THE MAYES SETTLEMENT VICTORY FOR GOVERNMENT

The Figures Show Plainly who Won Out in Celebrated Case---Mr. Mayes Claimed \$62,871 and Accepted \$9,750 in Settlement---The Sum of \$5,000 was not Disputed by the Department.

(St. John Telegraph)

The Standard yesterday morning hailed the settlement of the case of Mayes vs. the King as a complete victory for Mr. Mayes over the Dominion government. It was, on the other hand, a victory for the government.

The Standard made special reference to the fact that the crown counsel were not in the room much of the time when the negotiations for settlement were in progress between Dr. Pugsley, Mr. Hazen and Mr. Baxter. As a matter of fact, Mr. Mayes' counsel requested that the crown counsel withdraw from the room, and they thereupon did so. The facts in brief are:

Mr. Mayes sued for \$62,871. The Standard carefully refrained from any mention of this fact. Of this amount \$5,000 was not disputed, either by the department or its engineers, but the check was held back because the department contended that Mr. Mayes had not finished his work. In the settlement the crown agreed to pay this \$5,000. It also agreed to pay the sum of \$4,660 on two other claims amounting to \$16,140, and Mr. Mayes abandoned the balance, besides \$41,641 which he claimed on other accounts.

In other words, he abandoned \$53,121, which he claimed, and accepted \$9,750 out of \$62,871. And of this \$9,750 the sum of \$5,090 was not disputed.

Now, as to the \$4,660 which he was allowed in addition to the \$5,090. There were two reasons for making this allowance. One was that one of his contracts stipulated a certain quantity of material to be removed. It turned out there was not so much, and Mr. Mayes claimed his price for the whole of it. He also made a claim for the profits for some dredging done by government dredges on an area covered by one of his contracts. The total amount which he asked for these was \$16,140, and by the settlement he got \$4,660. This settlement was advised by the government engineers, and accepted by Mr. Mayes.

The settlement, by which a man who claimed \$62,871 is content with \$9,750, of which \$5,090 was not disputed, is a clear victory for the department.

THE SETTLEMENT

In the discussion on the settlement, the counsel for the crown admitted the item of \$5,090 balance due on certificate of the engineer. They refused to allow any interest whatever and offered to submit the contention of the interest in question to the judge without argument. This offer was not accepted by the counsel for Mr. Mayes. The counsel for the crown objected absolutely to the allowance of all the other items, but they were prepared to discuss the last two items of the claim. One of these items was a claim for an allowance of 8,400 cubic yards on material referred to in the contract for the core. Mr. Mayes contended that the Dominion Dredging Company had, without his knowledge, encroached on this previously to the making of the contract, and in consequence of that there was not that amount of material to dredge at the time the contract with him was signed, and he was misled. The other question arose in consequence of the government dredge having dredged over on the ground covered by the first contract. Mr. Mayes contended he was entitled to a claim from the time that he tendered. The counsel for the crown contended that he could only recover, if at all, from the time that the contract was signed. The amounts to be allowed on these last two items were discussed with the engineers.

The minister informed all parties that he had to be bound by the opinion of the counsel for the Crown, and that he agreed in their opinion as to the legal aspect of the case, and also that he could not, without consulting the engineers, make any allowance as to the last two items. He also said that the auditor-general would have to go over his accounts and he was responsible to the people. After consulting with them an offer was made to allow Mr. Mayes the amount of \$9,490, with the expenses of his suit. And after a great deal of discussion between the counsel, this offer was raised to \$9,750, the engineers agreeing to the amount allowed under the last two items as fair. This offer was accepted and the case was closed.
