## BALFOUR DECLARES FOR FREE COLONIAL WHEAT

### Announcement Received with Satisfaction by Unionists---Bonar Law Says Asquith has Dragged King into Politics.

Halifax, N.S., April 15.—The prohibition bill was read a second time in the house of assembly today. The attorney-general made a lengthy speech, explaining the provisions of the bill.

Dr. Kendall said he would support the measure not because he believed it best in the interests of temperance but because he was convinced that the majority of the people were in favor of it. The majority, however, were not sane in this matter.

The opposition members criticized the bill, their main objection being that Halifax was exempted from the provisions of the act and that the penalties for its violation were too light, not as heavy, one of the speakers said, as under the old license act. London, April 15.—Replying to a letter from a Unionist M.P., Mr. Balfour says: "Wheat grown within the limits of the empire should be imported free. This policy will, I believe commend itself to the judgment of the British community, and will certainly be received with favor in the colonies."

Mr. Balfour's announcement is regarded as likely to have an effect in the industrial constituencies in the next election. The free trade view however, is that untaxed colonial corn will not affect the price of bread as three-fifths of the corn is imported from foreign countries, who would raise the price to pay the duty. The colonial British farmers would do likewise to make the extra profits, so the statement will not prevent the cry of the "little loaf."

The Morning Post, the organ of the advanced Tariff Reformers, determinedly disagrees with the Unionist leader's new policy, and hopes the agric-

cultural members' candidates will stick to their guns in the matter of pledging themselves to fight when the time comes for fair play to home agriculture.

The Standard publishes the views of leading Tariff Reformers, expressing great satisfaction with Mr. Balfour's pronouncement.

Winston Churchill, who has received a large sum for the purpose of a free trade campaign, is arranging for 2,500 special lectures in the next twelve months by distinguished men, including Lords Avesbury and Brassey.

### UNIONISTS ARE BITTER.

Premier Asquith's statement Thursday night made the coalition very enthusiastic and the opposition very angry and brought the political situation once more to an exciting point.

Strong speeches were delivered tonight by Bonar Law and F. E. Smith. The former said Asquith paid the price of degradation of his high office and indignity to the crown for the Nationalist vote. The premier had brought the sovereign into the mire of party politics.

The same points were made by Mr. Smith, who also declared that Asquith's master was Redmond, whose

Augustine Birrell, speaking at Reading, declared, as the Irish secretary, there was no bargain or understanding with the Irish. He said Asquith's pronouncement was absolutely necessary to fill with genuine encouragement the loyalty of his own supporters. To the Unionists' complaints the Liberals reply they are only pursuing a constitutional course, and anyway the lords never had been susceptible to anything but force.

### MILLER BILL SENT UP TO THE SENATE

Bookmaking Confined to Incorporated  
Tracks--Can be Practised only  
During Two Weeks Each Season.

Ottawa, April 15.—The prediction that this session of parliament would not be allowed to close without some legislation designed to curtail the evils of race-track gambling was verified tonight when the Miller Bill, as amended, was put through the house of commons and sent up to the senate.

The amended bill is a distinct step forward over existing legislation, and while it does not go so far as some of the friends of the original bill would have desired, it will eliminate many of the evils which had led up to the introduction of the Miller bill in its original form.

It prohibits betting as a business on horse races or other trials of skill except on the grounds of incorporated associations under limited conditions; it more clearly defines the meaning of the word "place" as applied to book-makers; it prohibits pool rooms, pool selling, the advertising for sale of tips, and advance information covering odds in connection with book-making or betting as a business; it will put an end to the transmission by telegraph or telephone of any advance information or tips and it limits the period of race meets during which book-making will be allowed to two periods of seven days in each year on the tracks of any incorporated association.

### STOLE BRASS FROM MILL

Chatham, N. B., April 15.—Between Saturday night and yesterday when employees of the Miramichi Lumber Company went into the engine room of their rossing mill in town here, and discovered the loss, some thief or thieves got away with \$250 worth of brass fittings. The parts missing are pin brasses eccentric pin brasses, cross head brasses and flange.

It is probable that even more extensive pilfering has occurred, although at present this is the extent of the known damage. There is no clue to the thieves or the location of the stolen property.

### COTTER TO SAIL FROM ST. JOHN

Toronto, April 15.—Eddie Cotter, of Burlington, winner of the Hamilton Spectator Marathon race left for St. John this morning accompanied by Trainer Baker, to take part in the English Marathon on May 21. They will sail on the steamer Lake Manitoba.

A man detained against his will is with the boys in spirit still.

### SEVEN KILLED WHILE THEY SLEPT IN CAMP

Premature Explosion on Ha Ha Bay  
Railway Buried Laborers in Their  
Bunks--Six Found Alive.

Quebec, April 15.—Seven men are known to be dead and seven more are still missing as the result of a premature explosion and landslide which buried a night gang of twenty men who were sleeping in a construction camp near Bagotville yesterday afternoon.

Work was being carried on, on the construction of the Ha-Ha Bay railway in Chicoutimi county, 200 miles from Quebec. The day gang were busy blasting out a cut on a farm about three miles from Bagotville, while the night gang was asleep in the camp below.

Fifty barrels of dynamite and 200 barrels of powder had been prepared. It is stated that the man working the battery did not give the usual warning before firing the blast, and the unexpected slide of some 75,000 cubic yards of soft earth and gravel rushed down from the cliff upon the camp below, where the men of the night gang were sleeping.

Without a moment's warning, the unfortunate men were buried under a huge mass of debris, and it took considerable time before their fellow workmen could organize effective measures of rescue, for their task was rendered more difficult by the approaching darkness. The work of rescue, however, was pushed ahead, while medical aid was summoned from the villages of St. Alphonse and Bagotville.

### SIX FOUND ALIVE.

Up to latest accounts received, seven of the dead had been taken from the debris while six men had been found alive.

The dead are: An Unknown Swede; two unknown Danes; Stanislas Gagne resident engineer, of St. Joseph Dalma; his assistant, a man named O'Brien; a man named Gagne, a man named Cummings, from Toronto.

Among those who were rescued alive, but fatally injured, are a Dane two Swedes and William Paterson.

A Swede named Olsen is suffering from severe internal injuries, and a French Canadian named Soucy, from St. Hedwidge, Lake St. John, had both legs fractured.

A gang of men is still at work searching for the victims, but now all hopes of rescuing any of them alive has been abandoned. It is said there were only nine Canadians in the destroyed camp, the remainder being foreigners.

Amoy, April 16.—The cruiser Cleveland of the United States Asiatic fleet has been despatched to Hankow because of the anti-missionary riots at Changsha.

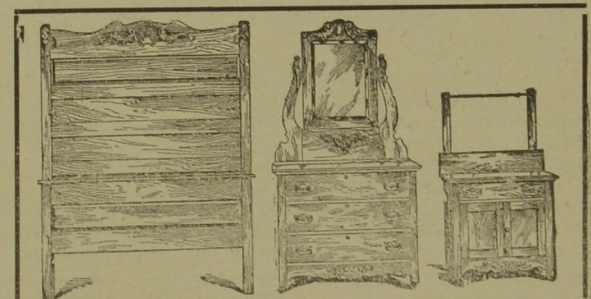
