## AMERICANS WANT RECIPROCITY TREATY

Action of Quebec re Pulpwood Bring-  
ing Them to Their Knees--To  
open Negotiations Soon.

Washington, April 18—The Canadian pulpwood situation continues to be a topic of absorbing interest with state department officials and the government tariff experts.

Since the announcement by Premier Gouin last Tuesday that an order in council will be very soon issued prohibiting the exportation of pulpwood from the province of Quebec nothing of an official character in the way of confirmation has reached this government. It is assumed, therefore, that the order has not yet been issued. From unofficial sources it has been learned that the government of Quebec has decided that pulpwood cut prior to May 1, next, would not be included within the prohibition, but this has not been verified officially.

STATE DEPARTMENT ANXIOUS.  
The state department earnestly continues its efforts to reach an amicable understanding with Canada, looking to closer commercial relations between the two countries and there is reason to believe special attention is being given at this moment to the subject of pulpwood and pulp. It is understood the negotiations will be opened for a treaty between the United States under which reciprocal advantages can be secured to both countries.

Such a treaty would undoubtedly cover a long list of subjects, one of the most important of which, from the American point of view, would be pulpwood. Intimations have been made from time to time that Canada would be willing so permit the exportation to the United States of pulpwood in consideration for a material reduction in the American tariff of print paper and while no rate has been fixed upon as satisfactory by the Canadian officials, it is generally understood that the recommendation of \$2 per ton made by Representative Mann at the last session of congress would be satisfactory to the Canadian government. It is believed that negotiations which may be opened either in Washington or Quebec some time within the next few weeks, may proceed along these lines.

## JUDGE BOWS TO CHURCH'S ORDER

Quebec, April 18—Interest almost as acute as the Roosevelt incident was felt here today when Justice Lemieux returned from Montreal announcing that the Roman Catholic religious authorities had forbidden him to speak on the temperance question, as announced, in the St. James Methodist church, Montreal.

Not a word has appeared in the Montreal papers but it is learned that both Judge Lemieux and Dr. J. E. Dube, a leading Montreal practitioner, had accepted an invitation to address a temperance meeting in the church in question. The Archbishop of Montreal intimated to Dr. Dube that it must not be, and the Archbishop of Quebec forbade Justice Lemieux, both gentlemen being greatly mortified at the turn of events.

It appears that His Grace of Montreal reasoned as follows: Supposing that any one should cable to the Vatican that a Catholic judge of the Superior Court had delivered an address in a Methodist church, the pope and the ever alert Merry Del Val would have a very poor idea of Catholic discipline in Mgr. Bruchesi's diocese.

Be this as it may, the incident reminds the people here of the time Rev. Dr. Barclay came to Quebec to preach in St. Andrew's Presbyterian church some years ago, and amongst those who went to hear him were Sir Francis Langellier and the Hon. John Hearn, M. L. C., both strong Roman Catholics. They were delighted with the sermon and told their friends so the next day. Next day, however, a polite note came from the palace to the effect that Cardinal Taschereau wanted to see them. They gave no heed to the appeal, however, and another letter was received from the archbishop's secretary. Still, however there was no answer, and the matter dropped out of the public mind only to be revived today when Quebecers learned of Judge Lemieux's experience in Montreal.

## VERY IMPORTANT BREED DISTINCTION

Ways in Which Pure Bred Differs from  
Thoroughbred--Expert Tells of  
it.

The "Farmer's Advocate" for the benefit of a New Brunswick subscriber distinguishes between a Thoroughbred and a Pure-bred as follows:

The dictionary defines "thoroughbred" as "bred from the best or purest blood or stock; of a breed kept pure for many generations, hence having the qualities of such breeding; high-spirited, courageous, elegantly-formed, etc." This definition draws no essential distinction between the meaning of "thoroughbred" and "pure-bred." Among stock-breeders, however, the term thoroughbred has come to be applied exclusively to the English running horse, which is the oldest and purest-bred of our common breeds of horses. Used in this sense, the term has acquired the significance of a proper name, just as Shorthorn has become the name of a certain breed of cattle, and the exclusive use of the name Thoroughbred is now no more a reflection on the purity of breeding of other horses than the use of the name Shorthorn is an imputation of length of horns possessed by other breeds. In fine point of metaphysics, the English race-horse has no special right to a monopoly of the name Thoroughbred, any more than the Shorthorn has a right to monopolize that term; but the names having been established by usage, it is in the interest of clearness to adhere to the usage, and no live-stock journal of any rank, printed in the English language, applies the term Thoroughbred to any other breed of stock than this one breed of horses.

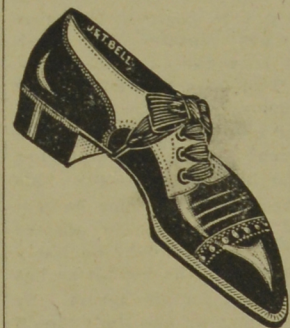

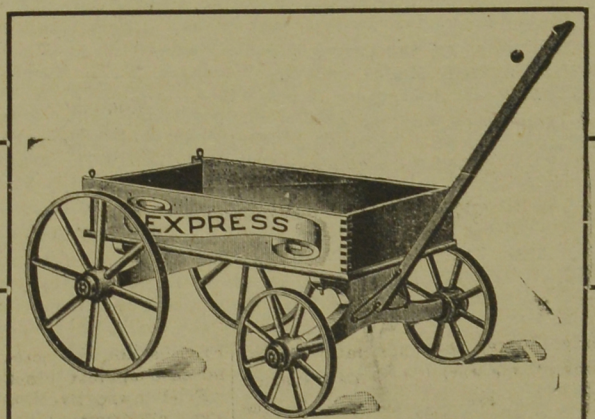
