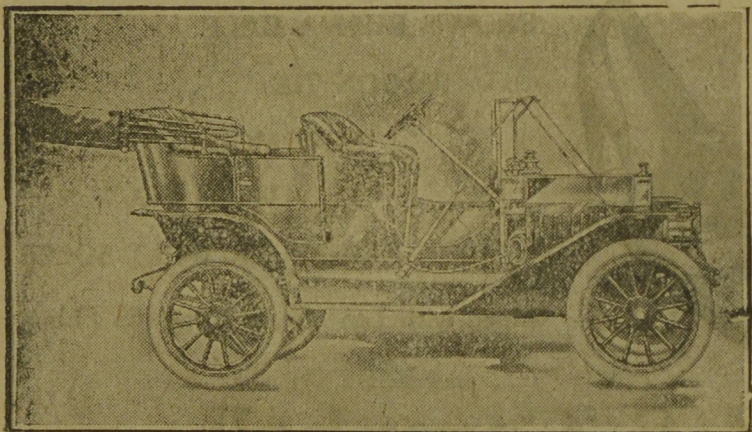

STERLING MAKES NEW MARITIME RECORD

Runs Great Ten Miles at Windsor, N. S.—Cameron and Corkery did Not Compete—Acadia Men at Meet.

Windsor, N. S., May 12.—At the Swastika Club sports here today, Sterling of St. John, won the ten mile race, in 54.34, breaking the Maritime record.

The race was interesting from start to finish, and Sterling led from the first, in a few minutes gaining a lap (one-fifteenth of a mile) which he maintained to the end and finished amidst cheers, in 54 minutes and 34 seconds, breaking all previous Maritime records. Stratton was a close second, holding that position throughout, and finished in 55 minutes; C. Patterson, Dartmouth, crossed the line third, in 56 minutes and 35 seconds.

Sterling finished running strong to the end. He was enthusiastically cheered at the close of the race. On account of the death of the king, the presentation of prizes by the Rev. G. R. Martell, rector of Christ Church, was postponed until a later date.
