Rumors That Movement May Be Started to Stop Production---Some Aldermen and All Clergymen Opposed.

great Jeffries-Johnson fight be shown in this city? The answer to this question has given rise to various conjectures on the street today. The latest press reports from important cities in the United States are to the effect that the production of the pictures will be prohibited and it is not improbable that many of the Canadian cities will follow the lead of their sister cities to the South. Mayor Fitzgerald of Boston, is of opinion that the pictures should not be shown. The City Prosecutor of Los Angeles says he will invoke the law in the matter. Of course cities of the Southern States have an argument which cannot be used so well by the cities of the North, namely that the pictures would tend to engender race riots, but nevrotheless, authorities of those places where the argument cannot be used, wink they have sufficient grounds for any adverse action they may take in the fact that the pictures would have no other than a demoralizing effect upon the children of their communities.

The clergy of the city are unaninous in their belief that the fight pictures should be prohibited here. When interviewed by a representaive of The Mail, this morning, Fathes Carner said:

"I think it would be most unwise to show the pictures here, especially on account of the bad effect they would produce upon the children."
