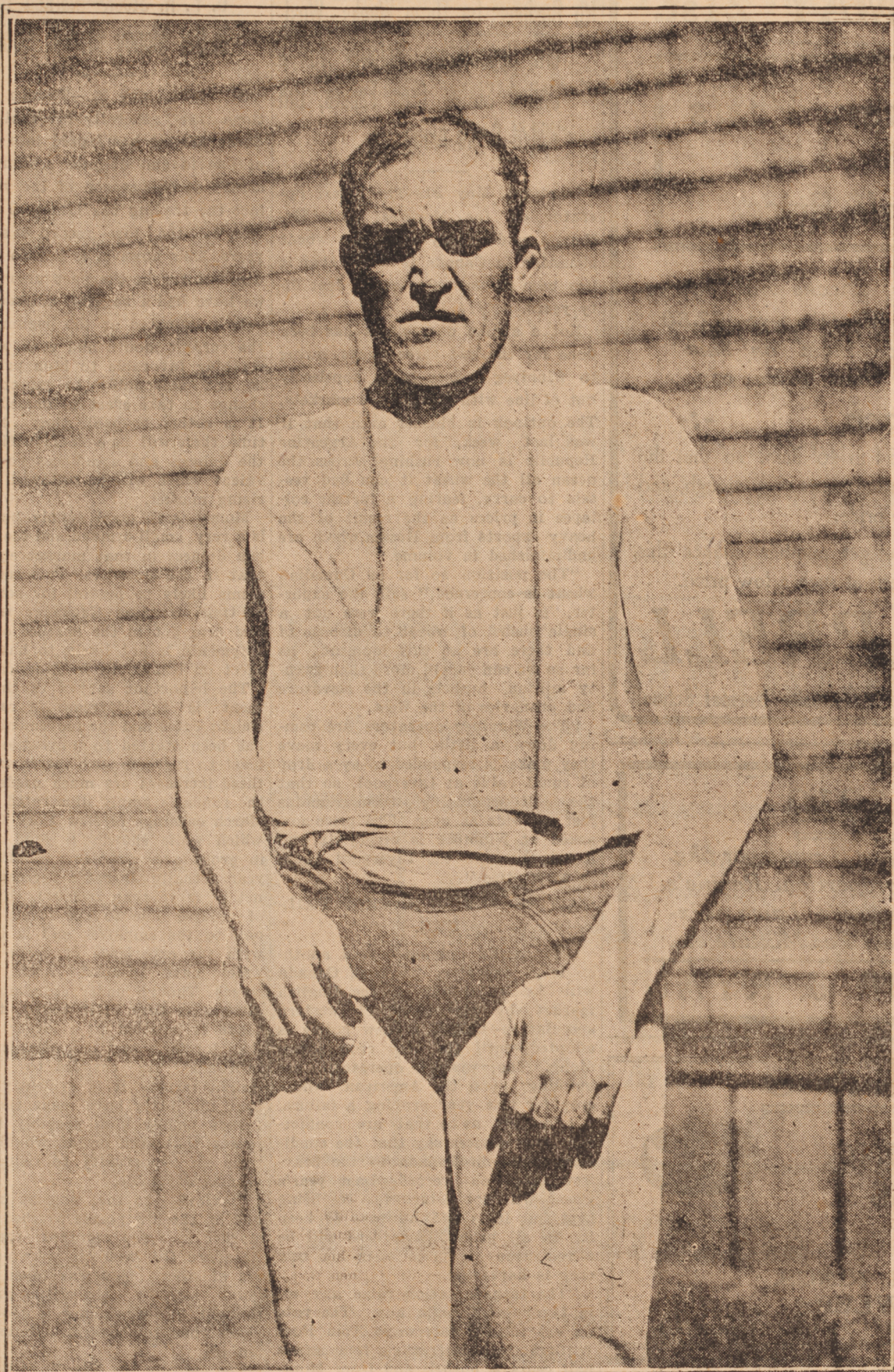

## MORE SUPPORT FROM COLLEGE NEEDED

U. N. B. Students of Opinion that University Authorities Should do Something for Athletics.

The opinion has been expressed by U. N. B. students that the value of winning athletic teams as an advertisement for the College is not recognized by the University authorities or if it is recognized, no sign of that recognition is given. The action of Acadia University in taking steps to provide a professional trainer for all athletic teams and meet a portion of the expense incurred is realized to be an indication of the spread of modern ideas to the colleges of the Maritime Provinces. Now that Acadia has shown the way, it will be necessary for the other colleges to follow or be distanced in the competition which necessarily exists between the universities in this part of Canada.

