ACTRESS KNOWN HERE
SUED FOR DIVORCE

The Boston papers yesterday contained accounts of the divorce case of Florence L. Mithke, musical director of "The Fool," theatrical company, which played in the Opera House here a few weeks ago. Mrs. Mithke is being sued by her husband, Maximilian M., for an absolute divorce. He charges indiscretions in Boston and elsewhere. The report states that the entire cast of "The Fool" rallied to Mrs. Mithke's support, attempting to prove that at the time her husband alleges she was committing indiscretions in Boston, she was several hundred miles away, playing in Maine and the Maritime Provinces.

Harry Dudley, connected with "The Fool" company, his wife, Lester A. Davis, one of the managers, and J. H. Kent, the advance agent, all testified to Mrs. Mithke's presence with the company all the time.

GROCERS DON'T WANT THE PEANUT STAND

Petitioned Mayor to Withdraw Licence From George Apostolos--Police Take up Matter.

A large delegation of grocers and fruit dealers waited on His Worship Mayor Thomas yesterday afternoon, and presented a petition praying that the license issued to George Apostolos the Greek who has recently established fruit and peanut stands in the city, be withdrawn. The petition urged that the stands themselves were a nuisance and were also dangerous on account of the gasoline used to roast peanuts. It was also stated that Apostolos had no settled place of business, was not a rate payer and was in direct competition with rate payers. The petition was signed by eighteen grocers and fruit dealers.

Apostolos for some days has had stands at the corner of Queen and Carleton streets and also at the corner of York and Queen streets. He has done a pretty brisk trade and as he has a license there is some doubt as to whether he can be compelled to stop business. The only ground on which he can be proceeded against is that he is occupying the public street. His license gives him no such right. It was decided today to have the police take the matter up.

SCOTT ACT CASES.

This morning a first offence Scott Act case against the Springhill Hotel, was dismissed on account of lack of evidence. Scott Act Inspector McFarlane was the prosecutor. Tomorrow there will be a similar case against Mrs. William Campbell.

AUTOISTS VIOLATING MOTOR-VEHICLE ACT

Some Motor-Cars not Registered--Speed Limit Exceeded--City Authorities may Act in Matter.

It is very likely that steps will be taken in the near future to have the owners of automobiles in this city conform with the law requiring the registration and numbering of motor-vehicles. Several motor-cars recently purchased by residents of Fredericton have not yet been registered and are not displaying their numbers. The act passed by the legislature in 1905 requires the purchaser of an automobile to register the vehicle at the office of the Provincial Secretary within five days of the time it is first used and to display the registered number plainly on the vehicle. A violation of this provision makes the owner of the motor-car liable to a fine of one hundred dollars.

The same act limits the speed at which motor-vehicles may travel and provides penalties for the infraction of the speed regulations. On roads or streets which are closely built up on the speed limit is one mile in eight minutes. In less populous districts the speed permitted is greater. It is well known that the speed limit is frequently exceeded and by drivers of little experience.

The civic authorities have under consideration the better enforcement of the law relating to motor vehicles and as the municipality or city in which an infraction of the law occurs has the right to make use of fines obtained from those violating the law it would not be surprising to see the city exchequer contributed to by autoists.

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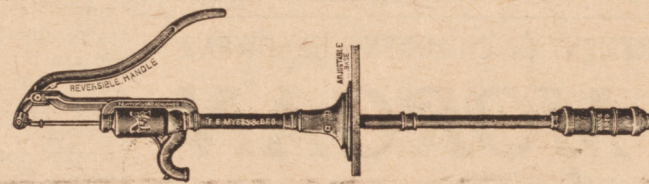
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
