THE ANNUAL SESSION OF THIRD DISTRICT MEETING

The Affairs of the Baptist Church are Shown to be in Most Prosperous Condition.

The annual session of the Third District Meeting met in the Church at Burden on Friday afternoon and was largely attended. The following clergymen were present, Rev. A. A. Rideout, C. P. Wilson, C. N. Barton, L. A. Fenwick, A. A. Rutledge, J. H. Puddington, H. W. Jackson, John Lennox, Wm. London of Easton, and W. D. Hetherington. Thirty-two churches sent in written reports, while others were reported verbally. The reports showed that all had enjoyed a prosperous year. Two new churches had been organized during the past year in the circuit of Rev. A. A. Rutledge.

On Tuesday evening Rev. C. P. Wilson preached to an audience which completely filled the church. The service was much enjoyed by all.

On Saturday morning Mr. J. W. Spurden conducted an open parliament on the better organization of churches for carrying on missionary work. The subject was well discussed, and a resolution adopted to do more for missionary work during the coming year.

The following were the officers elected for the ensuing year: Chairman—J. W. Spurden. Vice Chairman—F. R. Brooks. Secretary—Rev. A. A. Rideout. Members of Executive—Rev. J. H. MacDonald and C. P. Wilson.

On Saturday evening R. M. Hobson spoke on the Laymen's Missionary Movement, and Dr. Archibald on the Educational Institutions.

The Sunday services were largely attended. Rev. A. A. Rutledge preached at the morning service; Rev. R. M. Hobson spoke to the Sunday school in the afternoon. In the evening, Rev. L. A. Fenwick was the speaker.

Rev. Mr. Barton, the pastor, spared no pains in attending to the entertainment of the delegates, and received a hearty vote of thanks.

During the past year one hundred and ten were added to the membership by baptism, bringing the present membership to about three thousand. The contributions for all purposes was over twenty thousand dollars, while the value of church property is more than one hundred thousand dollars in this district.

The right hand of fellowship was extended to the two new churches, through their delegates, by Rev. C. P. Wilson, to a membership in the district.

The session was one of the most successful ever held in the county.

SUPREME COURT SITTINGS

Judge Wilson had adjourned the previous sitting so as to enable four foreigners who had applied for naturalization when King Edward was alive, to have their papers corrected to meet requirements under the present monarch King George V.

DEATH AT HANWELL

All who knew Mrs. Letetia Driscoll will regret to hear of her death at Hanwell on Saturday after a short illness of one week with paralysis. The deceased was the wife of Dennis Driscoll and leaves two sorrowing sons and three daughters. Interment was made this morning at the Rural Cemetery, Rev. Mr. Summers, the Presbyterian Catechist for Maryland and Hanwell conducted the funeral service at the house and Rev. Dr. Smith was in attendance at the grave. Mr. John G. Adams was funeral director.

POLICE COURT NEWS

Officers Phillips and Foss responded to a telephone call and the three of them conveyed their prisoner to the lockup. McCorquindale was found guilty and fined \$12 which he paid.

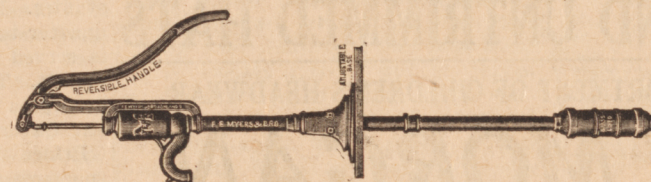
