LAJOIE STILL LEADS BIG LEAGUES AT STICK WORK

Ty Cobb Close Second--Speaker of Red Sox Has Made Marked Advance--Kirb White Leads National Batters But Snodgrass is Still Real Leader.

Following are the averages of the fifteen leading batsmen of the American league who have taken part in 10 or more games, the figures including Saturday's games. While Lajoie and Cobb, who have been hogging the batting honors all season, were enjoying a little rest from piling up basehits and incidentally, boosting their averages last week, Speaker, the wonderful center-field of the Red Sox was a very busy man with his stick, and is now within hailing distance of the pair. The great outfielder certainly accepted all that the Cleveland and White Sox pitchers offered with great glee and even big Ed Walsh, with the mystifying spitter, was treated harshly.

Charley O'Leary, who has been filling in at second base for the Tigers during Jim Delehanty's illness, is hitting better than he has for a number of seasons. He is the fourth man on the list. Five men in the league have made more than 90 hits and Cobbs and Lajoie are almost tied in this respect. Daniels, the former Bucknell college star, now with the New York Highlanders, appears on the list for the first time.

Beals Becker, pinch hitter of the Giants, made two hits in three times up last week and is the fourth man in the league. Another Giant who has been doing exceptionally well of late is the famed Fred Merkle, and he is fast approaching the .300 mark.
