## JEM DRISCOLL READY TO MEET ABE ATTELL

English Boxer is in Great Trim--Is not Talking--Good Bout Expected.

Jem Driscoll, the English featherweight champion, will take part in two ring contests of importance before he meets Abe Attell at Colma on July 2 for the world's title. He will take on the remarkable Pal Moore for six rounds in Philadelphia on May 25, and six days later will meet Jack Goodman, the clever light weight, in a ten-round bout at the Fairmont A. C. Then Driscoll will leave for California to begin hard training. He will take with him the magnificent gold belt presented to him by Lord Lonsdale emblematic of the English featherweight championship, but the trophy will not be hung up to go with the winner's spoils at Colma. As a matter of fact, the belt still belongs to the National Sporting Club of London and Driscoll has simply earned the right to its temporary ownership. It is not a world's championship emblem.

DRISCOLL QUIET BUT CONFIDENT

Driscoll, probably the most scientific boxer in the world, is quietly confident of whipping Attell in the 45-round bout to be decided on the coast. He never boasts, neither does he give opinions of a disparaging nature as to the skill of any pugilist.

"Attell is a bully good boxer," says Driscoll. "I shall very much like to test him, you know, for he's clever and fast and all that sort of thing. We had a ripping go here last year for ten rounds and I think the bout at Mr. Coffroth's club in July will be doubly interesting."

ATTELL TRIES EASY ONES.

Attell, who is going to meet Tommy Murphy and possibly a few others on easy money bouts before he leaves for the coast, has not reached a positive agreement with Driscoll as to the weight conditions, but there seems to be no trouble in sight over that point when it is known that Attell is hungry for a scrap with the Englishman under almost any conditions. Attell, always a sphinx, has said nothing yet as to the probable outcome of the Driscoll fight, but men who say they know will corroborate the statement that Attell will have \$5,000 posted here with a leading sporting man to be wagered on him at ringside odds with persons who think Driscoll can beat him. Furthermore, it is hinted by the wise fish that Attell was "under a pull" when he met Driscoll and was easily outpointed a year ago; also that Attell pursued these tactics to inveigle Driscoll into the coming match in order to make a sure thing clean-up.

HIS FRIENDS OPTIMISTIC.

"Attell will knock Driscoll out sure and in less than ten rounds," is the positive assertion made by followers of the American champion. "He is using Driscoll for a 'come on' and will chop him in pieces. Why, Driscoll can't hit hard enough to break a pane of glass. He'll be meat for Attell."

Driscoll has heard of Attell's plans but you can't induce the British champion to utter a word of comment. He says that he will be fit when he enters the ring and will do his best. There seems to be no doubt that these little men will provide one of the most scientific battles in ring history. Surely there are no better boxers in the world at the present time.

BASEBALL NOTES.

Lewis Beerbauer, Jr., playing sensational ball for the Erie, Penn., club is a son of Beerbauer, the famous old second baseman of the Athletics. More than one-half the regular players with the American association are major league castoffs. The "McGuire's" are not doing very well in the east, and Cy Young has actually been lost in the shuffle.

The Boston Americans will play their last home game this year on Sept. 13, and then finish up with 21 games on the road.

Addie Joss, the seven-story flinger of the Cleveland team, is the leading pitcher of the American League so far this season.

Pitcher Higgins, who was recently released to the Denver Western League club by the St. Louis Nationals, has been returned to the latter club because of a hitch in the conditions of release.

The National league race is one of the prettiest competitions the Lynch circuit has ever enjoyed. Pittsburg, the leader, has very little advantage over Philadelphia, now crowded back to fifth place.

Detroit is perhaps the most unpopular club in the American league among its rivals. Yet everyone is pulling for the champions to stop the Athletics and make a race out of the schedule.

The track meet of the University of New Brunswick to be held tomorrow afternoon promises to be one of the most successful in the history of the college.
