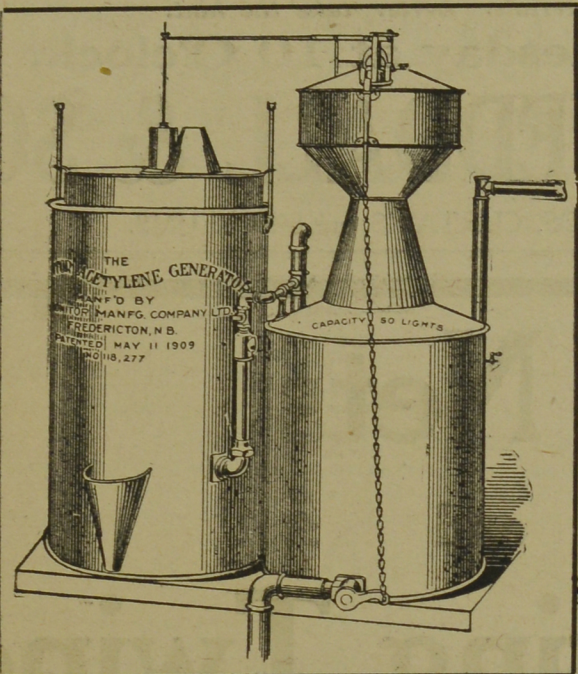

## THE WARRING FACTIONS IN CONSERVATIVE PARTY

**Desperate Effort to Unload Undesirable Timber not Attended with Success—A Western Tory Rebuked—The Anti-Race-Track Bill—Canada's Buoyant Revenue.**

(Special Correspondence to The Mail) Ottawa, April 18.—The disgusting row amongst the Conservatives on Parliament Hill at Ottawa must indeed, be disheartening to this country. Day after day their disgraceful actions, unfolded before the public, are, to say the least, sickening and demoralizing. In a desperate effort to get rid of the millstones and traitors that have sunk them for years past, they have even gone deeper into the mire.

Mr. Monk and two or three others would sink any party that had the misfortune to be linked up with them.

Mr. Borden must have known exactly what Mr. Monk was before this and if so the present results would amply demonstrate his poor judgment in allowing himself to become the victim of treachery and trickery. On the other hand, if he did not know then, the public can but infer that to have such a man as premier of Canada, that would be so blind to his solemn duties of office, would surely be to retrograde and destroy forever the bright chances of this air Dominion.

Mr. Monk has on different occasions faithfully promised Mr. Borden that he would not say anything that would clash with his leader. But within one hour from the time he would make such a promise, he would boldly stand on the floor of the Commons and openly oppose and defy everything Mr. Borden had said.

### HARMONY ON LIBERAL SIDE.

It is an entirely different story on the Liberal side of the House. From Sir Wilfrid Laurier, down to the most obscure back-bencher, there are no men so inordinately vain, disgustingly ambitious, or self-centered as the would-be Tory disturbers who are over inoculated with an over-abundance of egotism.

Mr. Monk has certainly been of no use to his leader in Quebec, and he with several other front-benchers, to the left of the Speaker, have been a constant weakness to Mr. Borden in all other parts of the Dominion. They have been more of an affliction to the Conservative party, ten times over, than the worst of the men, Sir Wilfrid Laurier got rid of many years ago.

### QUEBEC'S PREMIER CONGRATULATED.

The general opinions expressed by eastern members in the corridors of the House, strongly favor the action of the Premier of Quebec in respect to his decision to adopt the policy of prohibiting the exportation of pulp-wood to the United States. They say it is high time that Canada ceased to allow her raw material to be exploited for the benefit of another country, instead of having it manufactured here and reaping the benefit of the establishment of the many industries that are dependent on such raw materials, or their existence. The reason advanced is that when Canada commences to build her own warships, she will have to buy back from the United States, at exorbitant figures, a great quantity of material that might just as well be manufactured within her confines.

### HON. FRANK OLIVER SHINES.

Hon. Frank Oliver, minister of the interior, deserves much credit for the masterful way in which he satisfactorily explained and completely buried, the malicious and deliberate charges concocted by the Opposition that speculators were getting hold of Indian lands in the Canadian West for speculation.

Mr. G. H. Bradbury (Con.), Selkirk, Man., in a four hour's speech in the House last week, declared that Indian lands were given to friends of the party for merely nothing, and it was up to Mr. Oliver. It was up to Mr. Oliver, and it was a sorry day for Mr. Bradbury that he ever launched such a groundless charge.

