WILL DR. CRIPPEN FIGHT ON THIS SIDE

May Decide at Last Moment to Open Legal Battle, and Force Yard's Hand—Authorities Taking Steps to Guard Against Surprise Which Change of Mind Would Bring.

Quebec, Aug. 9.—Dr. Harvey Hawley Crippen may not wait until he gets across the Atlantic to commence the fight for life on the charge of murdering his actress-wife, Belle Elmore.

Although early instructions from his solicitor, Arthur Newton, of London, Eng., instructed Dr. Crippen to return to England without fighting extradition, it would not come as a great surprise to many if his plan of campaign should be altered, and Scotland Yard forced to show at least a portion of its hand on this side of the water.

FEARS A SURPRISE.

Inspector Dew, of Scotland Yard, who caught Crippen and Ethel Clara Le Neve after the race across the ocean, and who is waiting impatiently for the time when he shall set sail for England with his prisoners, seems to have in his mind a lurking suspicion that a last-minute surprise will be sprung by the prisoner, who at present seems calm and undisturbed, and ready to go back to England to start the battle. The first day of Inspector Dew's return to Quebec after a visit to Ontario points were marked by lengthy conferences with local police officials, and although the Inspector made a trip to the jail, where he was in prolonged consultation with Governor Morin, he did not pay any visit to the prisoner.

The new warrant of remand which has been made out as the authority to keep Dr. Crippen in custody extends over an indefinite period. The authorities admit that Dr. Crippen can change his mind as often as he likes as to what he will do. In order that they may not be hurried should the prisoner suddenly decide that he will make a fight on this side of the ocean, the authorities have had the remand papers made out covering an indefinite period. That is the only

precaution they can take against being surprised by a last minute change of mind by Dr. Crippen.

MEANS TRIAL HERE.

Should the alleged wife-slayer undertake to make a fight in Canada, it would practically mean that Scotland Yard would be obliged to display about every card in its hand. Then should the evidence be sufficient to send Dr. Crippen back to England to stand the real trial, his counsel would at least have the advantage of knowing against what facts and evidence they were going to contend, an advantage that is readily apparent. Therefore, a last-minute change of mind would not come as a great surprise to many.

Indeed the suspense will not be ended until the arrival this week of the mail-bearing steamers from England, two of which are scheduled to arrive. Either of these may bear letters from Dr. Crippen's London counsel, with instructions to the client which might alter the entire aspect of the case. As a matter of fact, a cable message might at any moment advise the prisoner to start the fight at once, and it is to ward off this possibility in all probability, that the remand papers have been extended to an indefinite length.

MANY LETTERS COME.

Half a hundred letters or thereabouts, have been received at the provincial jail, pretty evenly divided for each of the prisoners. All the letters addressed to Miss Le Neve have been forwarded to her, but she has sent no replies. Crippen's letters have not yet been given to him. Many of the letters are thought to be from cranks, others written by persons who wish to get some publicity, and none of any particular interest to the prisoners so far as suggesting an escape from their present predicament is concerned.

BAD CROP COULD NOT STOP CANADA'S WEST

But Mr. McBean, of Winnipeg, Does Not Believe that Yield Will be Under 65 Mill.

Montreal, Aug. 9.—Mr. W. O. McBean, of the firm of McBean Brothers grain dealers, of Winnipeg, was in town this morning, and visited the Board of Trade. Mr. McBean is visiting the effects East by way of a rest and is the guest of his brother, Mr. A. G. McBean, of Lancaster, Ont.

Mr. McBean did not seem to be very distressed about the West's prospects when seen by a Herald representative on the Board this morning.

"The crop will be about sixty-five million bushels, when it is all in," he said. "The oats crops will be short, and barley is to all intents and purposes wiped out. Southern Manitoba was the heaviest sufferer."

"The crop was a spotty one, too, in Saskatchewan, but I think the above estimate is within ten millions of the final figures which is about as close as any man will get to it."

"But even if the crop was a failure it couldn't stop the growth of the West," said Mr. McBean, with true other-side-of-Fort-William enthusiasm. "Two bad crops couldn't stop us. The country will go right on prospering, and the tide of good immigration will not be turned."

Asked about the report of the United States immigration department that many United States farmers were left the Dakotas and other western states for Canada, were returning this year, Mr. McBean said he thought someone had made a mistake. "They are as badly off, or worse, as far as crop conditions are concerned, than we are, in Dakota, and in the Washington district it is just as bad. There are always some disgruntled men who go back. Some of them even return to Eastern Canada. But they would not make a success of things anywhere."

"I don't expect higher prices just now, but the modern farmer is going to do his best with his crop. He has a telephone in the house, you know, and he is a speculator. They are getting educated all right."

