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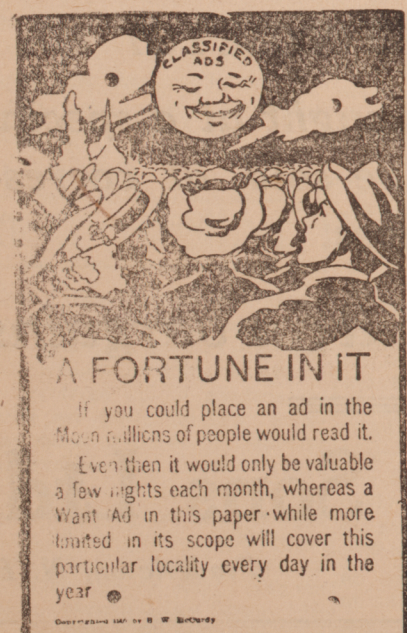

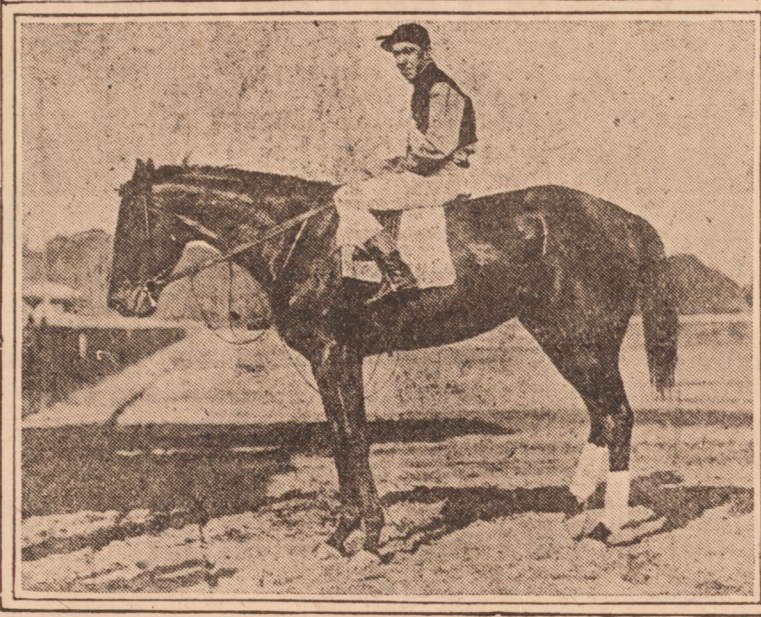

UHLAN AND THE HARVESTER STARS AT HARTFORD MEET

The Harvester Trotted Mile in Free-For-All in 2.03—Uhlans' Figure 2.01 1-4.

Hartford, Conn., Sept. 10.—Uhlans and The Harvester shared the honors at Charter Oak park yesterday when the Grand Circuit horses made their final appearance of the year in New England.

The champion, pulling a wagon and driven by his owner, went a mile in 2.01, while the stallion king raced the second heat of the free-for-all trot in 2.03.

These special performances are not likely to be duplicated in one day for a long time. Uhlans is to appear in public but once more this season, and then over a half-mile track, and the racing days of The Harvester are practically over. The Bingen trotter is to be saved until next season and the son of Walnut Hall has no foe to meet.

MARVELOUS MILE

The mile of Uhlans was a duplicate of that marvelous one at Cleveland a month back when, in placing the world's record at 1.58, he came the last end like a sprinter leaving the start. Three-quarters, each in 30, and then a rush over the last two furlongs as in 29 seconds.

The time of the mile was one-quarter of a second slower than the champion mark Uhlans had set for a four-wheel hitch four weeks ago, but there is no comparison between the two performances. There was a real breeze when he went in 2.01, but measured by today's air current, it was only a wind kiss.

No one accounted the track fast this afternoon, as there was too much water-soaked clay just beneath the surface. Had it not been for a shower early in the morning caretaker Frevier would have had it as fast as any course in the land.

C. K. G. Billings has never driven his great trotter as well as today, and he was warmly congratulated. The clearest professional could not have handled the reins with more skill. It was a magnificent sight, this peerless trotter tearing through the stretch at a 1.56 gait, with his owner encouraging him by a steady grasp of the lines.

THE HARVESTER'S PERFORMANCE

This mile in 2.01 did not dull the grand effort of The Harvester, who after going g comfortably mile in the 2.06 left his field in the \$2,500 free for all and raced a mile faster than any other trotter stallion ever has.

Geers was not record hunting with his prize pupil, but simply getting him ready for his flights against the watch, the first of which comes next week at Syracuse.

The middle half he stepped in 1.00 and the final quarter of the mile in 31 seconds, without a tap of the whip or any noticeable prompting from