The Minister of the Interior made a characteristically vigorous reply to the member for Selkirk and described his speech as a persistent tirade of unwarranted assertions and insinuations, which in its gratuitous inexactitude was an offence to the privilege of Parliament and an insult to its intelligence. (Applause.)

Mr. Bradbury rose to a question of privilege, but the Speaker ruled that the language was not unparliamentary.

Mr. Oliver declared that not one single statement made by Mr. Bradbury in his lengthy speech was founded on fact, for his hon. friend had little regard for fact.

The claim that the surrender of Indian titles were made in the interest of speculators were shown to be absolutely unfounded and ridiculous as all the records were before

the House and in no single case did they substantiate Mr. Bradbury's statement.

Mr. Bradbury claimed that only a small minority of the band of Indians were present at the meeting at which the surrender of the St. Peters Indian Reserve, was argued upon.

Mr. Oliver showed that some 200 out of 289 were present and to say that the Indians were swindled out of their lands was absolutely base, less and false. While one or two got \$4 per acre, the majority got as high as \$17 an acre and in every case the real market value was realized.

### EXTRA CLERKS REQUIRED FOR CENSUS.

It is understood that about 3000 extra clerks will be required by the census department for census work for the next three years. Hon. Sydney Fisher moved an amendment to the Civil Service Act to provide for the appointment of these temporary clerks for any decennial census.

The Opposition also urged for a general increase to the Outside Civil Service, but Mr. Fisher would not consent to this at present.

### ANTI-GAMBLING BILL COMPROMISE.

A compromise has been reached on the anti-gambling issue, and a new bill, drawn up and passed. The new measure limits the number of days racing to 7 and allows only two meets a year on incorporated race-tracks. Both the racing men and the Reformers agreed to accept the bill and there was no opposition. Very Par. of Can—TWO little of the original Miller bill was left and the new measure is not considered anything more than a repetition of present legislation. It is understood that no new bill will be brought up next session.

### NO CAUSE OF JEALOUSY.

There should be no cause for jealousy between the Halifax Liberals and those of St. John, because the latter are to receive a big fly-dock through the efforts of Hon. Wm. Pugsley. Halifax at present has a dry dock and in addition is to be given a Naval College, even though its electors failed to see the importance of sending a Liberal member to Ottawa. However, it may not be too late to improve Halifax's chances, should Mr. Borden who opposed the entire naval program, see fit to change his attitude toward the matter when the bill is again resumed for consideration this week.

### CANADA'S BEST YEAR.

The year just closed will undoubtedly be the best year financially in Canada's history. The total income will exceed \$100,000,000. When Mr. Fielding predicted these figures in his budget speech some months ago, people became optimistic, but now it is a realization and indeed a glowing tribute to the good judgment of Canada's shrewd finance minister.

### DALHOUSIE PROFESSOR TO LEAVE

Halifax, April 17—Dr. A. S. MacKenzie, professor of physics in Dalhousie University, has accepted an appointment to the chair of physics in the Stevens Technical Institute, New York. Mr. MacKenzie is a graduate of Dalhousie, and has been professor there for the past five years.

### BAPTIST DELEGATION FOR ST. JOHN

Toronto, April 16.—A deputation from the Baptist mission board of Ontario and Quebec, started for St. John today to negotiate with the foreign mission board of the maritime provinces with reference to the formation of one Baptist foreign mission board for the dominion. It is believed by members of the board that such arrangements would greatly facilitate the administration of foreign mission work, and would not in any way interfere with the autonomy of the separate boards.

### SUICIDE AT LOCH LOMOND

St. John, April 18.—Joseph Baxter, aged 40, was found lying across his bed in his home at Loch Lomond, dead, yesterday morning. An empty bottle of carbolic acid was found by his side.

### HOME SEEKERS ATTENTION

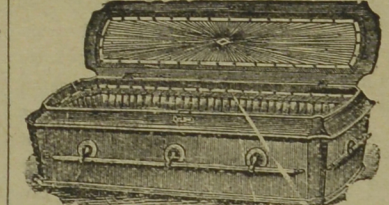

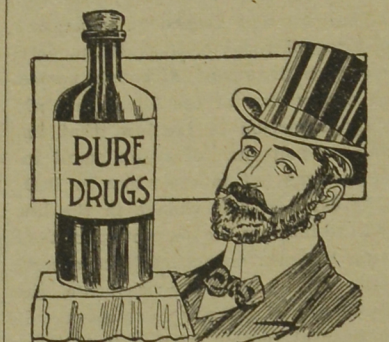
