REV. FRED S. PORTER
FOR GERMAIN ST. CHURCH

Young Baptist Clergyman, Native of This City, Accepts Call Extended By St. John Congregation.

Rev. Fred S. Porter, at present at Liverpool, N. S., has accepted a call extended by the Germain Street Baptist Church of St. John. Rev. Mr. Porter belongs to Fredericton.

The St. John Telegraph today says: "T. H. Belyea, clerk of the Germain Street Baptist Church, yesterday received a telegram from Rev. Frederick Seely Porter, of Liverpool, N. S., announcing that he had accepted the call to the pastorate of the Germain Street Baptist Church. He will take up his new duties on the third Sunday in September. Rev. Mr. Porter was born in Fredericton, and was graduated in arts from Acadia in 1903, taking his M. A. degree in 1907. He afterwards spent a year at Rochester Theological Seminary. He supplied several churches in this province during his college course, everywhere preaching with great acceptance. He is now on his third year in Liverpool, having commenced his pastorate there early in 1908.

"Mr. Porter's wife is a daughter of J. W. Spurden, of Fredericton. About four weeks ago there was a reunion of the Porter family in Fredericton, when Rev. Mr. Porter preached from the pulpit of the Brunswick Street Baptist Church, the members of the family occupying the old family pew at the service. The call to Germain Street Church was hearty and unanimous and the members feel gratified that he has accepted. His brother is pastor of the leading Baptist Church in Louisville, Ky., and is looked upon as one of the leading pulpits orators in the south. Mr. Porter himself is considered a coming man and great things are expected of him."

NOT ENOUGH RAIN
TO BRING DRIVES OUT

Crews are Still at Work but Water is Falling Rapidly—More Rain is Needed.

It now is expected that the drives on the River St. John which were reported as being brought out safely will not get very far from the spot where the last fall in the water left them. Heavy rains in the near future are needed to bring the lumber to the corporation limits. The crews are still working on the drive but with the water falling away and a long distance to be covered before the corporation limits are reached it is considered to be only a matter of time before the logs will hang.

Mr. John Kilburn got into touch with the upper river late yesterday by telephone. He was informed that it was not likely that all his lumber would come out on the present rise of the water. The drive has been brought out eight or ten miles but has still about sixteen miles to cover before the boom limits are reached.

RAIN NEEDED.

"Only another big rain will bring the logs out" said Mr. Kilburn. "They are not yet hung up, however, and the crews are still at work. The river at this point has fallen about six inches in the past two days.

Reports from points up river are to the effect that the drop in the water is general.

The following reports were obtained today by Western Union:

Woodstock:—Water fell six or seven inches last night. Quite a few logs running. Weather fine and warm.

Grand Falls:—Weather warm. River about the same.

Edmundston:—River falling. Fine and warm.
