REV. A. A. RIDEOUT SAID FAREWELL TO GEORGE ST. CHURCH

Large Congregations Heard His Sermons--Leaves Tomorrow For Dorchester, Mass.

Yesterday was a day of more than usual interest at the George Street Church. A very large congregation was present at the morning service, while in the evening many were turned away, so great was the attendance. The choir under the leadership of Prof. Cadwallader, rendered excellent music and at the close of the evening service feelingly sang "God be with you till we meet again."

MORNING SERVICE
Rev. Mr. Rideout at the morning service took as his text "Building up yourselves in the most holy faith." In the course of his remarks he pointed out the necessity of clinging together in the work of building the spiritual temple.

AT THE SUNDAY SCHOOL
At the Sunday school the pastor addressed kind words of advice to the scholars and asked of them to give to his successor the same place in their esteem that he had been privileged to enjoy.

EVENING SERVICE
In the evening Rev. Mr. Rideout took as his subject "The parting of the ways." He spoke of the parting of paths in the choice of a vocation in life, also mentioning that when one gets an idea of what life really is, and determines to live for the best, there is then a forsaking of the old ways to walk in the new path of Christian service.

WORDS TO CONGREGATION
Alluding to the parting of ways that come to all, he said, "Tonight as pastor and people we come to the place where our paths diverge." He spoke feelingly of the many ties that bound him to the congregation. They in common with all, had lost many who have been called by death. But there was also the tie of joy for he had been privileged to see one hundred and seventy-five profess the new life and enter into membership of the church.

TO CHOIR AND OFFICERS
He thanked the choir and leader for their excellent work which had been appreciated by all. The officers of the church in all their relations with the pastor had been most cordial and with perfect unity had done all that they could to advance the work. He thanked the faithful band of women for their hearty corporation and spoke of them as a "band of workers of whom any church should be proud."

To the congregation and many friends in the city he expressed his gratitude for many kindnesses. He thanked all for the hearty response in financial matter. The church had discharged all its obligations and had expended over twelve hundred dollars on improvements to the property, and all this because an appeal had never been made in vain. "And now," he said, "the tie that has bound us as pastor and people must be broken. Soon these years of my ministry will be a matter of the past, but deeply written in my memory will be this house of prayer and the congregation to whom I sought to minister for the past six years."

Rev. Mr. Rideout will address a meeting of the members of the L. O. A. at the Orange Hall, this evening. A delegation from the George Street Baptist congregation is to wait upon him tonight to make expression of the regret felt on account of his departure. He leaves for Dorchester, Mass., tomorrow.

REV. DR. PICKARD VISITS OLD HOME IN GIBSON AFTER EUROPEAN TOUR

The Rev. Dr. J. H. E. Rickard of New York who has been spending the summer in Europe arrived Saturday by C.P.R. from Montreal where he landed on Friday from the Royal Mail S.S. Victorian.

Dr. Rickard while in England visited the dock yards at Plymouth and had the honor of being the first Canadian to inspect Canadian cruiser Niobe. She is being thoroughly renovated and will sail for Canada the last of September.

A Plymouth paper referring to Dr. Rickard's trip said: "During his visit to Europe Mr. Rickard has been through Paris and London and the object of his visit to the west was to see the Earl of Mount Edgcombe's historic mansion of Cotchele where his father was born, and of which his grandfather had been Major Domo many years ago. The requisite permission was readily given and Mr. Rickard on visiting Cotchele was most hospitably received by the staff and was shown all the historic treasures, which prove such a source of interest

BULLET REMOVED FROM BOY'S BODY AFTER LIGHTS WENT OUT

Robert Gaynor of McAdam Shot Through Chest by Boy Companion--Successfully Operated on.

Dr. H. H. McNally and Dr. R. H. McGrath operated under difficulties at Victoria Hospital Saturday night but succeeded in taking a .22 calibre bullet from beneath the shoulder-blade of Robert Gaynor a young boy belonging to McAdam who was accidentally shot near that place Saturday afternoon. The two physicians had made good progress with the operation when the lights went out. A search for an oil lamp was made but before it was obtained the bullet had been removed.

SHOT BY CHUM.
Young Gaynor who is about twelve years of age was out shooting with a companion of his own age on Saturday. In some way his chum's rifle was discharged, the bullet striking Gaynor in the right breast and lodging beneath the shoulder-blade after penetrating his chest. The boy was taken to McAdam where Dr. Butler attended to his injuries. An attempt to locate the bullet was unsuccessful and the lad was sent to the local hospital, where the X-Ray apparatus was used successfully.

GAYNOR IS DOING WELL.
It was reported this afternoon that the boy's condition is satisfactory and that favorable progress is expected.

ECLIPSE MFG. CO. OF OTTAWA GETS CONTRACT FOR ALTERING LIBRARY

Capacity of Law Library will be About Doubled--Alterations Will Cost About \$3,700.

The contract for the improvements and alterations at the Law Library at the Legislative Building was awarded on Saturday to the Eclipse Manufacturing Company of Ottawa. The tenders which were received some time ago were placed in the hands of Mr. T. C. Allen, Clerk of the Pleas, and Secretary D. B. Winslow of the Department of Public Works, who awarded the contract.

WILL EXPEND \$3,700.
The Eclipse Manufacturing Company, a representative of which was here last week, will have the new fixtures for the library in this city and ready for installation about the second week of November. It is expected that the alterations will be entirely completed before the February sittings of the Supreme Court. The entire cost of the improvements will be in the neighborhood of \$3,700.

MORE ROOM NEEDED
The yearly addition to the Law Library comprises about two hundred and fifty volumes, one thousand dollars per year being expended on new books by the barristers. For some time past it had been realized that the library within a few years would not be able to contain all the books. Under the new arrangements it is thought that further extensions will not have to be made for twenty-five or thirty years.

WILL DOUBLE CAPACITY
After the intended alterations have been made the capacity of the library will be about doubled. Steel shelving is to be installed in the place of the present shelving and the new racks will be about a foot higher than those now in use. The most striking feature of the altered library will be the gallery which will be really a second floor. This gallery will be above the lower racks and will contain racks which are to be the duplicates of those below.
