## The Most Abstemious of Monarchs

In a London cable despatch to the New York American Mr. W. T. Stead says with regard to King George.

"I am not a courtier, and am so far from being a persona grata with the new King that the last time he expressed an opinion about me and my activities it was with expletives, which are more familiar on the quarter-deck than in the palaces of kings. I have therefore, no personal reason to defend the King against those who speak ill of him, but in the interests of truth and of justice it is necessary to characterize as they deserve the abominable libels which are being frequently repeated from mouth to mouth by the King's own subjects."

"It is pure ignorance no doubt, which may or may not have had some origin in fact or on the remote past, but the story now current that the new King is a confirmed drunkard is neither more nor less than an infernal lie."

"So far from the King being a drunkard he is nearer a teetotaler than any King who has ascended the British throne. For years past I know on first-hand authority, from those who have lived in his house, dined at

his table and travelled with him at home and abroad, he has been one of the most abstemious of men. He has never claimed this as a virtue on his part."

"My father," he would say "and all the men of the older generation could take their wine and never be the worse for it. As for me, I simply cannot. If I were to take a glass of champagne, I would simply bowl me over, hence I have to stick to my ginger ale--not because I like it, but because it is the only thing that like me."

"The simple truth of the matter is that the King's digestion is very bad. A very little thing upsets it, and when he suffers from indigestion, his lips become livid, his nose reddens and his hands grow cold. These symptoms, which are very familiar in certain forms of indigestion, have led unthinking persons to imagine that the King was suffering from intoxication when in reality he had never touched either wine or spirits."

"It is stated by those who know the King well that it is nearly two years since he touched a drop of alcohol."

## SERIOUS UPROAR IN A MONTREAL RESTAURANT

Montreal, June 23--A serious disturbance took place last night near the Jewish recreation grounds in Dorchester street West, near Chenneville street. A youth entered the ice cream shop No. 73 Dorchester street West and after having taken some ice cream made a bet of two dollars with another customer named Louis Cohen that he had one hundred dollars in a safe at the back of the ice cream shop.

As Cohen placed the two dollars on the counter before the bar tender the other lifting it, rushed into a back room and seizing a revolver belonging to the proprietor, threatened to shoot Cohen if he persisted in asking the return of the money. The bartender wrested the revolver from his grasp and then a fight took place between the two boys for the possession of the money which attracted the attention of several hundred people.

The assailant made his escape for the time being but one of the constables on duty at the scene of the disturbance stated in reply to Cohen's description of his assailant that he knew him well. He was also well known to Cohen. The proprietor on arriving some minutes after the occurrence reprimanded the bartender for allowing any one to interfere with his revolver, and for several minutes there was nothing but uproar.

## BATTED DOWN

JOHNSON'S DOOR

Big Darkey Again Arrested for Speeding His Auto, After His Camp Had Been Broken Open to Get at Him.

San Francisco, Cal., June 23--Jack Johnson was taken to the city prison today on a charge of violating the automobile speed laws. He was released on \$50 bail. Johnson was arrested at his training camp where he had locked himself in. Three policemen broke in, and with drawn revolvers took the negro from the room. Under advice of Chief of Police Martin a charge of resisting the officers was changed to one of exceeding the speed limit.

Johnson had been down town getting transportation to Reno for the members of his camp and was speeding for his quarters at what Patrolman Lewis says was fifty miles an hour. Lewis attempted to halt him Johnson laughed derisively at Lewis shouting "on your way kid," and was lost in a cloud of dust. Following as fast as his horse could carry him, Lewis arrived a few minutes after the champion at the training camp.

Johnson then dramatically declared that an arrest could be made only over his dead body and locked himself in his room. Summoning two other patrolmen, Lewis shoved aside some of the camp followers who attempted to interfere and kicked in the door. The champion submitted to arrest and accompanied the officers to the office of Chief of Police Martin who persuaded Lewis to reduce the charge of resisting an officer to that of speeding. Producing \$50 cash bail, Johnson was released and instructed to appear for a hearing in the Police Court tomorrow morning. If the champion escapes with a fine he will be able to start for Reno.

June 15--Mr. John Hassack, died very suddenly a few days ago, he took sick on Sunday and died on Wednesday. Undertaker Harry Sinnott had charge of the funeral arrangements and Rev. J. S. Mullin preached a very appropriate sermon for the occasion, and the funeral was very largely attended. Mr. Hassack was seventy-two years old and was born in Scot Settlement near Stanley, he was the youngest of the three brothers, one James who died about eighteen years ago in this place. Daniel is the only surviving brother, he and James were born in Scotland. The family of the deceased consists of William, Dell, Roy and Robert, and four daughters. This community extends their sympathy to Mrs. Hassack and family in the bereavement of their dear husband and father.

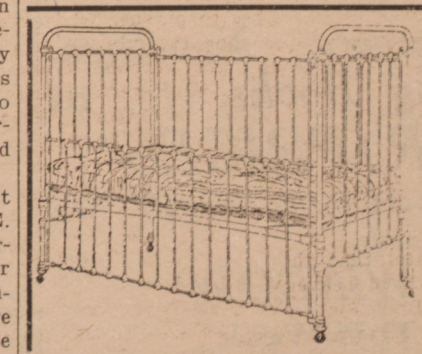
