OFFICERS BADE
FAREWELL YESTERDAY

Ensign and Mrs. Hargrove leave on Thursday—Captain and Mrs. Howland will replace them.

Ensign and Mrs. Hargrove conducted their farewell meetings in the S. A. citadel yesterday. The services were largely attended, and at night the hall was crowded and scores were turned away.

The 'Prentice Boys of Gibson, of which Ensign Hargrove is a prominent member, attended in a body, and occupied seats in the centre of the hall. On the platform, besides the band and soldiers of the Army, His Worship Mayor Thomas, Councillor Rogers, Mr. B. L. Esty, Rev. J. J. Colter, Mr. C. E. Logan, Mr. A. D. Thomas and others were seated.

Messrs. S. H. Logan and N. J. Smith, on behalf of the old and new members of the Army, spoke highly of the life and work of Ensign and Mrs. Hargrove and said that in their farewell, the corps would sustain a loss which would be keenly felt. Councillor Rogers, on behalf of the County, said that not only had Fredericton sustained a loss, but the surrounding country would also feel that they, too, were losers, for Ensign and Mrs. Hargrove had wielded an influence for good which had been far-reaching.

Mr. A. D. Thomas also testified to his deep admiration for Ensign and Mrs. Hargrove and the noble work done by them in the city.

PRESENTATION.

MAYOR THOMAS.

His Worship the Mayor was then introduced, and received with great applause. He said he was not there to make a speech, but to represent the citizens of Fredericton. He wished it had been a welcome meeting instead of a farewell, for he felt that Fredericton could not afford to lose good citizens, especially such citizens as Ensign and Mrs. Hargrove. He realized that the Army was doing more than any other denomination in the world today. He had watched with pleasure the remarkable growth of the Army in the city under the command of the farewelling officers, and he believed that never since the days of Captain Maltby had Fredericton ever had such good officers. They had endeared themselves to the people of Fredericton by their consistent living and their whole-souled efforts to bless and help their fellowman, and in their going Fredericton would sustain an almost irreparable loss. Personally, he had a deep regard for Ensign and Mrs. Hargrove, and regretted keenly their being called away from Fredericton.

Ensign and Mrs. Hargrove then replied feelingly, thanking the people for their kindness and assuring them that in going to Charlottetown they would give themselves as whole-hearted to the work as they had done here.

Mr. Winslow visited Fredericton about ten years ago. On his present visit he is being greeted by many of his old friends.

Mr. Bruce Winslow is a brother of Mr. D. B. Winslow of the Public Works Department. He came home from Peru via Great Britain where he met his mother and his sister Miss Grace Winslow who were touring Europe.

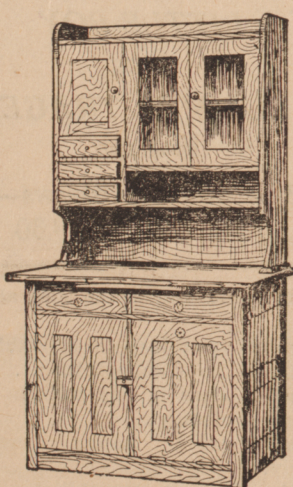

ACCEPTS CALL TO
GEORGE ST. CHURCH

Is at Chegoggin, N. S., at Present—Will Take Up Work Here Before New Years.

Rev. Joseph E. Wilson at present stationed at Chegoggin, N. S., has accepted a call which was unanimously extended to him last night by the congregation of the George Street Baptist Church. Mr. Wilson was communicated with by the committee appointed to select a pastor and replied by telegram today. It is not known definitely when the new pastor will arrive, but it is expected that he will arrive in December.

Rev. Mr. Wilson is a native of Nova Scotia and has been actively engaged in the ministry for about eight years. He was graduated in arts at Bates College, Lewiston, Me., and studied theology at Cobb Divinity School. He filled the pulpit at the George Street Church a week ago yesterday in a very acceptable way.

Mr. Wilson comes to Fredericton with the reputation of being a strong man fitted in every way for the pastoral work he has accepted. He has had considerable experience in church work. For some time he was pastor of the Pine Street Baptist Church, Lewiston, Me., being in charge of that church both before and after leaving college. He has been at college Rev. Mr. Wilson took a prominent part in athletics and was a man of marked ability in other ways.