CO-OPERATIVE FARMERS' BANK TO BE SHORTLY ESTABLISHED IN ENGLAND

London, Aug. 8.—The Earl of Carrington, minister of agriculture, announced this week that the Government intends to establish a system of co-operative banks for the benefit of the small farmers. This announcement has created bitterness among the Unionists, who accuse the Liberals of stealing their thunder. The policy was advocated long ago by the Unionists, and Mr. Balfour, in 1909, incorporated the idea in a speech which he delivered at Birmingham. The principle which he set forth then was incorporated in his party's platform. Lord Carrington is a model landlord. He owns 23,000 acres of land. During the last Tory administration he induced Parliament to pass the Small Holdings Bill, and this law has revolutionized restoration in the country in favor of the tenant of England to a peasant proprietary. This was one of Earl Carrington's ideals when he was governor of New South Wales. He has succeeded in reforming the land laws and the consequent dividing of huge farms into small holdings. He has given no details of his new scheme. It is to be assumed that the credit of the new banks will be arranged along the lines of the Australian plan, under which the Government, with simple and easy conditions, advances to farmers as much as \$2,500 to clear and fence the land and provide roads, irrigation, etc. The loans are repaid in instalments when the country is prosperous.

While Lord Carrington's scheme is Socialistic, the newspapers of all parties commend it highly.

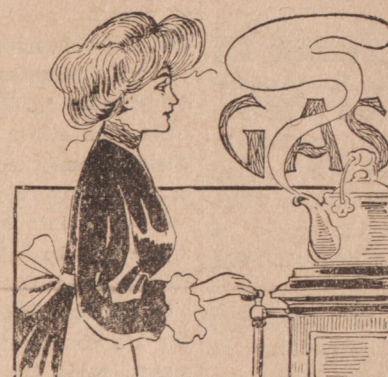

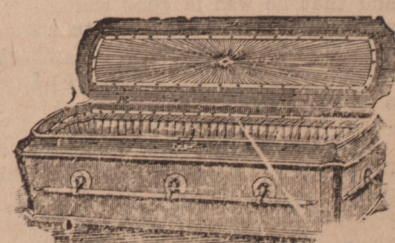

BRITAIN DROPS SUBSIDY FOR STEAMSHIP LINE TO JAMAICA

King George Makes Provision for Colonials at the Opening of Parliament--Henniker Heaton Proposes Untrammelled Postal-Telegraph Service.

London, Aug. 9.—The abandonment of efforts for the renewal of the steamship subsidy between Britain and Jamaica is announced. Neither the Home nor Colonial Government is prepared to renew on the present basis and the shipping companies decline to accept less than \$200,000 a year. It is believed Jamaica will endeavor to arrange a new fast service in conjunction with Canada.

Mr. Henniker Heaton urges the appointment of an Imperial and foreign postmaster, whose first duty should be to convene a meeting of the European Postmasters-General with a view to abolishing political frontiers for postal telegraph and wireless communications between the countries.

KING GEORGE'S TACT

His Majesty King George V., who has inherited the thoughtful tact, the exercise of which made memorable the reign of King Edward VII., has given fresh evidence of its influence.

Hitherto on the occasion of the opening of Parliament by the King in person no official provision has been made for the reception and accommodation of representatives of the self-governing dominions across the sea.

While the foreign Ambassadors have a bench assigned to them on the floor of the House, where with their ribbons and orders they add appreciably to the decoration of the scene gentlemen duly accredited as representatives of the Colonies are left to scramble for seats in the strangers' galleries.

King George has intimated his intention of seeing that this oversight shall be corrected, when, in the spring of next year, he makes his first appearance on the Throne in the House of Lords at the opening of the new session.

Places will be specially reserved for the High Commissioners of Australia, Canada, South Africa and New Zealand.

The action it may be stated, was taken directly on the personal initiative

of His Majesty and will in due course be officially announced.

INVITATIONS TO COURT

King George has asked that the lists of those whom it had been usual to invite to St. James Court should be laid before him. This has been accordingly done by the Lord Chamberlain's department. The royal couple have gone through these lists very carefully, and a very large number of names have been struck out. Queen Mary has very strong views upon the question of who shall and who shall not be allowed to be present at court, in which respect she very much resembles the late Queen Victoria. Both King Edward and Queen Alexandra were apt to be a trifle too easy going in this direction with the result that several people had been allowed to push their way into the circle who certainly had no right to be there. There is a considerable surprise in store for these people, however, as the events of the next few months will clearly demonstrate.

The Departmental Committee on the Employment of Children issued recently a drastic report in which they recommend that street trading should be altogether prohibited among boys under seventeen and among girls under eighteen.

The complete report and the evidence of a number of witnesses form a terrible picture of the tendency to ward depravity on the part of children who enter street trading at an early age. It produces a dislike to regular employment and is a fruitful apprenticeship to crime.

The Amalgamated Society of Engineers, with 100,000 members, is one of the largest trade unions in the world, and is thought to be the strongest on the financial side. The statistics show that more engineers have died of diseases of the heart than any two other troubles combined. Sixty is the average age in cases of death from heart trouble among the engineers.