The only time that the local college had the services of a coach or trainer in any branch of sport, was for a short time during the autumn of 1905, when Mr. H. A. Dickie, of Truro, an ex-member of the Rugby XV's of Edinburgh, and Dalhousie Universities, was brought here to assist in the formation of a football team. The expense at that time was met entirely by the students and the bulk of it by members of the football team. The result of the instruction received was beneficial. Unfortunately and uncontrollable circumstances caused the Red and Black XV of that year to make a poor showing. Otherwise the benefits of Mr. Dickie's coaching would have been more apparent.

The movement for physical training in the public schools could easily be extended to the University. Instructions can easily be obtained from the military depot here.

## CAMERON WILL RACE STERLING TONIGHT

Two Runners will Meet Again—Great Five Mile Race Expected—Sterling in Good Shape.

Sterling and Cameron will meet tonight at St. John, and it is expected that the struggle between the two runners will be a struggle worth going some distance to see.

The interest in the race is even keener than felt in the first contest. The reason for this is that those who are on the inside are said to be certain that Sterling can beat the time made Tuesday by almost a minute, as he has done so in private trials within two weeks. They go further and claim that the St. John runner was for some reason not feeling in good form for the first race, largely because of nervousness, probably brought on by continually realizing the importance of the race and how much it would mean for him to beat the Boston marathoner. He has naturally gotten over this now.

In spite of the frequent statements that Cameron will remain an amateur, many are of the opinion that he will enter the professional ranks, as did Tom Longboat. Tom Eck, the veteran trainer of Toronto is one of the last to become suspicious. He is reported by the Toronto News recently to have said the following:

"I'm just afraid that somebody will be arranging professional races for Jim Corkery and Fred Cameron before long. Those fellows have been running so many races down in the Maritime Provinces that they have given the whole snap away. They are not running for any medals, if you ask me for my opinion. I wouldn't mind putting on a ten mile race with Cameron Corkery, Shrubbs and Ljungstrom as starters. That event would draw the biggest crowd ever got together in Toronto. Shrubbs can give the Swede the greatest kind of an argument yet at ten miles. In fact I believe that the little Englishman could beat Ljungstrom and Cam-

## BECKENDORF MUST STAY WITH TIGERS

St. Louis will not Waive Claim to Him—In that Case Detroit will Hold Him.

Just when the Toronto management was congratulating itself upon the acquisition of Catcher Beckendorf of the Detroit Tigers word came that Jack O'Connor of the St. Louis Americans had refused to waive claim to him.

President McCaffrey thereupon got busy on the wires, and was told by President Navin of Detroit that all American League Clubs had waived, and that he had ordered Beckendorf to report to Toronto. Immediately following this information came another message from the office of the American League in Chicago, President Ban B. Johnson wiring that a mistake had been made in his office in overlooking the claim out in by O'Connor of St. Louis for Beckendorf. If the manager of the Browns adheres to his determination to hang on to the Detroiters the Leafs will be without the services of a good man, but negotiations are already under way for another good backstop who is now with a big league club.

Detroit, May 20—Henry Beckendorf, the Tiger catcher, will not go to Toronto. The St. Louis club notified Pres Frank Navin of the Detroit club that it would not waive, meaning that if Beckendorf leaves Detroit he must go to St. Louis. Under those circumstances Pres Navin will keep him on the Tiger staff.

Detroit planned to farm out Beckendorf to Toronto under such conditions that he could be recalled when the Tigers needed him.
