GOVERNOR GILLETTE TO STOP JEFFRIES JOHNSON FIGHT

Sent Letter to Attorney General of California Yesterday Ordering that Aid of Courts be Invoked--Fighters' Camp in Confusion as Result.

San Francisco, June 15.—Stirred to action by insistent protests from all parts of the state and country, Governor James N. Gillette took steps today to prevent the championship fight between Jas. J. Jeffries and Jack Johnson, scheduled to be held in San Francisco on July 4.

In a letter today to Attorney-General U. S. Webb, the governor expressed his disapproval of prize fighting in unmeasurable terms and directed that the aid of the courts be invoked to prevent the match. He concluded with a positive order that, in case the plea for a restraining order be not granted and the fight be held, the attorney-general proceed to gather evidence and prosecute the participants and those interested in the fight for violation of the penal code of the state.

The letter declares that the supreme court of California had not defined a prize fight, and suggests that an opportunity be given it to do so.

While the status of the fight is in an unsettled condition tonight, the sporting fraternity is much cast down and it is generally believed that the knell of prize fighting in California, "the mecca of prize fights," according to the governor's letter, has been sounded.

This belief is borne out by the fact that the governor telegraphed to Attorney-General Webb late in the day to take similar action as to the fight scheduled for June 28 in San Francisco between Sam Langford and Al Kaufman.

READY TO FIGHT ELSEWHERE.

"I don't care where the fight takes place," declared Johnson tonight, "only I would rather have it come off in San Francisco as I am training there, but if we cannot fight here, I am willing to go any place Rickard and Gleason agree upon."

Like Jeffries, Johnson said he could not understand why Governor Gillette had decided to step in and prevent the fight at this late date.

GOVERNOR GILLETTE FIRM.
Sacramento, Cal., June 15.—"I have no statement to make other than that contained in my letter to

the Attorney-General," said Governor Gillette tonight. "I am simply doing my duty as I see it. I only acted after the district-attorney of San Francisco reported that he would not try to prevent what I deem to be a crime against the state of California and the laws I am sworn to protect from violation. I have been deliberating on this matter for ten days, and have gone over the whole thing very carefully.

"I have received hundreds of letters but these have had no bearing on my action. I propose to do my duty as I see it, no matter what people may say or do and no matter whom it hurts. That is all there is to it."

JEFFRIES' CAMP IN UPROAR.

Ben Lomond, June 15.—The Jeffries camp was in an uproar this evening as the result of Governor Gillette's order to stop the big fight. When Jeffries was first informed that the governor had instructed the attorney-general to prevent the fight, he made the following statement:

"I positively refuse to believe the story. I do not care what is said or who talked to the governor over the phone; I simply will not believe it is true. I do not know much about law, but my understanding is that we are within the law and are protected by it. All the articles of agreement signed by Johnson and myself were the same as those signed for every fight fought in California. Gillette once said he could not stop the fight, so how is he going to do it? I will continue my training until I am informed that the affair cannot come off."

Jeff is the least perturbed man in camp as the result of the latest crash in the plans for the fight.

While the camp was still boiling with indignation over the governor's instructions to his attorney-general, Jeff blissfully slumbered in a tent cot on the porch of his cottage.

MEXICAN BID FOR FIGHT.

El Paso, Texas, June 15.—A telegram was sent tonight to Tex Rickard and Jack Gleason by prominent business men, proposing that the fight be held in the bull ring at Jerez, Mexico. The arena will seat 30,000.

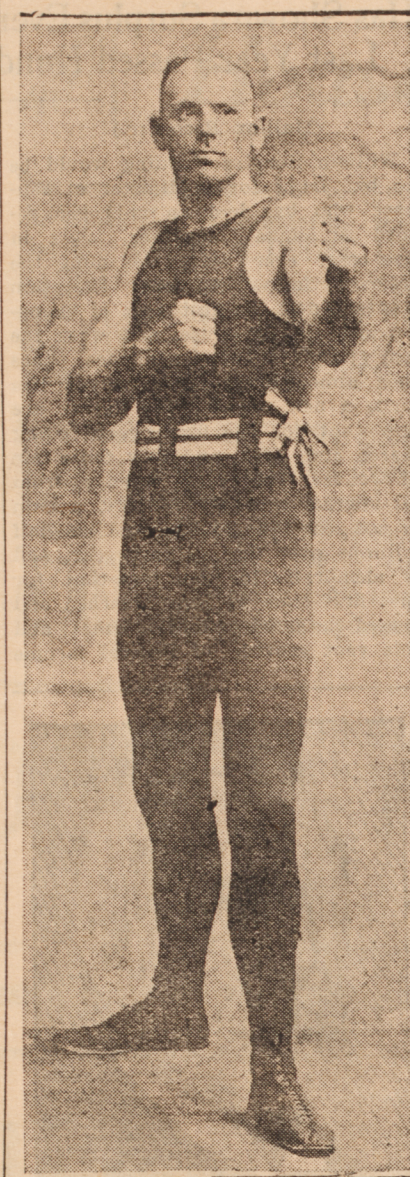
Zach Wheat, the hard hitting outfielder of the Brooklyn club, says that he is a Cherokee Indian, brought up in Kansas.

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST LAND REGULATIONS**

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may "homestead" a quarter-section available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.
