PROSPECTS OF TRUCE NOT SO BRIGHT

London, May 10—The political situation has not yet crystallized clearly but it seems probable that the hopes expressed with some alacrity by the Conservatives for a political truce of apparently indefinite length will not be acquiesced in by at least a formidable portion of the coalition. The necessity for some postponement of the great struggle is generally admitted, but certain it is that the Irishmen, Laborites and sterner Radicals, now that the first shock is over, profess to see no reason, in the loss of the monarch, who, they claim was certain to act with strict regard to the constitution, as they see it, why the struggle with the Lords should not take place after a decent but brief interval.

The reported utterances of the Labor leaders, now in Germany, support this view, while the official organ of the Nationalists rejects thoughts of a compromise or postponement with indignation.

Pronouncements are now being made in the ministerial press to the effect that the cabinet cannot go back, if it wishes, so the present indications are the constitutional issue will be fought out very soon after the date already generally agreed on. This is undoubtedly a matter of dread for the Conservatives, who fear the balance of the parties will be very slightly altered by a midsummer election.

It is stated the government is endeavoring to alter the sovereign's coronation oath so it will be less of a fence to Catholics. The deletion of the words "Superstitious and idolatrous" is suggested with other alterations, and it is hoped this will be agreed to and that the bill will be passed.

The Standard says it is understood to be correct that the Duke of Connaught will succeed Earl Grey as governor general of Canada.

PUBLIC BUILDINGS TO PUT ON MOURNING

Ottawa, May 10—The minister of public works has given orders for every public building in Canada to be immediately draped in mourning out of respect for the memory of King Edward. A treasury warrant of \$35,000, has been issued for the purpose of defraying the expense.

Various amounts have been allowed for different places, based upon the importance of the city and the number of public buildings they contain. The lowest amount allowed is \$50 and the most, in the case of Toronto and Montreal, is \$2,000.

A thousand dollars each is allowed for Quebec, St. John, Halifax, and Winnipeg. The work is to be done immediately under the supervision of the public works engineers of each district.

As soon as the day for the funeral of Edward VII. is definitely fixed in London a special issue of the Canada Gazette will be issued proclaiming the day as one of general mourning and a state holiday for all Canada. Memorial services in the churches of the various denominations will also be held on the day of the funeral.

R. L. Borden is arranging for a series of nine or ten political meetings in Ontario during the coming summer at various points covering every section of the province. It is intended that the meetings shall be especially arranged to reach the voters in the rural constituencies.

IRISHMAN ADMITS DOUBLE MURDER

Montreal, May 10—A full confession was this evening made by Timothy Canby, the Liverpool Irishman who has been arrested on the charge of murdering Constables Fortin and O'Connell last Friday night.

Canby, who was night watchman at the Ames Holden warehouse, said he had arranged with a second-hand dealer to sell him stolen boots, and took a bag of them to dispose of them, but when he went into the store, Constable O'Connell appeared, and he went out. Then O'Connell arrested him, and after a struggle Fortin came to the policeman's aid.

Canby said that a scuffle started in Chaboillez street and he pulled his revolver, intending to frighten the police away, but it discharged, killing Fortin instantly. Then he claims O'Connell seized his hands from behind, he still holding the revolver, which again exploded, hitting O'Connell in the abdomen with fatal results.

Canby evidently felt his position keenly and completely broke down when he made the confession.
