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

FIVE RACES FOR CURTAIN RAISER OF MARITIME CIRCUIT

Free-For-All Failed to Fill and was Declared Off--Small Fields but Good Racing Expected--Two Races June 30th and Three July 1st.

The directors of the Fredericton Park Association held their expected meeting last night, preparatory to the first race meet of the season, to be held on June 30th and July 1st.

The free-for-all, failing to fill, has been declared off. The other five races are to be run off as announced. There will be two races on the first day of the meet, and three on Dominion Day.

GOOD RACING EXPECTED.

In spite of the fact that the fields are smaller than were expected, good racing is expected. The entry list, which follows, shows that there are some good horses entered. It should be remembered that in past seasons, the very best racing has taken place in events for which the entries were not numerous.

The directors of the local track, although confronted by disheartening circumstances, are going ahead with the meet. The adverse circumstances which have prevented trainers getting their horses in condition for the early dates of the season have been general. Not only have classes failed to fill in the Maritime Provinces, but all over the United States similar conditions prevail. Several meets on the Grand Circuit have been declared off for this reason.

The directors at last night's meeting, decided that Mr. A. H. Merrill, of Danvers, Mass., would be a judge as well as a starter. The refreshment privilege for the meet was sold to John D. Chase.

GOLDSMITH MAID'S

REMARKABLE RECORD

The claim that Cresceus is the greatest race trotter that the turf has known does not meet with the approval of some of the older generation of horsemen. One of these is J. B. Miller of Onida, N.Y. who writes to the Horse World as follows:

"I can't see how they can make out that Cresceus was greater than Goldsmith Maid. Where did he mix up in all the free-for-alls for 13 years like the Maid? He did all his trotting exhibitions with a light bike sulky, while the Maid did all her trotting with a high-wheel sulky; and in his two-mile race against time, when he went lame, Cresceus had the pole all the time and nothing to bother him while the Maid had other horses to contend with in all her races and never took a lame step. She broke on record in 1871 and one in 1872 and four in 1874. In 1865 she won first money in one race; in 1866, 2 firsts; in 1867 5 firsts; in 1868, 8 firsts; in 1869, 8 firsts; in 1870, 11 firsts; in 1871, 14 firsts; in 1872, 8 firsts; in 1873, 10 firsts; in 1875, 8 firsts; in 1876, 8 firsts, and in 1877, 2 firsts.

"In a good many races she did not get first; in many races where there were a good many entries and all working against her, if she did not draw the pole it was impossible for her to win first money.

"Budd Doble drove her in all her races but one. His father, William Doble drove her in one race at Boston. Think of it! Budd drove her from Boston to California and up and down the circuit for 13 years and turned her over to her owner, H. N. Smith, when she was 20 years old, sound as a dollar, not a pimple on her, with all the speed and vim she ever had."

POWERS DECLARES GAMES ILLEGAL

New York, June 23.--Four Eastern league baseball games were declared illegal yesterday by P. T. Powers, president of the league, who thus sustains the protest of the Toronto club that shortstop McMillan, formerly of the Brooklyn National league club and now with Cincinnati, had no right to play in them. The games must be played off on the same grounds on which they were first played.

They are Montreal at Rochester June 4, and Rochester at Toronto, June 6, 7 and 8.

Montreal won, and in the Toronto series Rochester won two and Toronto one.

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SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter-section available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties--Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties--Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties--Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.
