MUCH ELECTION TALK IN GREAT BRITAIN

London, Nov. 10.—The conference which was organized shortly after the death of King Edward in an endeavor to reach a settlement of the acute controversy over the question of the veto power of the house of lords with reference to measures passed by the House of Commons—a controversy aggravated by the refusal of the upper house to pass the budget—has dissolved without reaching an agreement.

Announcement of the failure of the leaders of the two great political parties to find a solution for the dispute which has kept British politics in a turmoil for more than a year, was made by Premier Asquith to-night after a meeting of the cabinet, which followed the earlier gathering of the conference. The official statement does not disclose the cause of the disagreement.

It simply says:—"The conference which has been sitting to consider a constitutional question" has come to an end, without arriving at an agreement." The statement adds that the members of the conference had decided not to disclose the course of the negotiations or the causes which led to its termination.

It is understood, however, that the rock on which the conferences split was the question of the composition of the joint committee of both houses that should adjust the differences arising in the future. The Liberals insisted that the proportion of peers on this committee should be such that the will of the House of Commons would have a fair chance of prevailing. The Conservative members of the conference could not agree to the government's proposals and their alternative proved unacceptable to the Liberals.

Walter Hume Long announced to-night on the authority of Mr. Balfour, leader of the opposition, that neither home rule, imperial federation nor devolution formed any part of the discussion, which confirmed previous reports that the conference had confined itself exclusively to the veto question.

GENERAL ELECTION LIKELY

The political situation now reverts to the position it was in before the truce. The conference secured a reprieve in the controversy over the most acute issues of the day during the period of national mourning, which gives hope that some means will be found to avoid political complications until after the coronation. How this is to be accomplished remains a matter of conjecture and politicians are preparing to resume the fight.

Advanced Liberals, long tired of inactivity, are urging the government to press forward the original pro-

posals limiting the power of the house of lords by immediately introducing in the upper house the resolutions passed in the House of Commons last April. These the house of lords would reject, and in the crisis then arising, Mr. Asquith is pledged to advise the use of the royal prerogatives for the appointment of a sufficient number of peers to ensure the passage of a measure making the will of the Commons supreme.

If this course were followed there would probably be a general election in January or soon after. The opinion prevails tonight, however, that the government will force an immediate dissolution and get the elections over before Christmas. The results of recent bye-elections encourage the Liberals to make an immediate appeal to the people. Besides they are thoroughly organized and in far better position for contest than they were in January last.

JUDGE LINDSAY'S TEMPERANCE DECLARATION

The Hon. Ben Lindsey, the famous and beloved "boys' judge," of the Juvenile Court of Denver, and author of the stirring book on political righteousness and corruption, "The Beast and the Jungle," makes for the readers of the Sunday School Times the following declaration of his own present practice and belief.

I am a Total Abstainer. On occasions I have taken wine at banquets and dinners, and there was a time when, on the advice of friends, I used wine after hard work; but I think that was one of the most dangerous and most foolish things I ever did.

It is only within recent years that I have determined to be a total abstainer, because I think it best for my physical and moral health, and because I wish to set a good example to others.

I believe that every boy and girl should be taught to avoid liquor in any form, as he would be taught to avoid poison in any form. The consumption of liquor, no matter in how small a quantity, when taken in the form of beer or wine or whiskey, etc., is simply another form of slowly poisoning the body.

I wish every boy in America would keep the pledge to refrain from intoxicating liquor of any kind or character as a beverage; to do all in his power to end the drink habit and the liquor traffic; and to abstain from the use of tobacco in any form.

I have been in the Juvenile Court ten years, and in that time I have had to deal with thousands and thousands of boys who have disgraced themselves and their parents, and who have brought sorrow and misery into their lives; and I do not know of any one habit that is more responsible for the troubles of these boys than the vile cigarette habit. No pure minded, honest, manly, brave, gentle boy will smoke cigarettes.

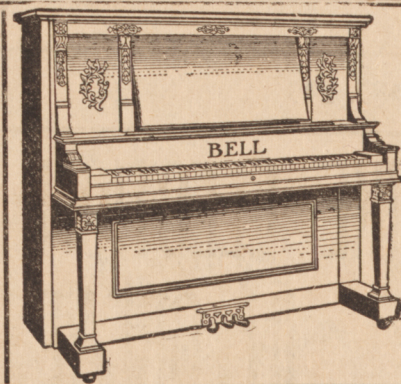
