## HARKINS IN EARTHQUAKE.

Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Harkins will arrive at Halifax by the next steamer from Demerara. Mr. Harkins, in the course of a letter to a friend in Halifax, says everything was at a standstill, owing to the death of King Edward. The Government would not allow any amusements whatever, not even band concerts. He had decided to go to Colon, but, owing to yellow fever at Trinidad, he has decided to take the first boat north. He says they had an earthquake at 7.32 p. m. on May 15th, at Demerara, lasting 12 seconds. The people all rushed for the streets, and for about an hour afterwards it was as lively as ever seen. The negroes were much frightened, and all were going about praying.
